PCARS is planning to operate a club station for the Ohio QSO Party. That's on August 25th. Wow – back to back operating events! More to come on this.




September 7th is the Black Squirrel Festival at KSU


(tentative date, watch for confirmation or change). PCARS will be operating a special event station from the KSU Campus.


Watch for information later in the summer about the scheduling of our Technician class at Maplewood. I have already had some inquiries about it so start spreading the word.


Program and activity suggestions are always welcome. Let me know what PCARS can do for you. This is your club and we want it to be responsive to your ham radio interests.

I hope that you all had a great June and fantastic Field Day to cap off the month. But this is now July and a lot things happening on the HAM bands. You'll notice an expanded **IOTA** section this month

because of the RSGB IOTA Contest at the end of the month.

For those of you who have been led to believe that nothing is going on because of the low sun spot cycle, let me just say that the week of June 17-23 saw 199 separate countries active on the bands and the week before that there were 208 recorded countries. So DX is alive and well. You just have to get on the air to snag them.

I so want to thank the Northern Ohio Amateur Radio Society, Northern Ohio DX Association, the 425 DX News, and the ARRL DX Newsletter for providing the information. As always there is more information than we have room for here, so I have to take the liberty of picking some of the more choice tidbits to include in this column.

- **4X7, ISRAEL** Members of the Holyland DX Group will be active as 4X7AZ from **Akhziv Island** (AS-100, MIA MIR-001) between July 28th and July 29th. Activity will be on 80-10 meters, CW and SSB. They plan to have two stations on the air. Look for 4X7AZ to participate in the IOTA Contest. QSL via 4Z5LA.
- **9U, BURUNDI** DL7DF, will be leading a team of operators to East Africa to be active as **9U0A** between late evening (local time) September 26th and October 9th (noon local time). Activity will be on 160-6 meters on CW and SSB. One station will be exclusive on RTTY, PSK31 and SSTV. There will be a special emphasis on the lower bands and digital modes. The QSL route is via DL7DF.
- **9X, RWANDA** EA5RM, has announced that a multinational team is planning to be on the air from Kigali this summer. Details will be announced later. Stay tuned!
- **C5, THE GAMBIA** ON7YK, will once again be active as C56YK from September 14-27th. Activity will be on 80-10 meters and also on 6 meter SSB. QSL via the info on QRZ.com.
- FS & PJ7, ST. MARTIN AND ST. MAARTEN ISLANDS (Update/Survey). Operators CT1BWW, EA3GHZ and EA5YH will be active as FS/homecall and PJ7/homecall between July 15-25th. The trio (with their XYLs) will start their activity on the French side of the island but will make visits to the Dutch side throughout their stay. Activity will be on 80-6 meters, CW, SSB and the digital modes. QSL via their home call signs. Visit their very interesting Web page at:

They have also added to their Web page a survey to determine what bands and modes are needed the most for each entity. During their operation, visit the DXFUN Web page for updates, photos and logs.

IOTA ACTIVITY

AS-155 – Green Island – Six amateurs will be active as BV9G from Green Island (also known as Lu Tao, WLOTA LH-0495) during the RSGBIOTA Contest (July 28-29th). QSL via BV8BC.

EU-008 - Members of the Cockenzie and Port Seton Amateur Radio Club (CPSARC) will once again operate from the **Isle** of Tiree (IOSA NH04, WAB NM04), the most westernly part

of Scotland's Inner Hebridean Islands, during the RSGB IOTA (Islands on the Air) Contest which runs from 1200z, July 28th to 1200z, July 29th, using the clubs special contest callsign GM2T. Pre-contest activity members will be signing as MM0CPS/P. QSL GM2T via the Bureau, or their QSL Manager GM4UYZ.

- **EU-031** Seven Italian will be active as IC8R from **Procida Island** (**IIA NA-002, MIA MI-080**) during the RSGB IOTA Contest (July 28-29th). QSL via IC8OZM.
- **EU-042** DF7FC, will be active as homecall/p from **Langeness Island (N-19 for the German Islands Award)** during the RSGB IOTA Contest (July 28-29th). His activity will be SSB only, with 100 watts. QSL via his home callsign; bureau is preferred.
- **EU-057** DL5KUD, will be active from **Ruegen Island (O-07 for the German Islands Award)** during the RSGB IOTA Contest (July 28-29th). QSL via DL5KUD; bureau is preferred.
- **EU-123** MM0NDX and GM1RIG will be active as homecall/p from Cramond Island during the RSGB IOTA Contest (July 28-29th). QSL via their home callsigns, direct only.
- EU-127 DL5AUA, will be active as homecall/p from Neuwerk Island (N-12 for the German Islands Award, ARLHS FED-165, TWLHD WLH DL-019, WLOTA LH-2311) during the RSGB IOTA Contest (July 28-29th). QSL via his home callsign.
- **EU-128** DL5XAT, will be active as homecall/p from **Fehmarn Island (O-01 for the German Islands Award)** during the RSGB IOTA Contest (July 28-29th). QSL via his home callsign.
- **EU-146** There will be two separate groups working from **Schouwen Duiveland** during the RSGB IOTA Contest (July 28-29th). QSL via PA1BX.
- **EU-170** 9A4ML, 9A2HW, and 9A4CD will be active as **9A9Z/p** from **Pasman Island (IOCA CI-085, CIA-34, ACIA IC-348)** during the RSGB IOTA Contest (July 28-29th). QSL via 9A1ADE; bureau is preferred.
- **KD8**, UNITED STATES (USI Op). KD8DFD and KD8DWU will attempt to qualify **Duck Island (USI MD-030,** Washington County,

Maryland) in the Potomac River for the first time on July 28th. Activity will be on 40 and 20 meters, mostly SSB, plus 2 meters. QSL via the USI eQSL or the callbook address.

Well that's it for another month. If I can do it, I will try to bring some updates during our weekly PCARS Net. Maybe I'll tell you about the 73 old grandmother who is going on DXpedition to two Islands in the Pacific. So until next time, keep the receiver sensitivity wide open so you don't miss that weak signal from some HAM having a great time on some mountain top or some beach somewhere. Remember, it may be you one day out there looking for a friendly voice to come back to your CQ.

Field Day Etiquette

More than any other event, Field Day puts PCARS and its members squarely in the public eye. The Field



Day Committee observed a number of problem situations, both on the air, and dealing with guests, public officials, and members of the press. In particular, certain

information was given out that not completely true, or could have been handled in a more diplomatic manner.

In future events, please do your best to put PCARS in a good light by refraining from the following:

PCARS officers should be referred to by their given name and/or callsign, not "Princess Anastasia".

- Our radio equipment does not operate on the principle of black magic.
- Do not taunt the French amateurs on the air.
- Sock puppets cannot be listed as control operators in the log.
- When dealing with officials or reporters, the club

- president should be introduced as "Tom", or "Mr. Sly", not "our own Dr. Feelgood".
- Not allowed to trade radio equipment for "magic beans".
- You may not form any press gangs to put up or take down antennas.
- Inflatable sheep should be stored out of sight during the contest.
- Log entries should include your name and callsign. A smiley face is not an acceptable substitute.
- Senior members of PCARS are <u>not</u> old enough to have worked the first Field Day, which was <u>not</u> during the Civil War.
- You are not allowed to bum cigarettes off of anyone under twelve.
- Prohibited: Use of logging computers to bootleg pornography. Even if they are "especially patriotic films"
- Avoid making a Citizens Arrest during the contest.
 For example, you cannot arrest children for being rude.
- "No Drinking Of Alcoholic Beverages" does not imply that a Jack Daniel's thru an IV is acceptable.
- You are not authorized to sell mineral rights to the Field Day site.
- If detained by local police, your ham license does <u>not</u> give you the right to a strip search.
- Tell reporters that we conduct Field Day in a gentlemanly manner. We do not "charge into battle, naked, like the Celts".
- The purpose of Field Day is to have fun in a technically challenging environment, not to "conquer the earth with an army of flying monkeys."
- The Mayor has neither the time, nor the inclination to hear about what you did with six boxes of Fruit Roll-Ups.
- If you cannot successfully complete a contact, simply go on to the next contact. Do not challenge the other station to "Meet me on the field of honor, at dawn".
- Our radio equipment cannot be assembled into a giant battle-robot.
- Do not tell guest that we are hearing conversations from the NSA, FBI, CIA and KGB.

Eye-Ball to Eye-Ball

This month's E2E is with ... well it's with ... um... me! Chuck Patellis, from Parkman, OH (Geauga County).

I got my start July 4th, 1947, during a double header between The Indians and the Yankees. And boy was my mom's doctor ticked since he was at the game and was called to the phone. Back in those days, they didn't have other doctors take one's place. Dad said he could hear Dr. Levy cussing a blue streak coming down the hospital hall to mom's room.



My childhood was pretty normal. During the summer vacations from school I played from dawn to dusk (had to get home when the street light came on) and mostly played with my best friend, Duane. Baseball, football, Cowboys and Indians, war, etc, were normal fare with Kick the Can thrown in when I was older.

But my 15th birthday brought something new into my life. That was the day I received a new transistor radio that was also able to pick up short wave stations. One night I discovered a couple of guys talking to one another and one guy was from Twinsburg and the other was from someplace out west. The station from Twinsburg was W8RHZ, Harry Steffan. He was a grand

old man who had a tremendous AM station made up mostly of Collins and Hallicrafters equipment. I was caught! The next day, Duane and I sat at my folks picnic table and we were both awed by what we could hear. That was 1962 and it was the beginning of my involvement in a great hobby. Later that year both Duane and I took our Novice license test and he became WN8FHP and I became WN8FQK. My novice station was made up of a straight key (still have it) and an Eico 720 transmitter and a Hallicrafters SX-110 receiver. Boy, I loved that set up. The next year we both passed our Technician test and I got a Hallicrafters HT-40 and an Ameico 6 meter transverter. This allowed me to get on to 6 meter AM.

On Jan. 21, 1964, I was able to thank Harry, W8RHZ, personally during a 6 meter QSO, for being instrumental in my getting my Amateur Radio license.

I'm not sure when Clegg brought out the Venus 6 meter SSB transceiver, but not long afterwards, my parents blessed me with one and a new 50' tower and 6 element Long John beam for 6 meters. I was in heaven. 75 watts on 6 meter SSB.

I continued this way until 1970 when I got married and Jeanne and I moved to Akron so that I could go to law school. I joined the ARC there and was able to get on the air once in a while. But school took up most of Then with several moves (Hiram, my time. Youngstown, Cleveland, back to Hiram) I simply could not get on the air and allowed my license to lapse in 1974. During those idle years I kept my fingers in HAM radio by building my HeathKit SB-303 and later my SB-401. Duane kept his license throughout and became an excellent contester, winning several awards including DXCC with well over 300 countries. I knew what I had missed and with Duane constantly urging me to get back on the air, I finally studied and took my General test in the Fall of 2004.

All I can say is that the one thing I had not kept up on was the price of Amateur Radio equipment. When I finally started to look for a rig around which to build my first station in 30 years, sticker shock was rampant. My station now consists of the following: Kenwood TS-570 SG, Icom IC-7000, Icom IC-V8000, Yaesu FT-2500M, and a Yaesu VX-170 HT. My antennas are a Mosley TA-33 Sr. with the additional element for the WARC bands, at 50' and a M² 6M7-JHV 7 element widespaced Yagi for 6 meters at 60'. Oh, did I mention the Ameritron AL-80B foot warmer? I'm hoping to add something for 40 meters but have not yet settled on anything.

When I was a teen, my parents always knew where I

was because I spent most of every evening on the air. Now my wife knows where I am because I seem to be doing the same thing. My HAM interests are hunting DX, contests, and simply rag chewing. I love SSB and am getting back on CW again. It's fun! It's exciting! And it's my main hobby. Other interests include fly fishing and collecting fly rods – tying my own flys, and reading. Field Day & EmComm

PCARS Field Day weekend was terrific! Over half of the club's current members attended and we had nearly forty guests, public officials and agency representatives. This was only PCARS second club Field Day and we can be proud of how well things went.

Equipment and Operations

Club members were at the site by 8:30 Saturday morning and setup was well underway by shortly after

nine. One big change for 2007 was that we elected to be a 4 Alpha station, meaning a club operating four HF stations on emergency power, versus our 3 Alpha station in 2006. In addition, we operated a Get On The Air station and a VHF station on six meters.



The additional transmitter added some level of complication because we wanted to be sure that we minimized interference between stations. At the suggestion of Ed, N8EQJ, we moved the forty meter station a few hundred feet away, putting it in deep left-centerfield of the baseball field. Ed erected an inverted vee with an east-west orientation although he made some occasional adjustments as band conditions changed.

That left the dedicated twenty meter station, the GOTA station on fifteen meters, the band/mode agile station, the CW rig, and the six meter station all under the shelter. We used bandpass filters on the twenty and forty meter stations and they seemed to benefit from those.

Chuck, K8CMP, once again set up and manned the twenty meter rig and was its primary operator but got relief from other ops whenever he needed it. He first set

up a sloper for twenty on a mast that N8EQJ provided, but replaced it with a Carolina windom. By the way, if you ever need an indestructible portable antenna base see Ed, N8EQJ. The ones he builds could be bridge supports.

The GOTA station was committed to fifteen meters

with the hope that the band would be open, and the Buddipole was tuned up (almost flat) for fifteen and left there. We chose fifteen meters so that the GOTA station



could operate without interfering with the contesting rigs.

Unfortunately, fifteen only gave us seven contacts on the GOTA station on Saturday before the band just died, which put a real dent in its utility as a demonstration station. Instead we dragged the guests out to listen to Ed running forty. On the plus side, by noon on Sunday fifteen was active and we made a number of contacts from the band agile station.

The band/mode agile station was hooked up to a Buckmaster off-center fed dipole running north-south about forty feet up in the trees. The primarily CW rig used a 106 foot G5RV at twenty five feet that was strung between portable military surplus masts running eastwest but close to the south end of the dipole. Both antennas worked quite well and interference between the two was generally avoided.

In addition, Russ, KB8DPN, installed receive and transmit two meter verticals for the APRS demo station. The six meter station ran a squalo at about twenty feet, for a total of eight antennas on site.

On top of the APRS demo we were also able to run Airmail/Winlink 2000 and MT-63 as non-traditional modes and Tom, WB8LCD, also briefly ran QRP on a solar/battery powered station.

Logging

Operations were made a lot easier by having a wireless networked computer system using the N3FJP



Field Day network software. Credit for the computer logging goes to Jim, KC8RKV, and Russ, KB8DPN, who got it up and operating and saw all of us through a couple of early glitches without any

loss of data. This is great software that is easy to run. Enter the call sign, class, and section and hit 'return' and that's it. I got a kick out of working the N3FJP Field Day station on eighty meters and getting a chance to compliment them on the software.

A big 'thank you' to all of our loggers. They included Tom, KB8UUZ, Doug, KC8OHQ, who was also a guest who had recently upgraded to General, Julie, KD8AYJ, Bill, WB9LBI, Karen, WD8BIW, Kathy, KD8FLW, Bob, KD8FLX and Chuck, K8CMP. We did not keep a separate list of loggers and I hope that we have been able to include them all here. A special thanks to Ken, AB8IE, who logged for me into the wee hours of the morning.

Operators

An important goal for the FD committee was to get more operators on the air. We had a great combination of long-time contesters and brand new hams operating this year.

PCARS members included in the list are Chuck, K8CMP, Jack, K8HGX, Terry, KB8AMZ, Tom, KB8UUZ, John, KC8KYW, Errol, KC8RJR, Jim, KC8PD, Bill, WB9LBI, Kathy, KD8FLW, Bob, KD8FLX, Ed, N8EQJ, Nick, N8WLE, Tom, WB8LCD, Rich, KD8FDK, and Dan, WD8DAU.

We also had guest operators, Glen, K8CZC, and Julie, KD8AYJ. Thanks to them for coming out and helping!

Results

The preliminary tally says a lot about how well our efforts paid off. Even though we only added one more station, we doubled our number of contacts over 2006. Our total point score should be about 60% higher than it was last year.

As mentioned above, we had three demonstration modes (only one in 2006) as well as the natural power QSO's (none last year.)

It was never our plan to be a highly competitive station but this year's results are outstanding and set a benchmark for us to exceed in 2008.

There was a never-ending supply of snacks and beverages and fresh hot coffee for the sleep deprived. If you went hungry at this event you just weren't paying attention.

From the ARRL Letter

Kenwood Purported to Merge with JVC in 2008

A consumer electronic magazine, This Week in Consumer Electronics (TWICE), reports that Kenwood has agreed to merge in 2008 with Victor Company of Japan (JVC) under a holding company. JVC is owned by

Matsushita Electric Industrial Company. Japan's Nikkei business newspaper reports that



the final details should be worked out by the end of the month, and that under the plan, Kenwood will buy 20 billion yen (\$161,469,466) in JVC shares as early as this summer, raising its stake to 13 percent. Matsushita will also sell part of its 52.7 percent of JVC to Kenwood's top shareholder, the Sparx Group. When JVC and Kenwood integrate operations under the holding company in 2008, Matsushita will sell the rest of its JVC shares to the holding company to complete the transaction. The holding company's stock will be listed instead of Kenwood and JVC, according to Nikkei. Combined, Kenwood's and JVC's sales are \$7.3 billion dollars annually for their fiscal year that ended March 31.

Ducie Island, VP6, DXpedition Gears Up

The Daily DX reports that the Ducie Island DXpedition Team, VP6DX, has been busy behind the scenes preparing for the much anticipated February 2008 DXpedition. It was also announced that the VP6DX team decided to extend the duration of the DXpedition. Plans are to depart Mangareva Island, part of the Gambier Islands in French Polynesia, via ship on February 5, 2008 and head for Pitcairn Island; this trip normally takes about 36 hours. The ops will spend a few hours on Pitcairn before taking another 36 hour trip boat ride to Ducie Island; they plan to arrive at sunrise on February 9, and hope to be up and running within 24 hours. The team needs to be back on Mangareva by March 3. If all goes well, including the weather, they will have VP6 on the air for as long as 19 days. There is a slight chance of a short visit to another uninhabited island if things on Ducie slow down. Henderson Island (also VP6, not a separate DXCC entity) is the only island on the way to and from Ducie Island.

FCC Dismisses Petitions for Rule Making

The FCC today granted requests to withdraw two Petitions for Rule Making (PRM) concerning "spectrum deregulation in the Amateur Service," as well as a vanity call sign request for a call sign outside the Commission parameters. In the Order, the FCC first granted a request to withdraw a PRM by the Communications Think Tank (CTT), filed June 20, 2005, that requested the FCC

"discontinue mandatory segmentation of emission modes and the activities using these modes in the Amateur Service, and substitute a voluntary system of coordination to achieve greater, and more efficient,

utilization of frequency allocations within the amateur radio bands." On November 6, 2006, CTT requested its PRM be withdrawn. On November 14, 2005, the ARRL requested the FCC "comprehensively modify the means by which the extremely varied emission modes in the Amateur Radio Service are developed, experimented with, implemented and regularly utilized in the course of normal Amateur Radio communications." On April 27, the ARRL

requested its petition be withdrawn. In the Order, the FCC agreed to drop both PRMs, saying they will take "no further action with respect to these petitions for rulemaking or the comments filed in response thereto." The Commission went on to say in the Order that both PRMs are "dismissed without prejudice," meaning the subject may be revisited at a later date.

Some Words From Weaver

More BPL Comes to Michigan -- and?

A California company has partnered with Consumer Energy of Central Michigan to provide BPL. The ultimate goal is to move BPL nationwide. The Michigan installation should not cause problems to amateur frequencies. Watchful waiting is the word for the day.

The coming system is scheduled to use Kaicom equipment and operate on 2-34 MHz. A review of the equipment by Ed Hare, W1RFI the ARRL Lab Manager, shows it contains notching so it can avoid QRMing all ham frequencies. Of course, proper operation of the equipment will be needed to avoid QRMing ham frequencies.

When improperly operated, the equipment can cause interference. However, in the spirit of watchful waiting, anyone who believes they are experiencing BPL QRM should be doubly cautious to avoid making unsupported

complaints against the system. We need to avoid damaging our own credibility.

As Dave Sumner, K1ZZ said, we must not "put ourselves in the position of the neighbor who complains about RFI when the tower goes up but before the transmitter is connected."
