Elliot made it clear that he sees the potential benefit to area scouts by having an amateur radio group that is willing to provide educational programs and activities for scouts. Not only does it enable them to learn more about electronic communications and work toward their Radio Merit Badge, but it can help them achieve the fundamental Boy Scout principle of being prepared.

Tom, WB9LBI, who is an Eagle Scout, will be taking the lead in developing PCARS relationship with the scouts. He would like to hear from any PCARS member who is or has been involved in scouting or who would like to get involved in scout activities. The first ever PCARS General Class upgrade course will begin on Wednesday, March 5th at 7:00 p.m. at the Center of Hope in Ravenna. The class is free for PCARS members and \$25.00 for non-PCARS members, although they also get a one year membership in PCARS as a bonus. We will be using the ARRL General Manual as the text for the course.

Anyone interested in the class should get in touch with me, or even show up on the first night of class if they don't make up their mind until then, and we will get them enrolled. The class instructors include, Rick, K8CAV, Bob, N8QE, Bill, WB9LBI, Deron, N8XTH, and Tom, WB8LCD. Thanks to all of them for their hard work.

The Winter edition of our Technician Course will conclude with a VE session on March 11th. This has been a tough class to teach since we lost two nights when the Maplewood Career Center closed due to adverse weather.

The Spring session will be meeting on Tuesdays at 7:00 p.m. starting on March 18th at Maplewood. The tuition is still only twenty dollars plus the cost of the Technician Ham Radio License Manual. Students can register as late as March 18th.

It is likely that we will only offer the Technician course in the Fall and Spring next year. Two sessions should be plenty and will also give the instructors a much needed breather.

The PCARS VE team continues its bimonthly testing at 10:00 a.m. on the first Saturday of every evennumbered month at the Center of Hope on West Main Street in Ravenna. The next session will be on April 5th. The VE sessions are open to everyone including walk-ins. You do not have to register in advance to take a test. See you at the March 10th meeting!

# Paper Chase

If you have received QSL cards, you may have enough to earn an award, you know it only takes 100 different countries for a DXCC or 100 different grids on VHF for a VUCC. In looking at the cards I have, the largest amount from outside of the United States come from Germany, 1-1/2" thick pile. What award/awards could I/you obtain from Germany?

Many German awards require the working of DOK's.



The DOK is the letter and number combination used by the DARC to identify regional radio clubs. The first letter is the district. and the next two numbers identify the respective club in the district. For example, DK4SY uses DOK P05. P is District the of Wuertemberg and 05 identifies the Radio Club of

Heilbronn. DOK P40 is another radio club in the same town. German stations are excellent at including this identifier on their QSLs, since a very important use is that of a QSL distribution system, whereby cards are sent to the respective clubs monthly. One is the: Goethe Award

The Goethe Award is issued by the DARC Division Ilmenau (DOK X30) in commemoration of the famous German writer Goethe The aim of the award is to contact regions or locations which were closely associated with the major events in his life. Earn 100 points after 1 Jan 1998. SWL OK. 3 classes: Shortwave, VHF/UHF and VHF/UHF including repeaters.

Each different station from the following DOK's = 5 points: X03, X04, X09, X11, X18, X19, X21, X22, X24, X30, X34, F05, F49, F57, S30, S31, S37, Z05, Z83 and Z91. Club stations from these DOK's = 10 points. Special event stations with special DOKs, = 20 points. No mode or band restrictions. CW contacts count double. At least one of the following club stations must be contacted: DL0WEI (X03), DK0TUI (X30), DF0TUI (X34), DA0HQ/DF0HQ (X34) or DL0RUD (X24).

Boy, February has been a really tough month – snow wise. Here in Parkman, we have been hammered a number of times in February. March is now upon us and I'm not sure if it will be any different. If you haven't already heard, gusting winds for two days in excess of 60 mph, vibrated my Mosley TA33 Sr. enough that it lost the 28' reflector. Fortunately for me, it landed flat on the ground cushioned by the snow so

that no apparent damage was done to the element. After talking to one of our members about Mosley I've antennas, made up my



mind to replace it with something slightly better. I know there are a lot of TA33 Sr.'s out there that are doing just fine, but I don't want to mess with replacing elements every year or so.

Even though I do not have a reflector, I was able to work both Ducie Island DXpedition and the DXpedition to Cocos Island. Not the usually strong reports I get but good enough to get the QSO logged and really that's what counts. There are some really good things coming up for both DX and IOTA especially.

As always, I'd like to thank the Northern Ohio DX Association, the Ohio/Penn DX PacketCluster, the 425 DXNews and the ARRL DX Newsletter for the fine work they do in gathering the DX information and making it available to us in various newsletters and web sites.

Please note that this report is only as good as the information being passed on by the various DX organizations. So there is always the chance that this report can contain some erroneous information due to the simple nature of either bad G-2 or busted call signs. So please keep to the old adage of "Work First Worry Later" (WFWL). And you might notice that some of the

information contained here is the same as last month. I have done this because the events have yet to happen.

#### DX

**5X, UGANDA** - G3RWF, will once again be active as 5X1NH from February 23 - March 22. Activity will be limited because he is on holiday. Activity will be on all bands except 160m and 6 meters. Modes will be CW, SSB, RTTY and PSK. He will use 100 watts and wire antennas. QSL via G3RWF.

**5Z4, KENYA**. Look for DL7DF, who will be at Diani Beach at the coastline of Kenya. He will be active as 5Z4HW from February 27th to March 11th. Activity will be on 160-10 meters, CW, SSB, RTTY and SSTV. Operations will be limited (holiday style). He will use an IC-735 and Linear TY900. Antennas will be a R7 vertical and 18m Tower for 160/80m. QSL via DL7DF, direct or by the DARC Bureau.

**6 METER CARIBBEAN DXpedition** - K7BV, from the Caribbean, but on 6 meters ONLY. Look for him to sign as V3/K7BV from Caye Caulker Island (NA-073, WW Loc. EK57XR), Belize, from June 20-26th, and as HK0/K7BV from San Andres Island (NA-033, WLOTA LH-2990, WW Loc EK92DM) between June 28th and July 6th. His equipment will be a FT-450 with ACOM-1000 amplifier, running 1KW into a 7 element and 3 element beam. The main frequency will be 50.106.2 MHz USB and /B. The pilot station will be Pat, W5OZI. QSL direct only to W1JJ (QRZ.com).

CY0, SABLE ISLAND. Here is a very interesting DX opportunity. The call signs for the 6 meter DXpediton planned in 2008 between June 25th - July 5th, have been announced. Look for Sable Island (NA-063, CISA NS-004) to be activated by VE3IKV, K5AND, W3CMP (No relation to yours truly), and W4TAA. Activity will be on CW and SSB. The fixed 6m station (in FN93) will use the call sign CY0X and CY0RA (for the portable station in GN03). The fixed station will use 800 watts into a 7 element beam up 40 ft. The portable 6m station in GN03 will have 100 watts into a 5 element beam up 30 ft. Other references are: Sable Island - East Lighthouse (ARLHS SAB-001, TWLHD WLH CY0-001, WLOTA:0758, WW Loc. GN03CX) and Sable Island - West Lighthouse (ARLHS SAB-002, TWLHD WLH CY0-002, WW Loc. FN93XW).

**DAYTON HAMVENTION DX DINNER BANQUET.** Jay, K4ZLE, announces that the SouthWest Ohio DX Association is pleased to sponsor the 23rd annual DX Dinner to be held in conjunction with the 2008 Dayton Hamvention. The dinner will be Friday evening, May 16th, at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, located in Dayton City Center. This is the same venue as in years past. The program details are not final yet, but they will have a good one. Although it should not be our main reason for attending, remember, attendees have a chance at some nice attendance prizes as well! Tickets are \$37.00 per meal, payable in U.S. funds to SWODXA. (Sorry, they do not process PayPal or Credit Card payments.) Please advise if you want a vegetarian meal when you order. You may order from Pete Meyer, N0FW, at his CBA with SASE. They will attempt to honor group-seating requests when tickets are ordered together. There is not a bad seat in the house, but seating is definitely limited. Come join them for an evening of fun and

fellowship. This was a very interesting event that yours truly attended last year and I recommend it. The program was very good, but the discussions around the dinner tables were a treat.

**S2, BANGLADESH** - KX7YT, will once again return to Dhaka as S21YV. He will be there between January 24th and March 11th. He plans to be active in the CQ WW RTTY WPX Contest (February 9-10th) as a Single-Op/All-Band entry and also the ARRL DX SSB Contest (March 1-2nd) as a Single-Op/All-Band entry. QSL via KX7YT.

**T6, AFGHANISTAN** (6/2m EME). Ross, ex-VK1UN / VK8UN, 4W6UN and EX1UN, active as T61AA from Faizabad for possibly 2 years. Reports he has been on 20 meters SSB (PLEASE SEND QSNs). Ross is expected to be active soon on 6/2 meters EME from Afghanistan (MM57). He is using an IC-7000 into a Tokyo Hi-Power HL-1.5KFx Amp for HF/6m and also a new Acom for HF/6m. Ross is currently using a 2x8 element antenna on 2 meters but plans to increase the size as weather permits. His operations are good for DXCC. QSL via T61AA: Ross Ballantyne, PO Box 99, World Trade Centre, Victoria 8005, Australia.

**ZA, ALBANIA** - F4DTO will be active from Elbassan, Central Albania, under the call sign ZA/F4DTO, between April 22nd and May 3rd. Activity will be on 20/17/10 meters SSB with an emphasis on 10 meters. They will be using a FT100 w/100 watts into a Wave vertical on 10m and dipoles on other bands. QSL only direct.

#### **IOTA**

**2J/MJ, JERSEY**. 2E0WMG (2J0WMG) and M0MJH (MJ0MJH) will be active from Jersey (EU-013) between March 20-26th. They also hope to activate Les Minquiers Reef (EU-099) during their trip. QSL via their home call signs

**5R, MADAGASCAR** (AF-013). F4DBJ, will be active as 5R8HT from Ivato between March 30th and April 17th. His bands and modes of activity were not provided, but it was reported that he plans to activate Nattes Island (AF-090).

**FR, REUNION** (AF-016). Look for F5HIJ, to be active as FR/F5HIJ from Bernica, near Saint-Paul, between March 3-31st. He will use a FT-897 and 2x20m dipole. It is suggested to look for him during his evenings between 1800-2000z

**FH, MAYOTTE** (AF-027). DK7LX, will be active as FH/DK7LX from June 11-23rd (2008). Activity will be mostly CW on all bands with an emphasis on 80/40/30 meters. Operation will be holiday style, using vertical arrays as well as dipoles. More details will become available in 2008 and look for updates on his Web page at:

**FJ, ST. BARTHELEMY** (NA-146). Members of the RZS Amateur Radio Club (W2RZS) are currently finalizing plans to operate from the new DXCC entity of St. Barthelemy for the upcoming CQ WW WPX SSB Contest (March 29-30th).

**H4, SOLOMON ISLANDS**. DL2GAC, will be active as H44MS from Honiara, on Guadalcanal Island (OC-047, it will also count for WLOTA LH-0086) between March 5th and April 27th. Look for Bernhard to confirm all QSL cards via the bureau or direct after his return home.

**HF0, SOUTH SHETLANDS** (AN-010). SP3GVX, has been on King George Island since November 2007. He is at the Polish "Henryk Arctowski Antarctic Station" managed by Polish Academy of Science (Institute of Antarctic Biology). At the moment he has many duties to perform, but he should soon be active as HF0POL. This is his 4th time there, and he is going to be there the whole year during 2008. His QSL manager is the same as last time: Tom, SP3WVL

**NA-076 - AA8LL**, will be active as AA8LL/4 from Cedar Key, FL, February 2-5th. Activity will be holiday style on 40-15 meters, mostly CW on the IOTA frequencies and RTTY. He will try to get K8LIZ/4 (his XYL) to operate some SSB. QSL direct or by the bureau to AA8LL. Logs will also be uploaded to the LoTW.

OC-164 - VK6HZ, will be active as VK6ARI from Rottnest Island (WLOTA LH-2197), March 27 to April-3rd. This will be a holiday style operation using an IC-7000 on SSB, PSK and RTTY, possibly CW. Antenna will be a Buddipole. Activity will be around the usual IOTA frequencies. He will also be active during the CQWW WPX SSB Contest (March 29-30th). Look for him to be active on the 17/12 meters bands before and after the contest. Online logs will be available during his operation at: http://www.vk6hz.com Logs will also be uploaded LoTW. QSL is via VK6NE.

**PJ4, NETHERLAND** ANTILLES. NOVD, will be active from Bonaire (SA-006) as PJ4/NOVD between March 1-8th. This is primarily a business trip so activity will be as time permits. QSL to W3HNK. Kelly is working on building a DX/Contest rental QTH on Bonaire.

Again, there was much more to report, but not enough space, so get on the air and work some DX. And please, please don't forget to let me know. I will post your call and the DX you work in the next news letter. Until next month, this is Charlie the Tuner saying, 73 and gud DX to u.

Most logging programs now support the Cabrillo format. If yours does not, check to see if there is an upgrade for your program. If you do not have a logging program, CT is now freeware and is available from http://www.klea.com/. You can also find more

information at <a href="http://www.cqwpx.com/logs.htm">http://www.cqwpx.com/logs.htm</a>. Also if you only make a few contacts you can enter them by going to <a href="http://b4h.net/cabforms/">http://b4h.net/cabforms/</a>.

If you do not know what the CQ World Wide Contest is, it is contest in which you try to work as many stations as you can with as many different Prefixes. In our club alone, we have thirteen prefixes locally. The contest covers 160-10 meters, so if you are technician remember you can get on ten meters from 28.300-28.500.

If you would like to start to work on your DXCC, this is one of the contests that helps build your total as people go all over the world to get distinct call signs. But most important, on the CLUB line of the Cabrillo format make sure it reads CLUB: Portage County Amateur Radio Service.

# The QRPARCI Fireside SSB Sprint

For the second year in a row, I decided to participate in the 2008 Fireside SSB Sprint contest on February 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2008. While most of you were getting ready for the Super Bowl, I was getting ready to operate as a portable



station. This year I mounted my PAC-12 antenna on the south side of the house and operated off of a folding table by the windows in our dining room. I figured that would

be a little bit better logistically than last year when I operated off the kitchen table. Good call! I set up my FT-817 to operate off battery power, got the logging software for the contest downloaded and working. Then it was wait till 4:00 PM local for the start of the 4 hour operating sprint!

Just like last year, 4:00 PM local is just about the time that the foreign SW broadcasters start to show up on the 40 meter band (my band of choice). About 4 minutes into the contest, I made my first contact – KC8PD from Ravenna, OH! It was rough copy, but we were able to get it done on both ends, and Jim is another QRPARCI member, so that meant 5 points instead of just 2 for the contact! My next contact was WB9GKZ from Green Bay, WI. He gave me a solid 55 and we chatted for about 8 minutes. At 4:27 I snagged my 3<sup>rd</sup> contact, KA1DWX, from Kent County Delaware. He was running about 300 watts, working the DE QSO

Party – points for both of us! By now the BC QRM was getting pretty obnoxious. It wasn't until 6:08 that I made my  $4^{th}$  contact , AI4QT in Huntsville, AL. Again, he gave me a solid 55 and we chatted for about 10 or 15 minutes. At 7:40 PM I made my  $5^{th}$  and final contact – N4TIE in NC! That was the highlite of my afternoon, thanks for pulling me out of the QRM, Carl.

So, in 4 hours, running QRP SSB, I made a total of 5 contacts (3 more than I had made last year!), I had a lot of fun, and I emptied quite a few "807's" in the process. Because I operated in the "portable" class, my total score was 5065. By the time I finished cleaning up and

#### **EmComm**

This story was posted on the ARRL web site on February 26th and is reprinted here with their permission. This event provided a great deal of insight into the future of emcomm and the benefit of cooperation between amateur radio and MARS and the various served agencies.

#### **State Agency Calls Army MARS into Action**

The Tennessee Emergency Management Agency (TEMA) called Army Military Affiliate Radio System (MARS) into action as tornados swept across the Southeastern United States February 5-6. According to



Army MARS Chief Stuart Carter, "For the first time as far back as we can remember, a state government called for MARS deployment in response to an actual emergency. The resulting teamwork and use of Army MARS Winlink capability gave

TEMA its only e-mail link during President Bush's visit to the storm-stricken area." At least 70 messages were sent during the state operation ranging from casualty figure updates and signal reports to staff rosters and photos.

TEMA's Chief of Communications David Wolfe, WA4VVX (MARS call sign AAR4CY), said, "Although there was no commercial power at the deployment site, TEMA's communications infrastructure was fully operational. Both the VHF high band and 800 MHz repeater systems had good coverage for voice command and control. Our shortage was Internet connectivity, and our unmet needs were e-mail and the ability to send pictures. MARS Winlink provided exactly what was not available by any other means."

Carter said that this event illustrates the importance of detailed preparation and training that has taken place during realistic disaster response exercises over the past several years. "In the case of Tennessee, the story goes back a year and a half. Steve Waterman, K4CJX (MARS call sign AAA9AC) began working with Wolfe in late 2006, preparing for just such a deployment. At the time, Army MARS was just beginning to adopt the Winlink 2000 radio e-mail network system, and with the assistance of the then-Tennessee State Director Paul Drothler, WO4U (MARS call sign AAV4DJ), Army MARS had just signed a Memorandum of Understanding with TEMA. This MOU just served to strengthen an already strong relationship between TEMA and Army MARS. Wolfe led TEMA staffers who were already hams to becoming MARS members and to become qualified MARS Winlink 2000 operators. The rest of Wolfe's team soon obtained their Amateur Radio and Army MARS licenses."

The next step, according to Carter, was joint training for TEMA staff and Tennessee Army MARS members. Some was classroom training followed up with extensive field training. The culmination of the field training was TNCAT07, a massive exercise that included the Central United States Earthquake Consortium (CUSEC), an eight-state alert consortium along the New Madrid fault line. This exercise also included the participation by ARRL Amateur Emergency Radio Service (ARES), Civil Air Patrol (CAP) and other EmComm services that clearly demonstrated interoperability between TEMA, Tennessee Army MARS, the Amateur Radio community and other municipal communications services.

"To make a long story short," Carter said, "we now have seen a demonstration of seamless collaboration between Army MARS and one of our supported agencies under 'Real World' emergency conditions. This was the first Army MARS deployment since the Katrina/Rita disasters two years ago. Successfully meeting the challenge involved deployment readiness on the part of our members, and it required total Winlink 2000 mobility. First of all came the building of relationships with existing and potential customers, and

then came meticulous training of state and federal staffers, and frequent exercising at home and in the field. With this pattern of established collaboration between our customers and MARS members, we enter the new era of Army MARS Emergency communications support."

### Some Words From Weaver

#### 8th Region Incoming QSL Bureau - 2007

8th Region Incoming QSL bureau Manager Jay Slough, K4ZLE has summarized the activity of this Bureau for 2007. He and the Letter Sorters in 8-land received and redistributed approximately 89,028 overseas QSL cards over the year. This figure compares with 111,734 in 2006, 110,905 in 2005, 138,236 in 2004 and 154,054 handled in 2003. The effect of the bottom of the sun cycle is evident.

Regardless of the lower number of cards processed this past year, the gang at the 8th Region Bureau did a splendid job. This job will start to become larger for the next several years as the new cycle begins to show itself and grows in strength.

I want to thank Jay for his excellent leadership of the Bureau, and for the great work of the letter sorters who have supported him and the Bureau.

Incidentally, the 8th Region Bureau serves only the amateurs who have 8s in their call signs. At one time, of course, this was amateurs in Michigan, Ohio and West Virginia. Now, an amateur's incoming Bureau is the one that has the same number in its name as the amateur's call sign, regardless of where the amateur lives.

Following this format, 4-land amateurs use the 4th Region Bureau.

#### What to do when someone becomes a SK

It is not necessary ". . . to mail the physical license (ed. to the FCC) but the next of kin should contact the

FCC with either a death certificate or obituary and letter asking the license be cancelled." Among other reasons for this, it prevents a pirate from stealing the call and using it with impunity until the term of the call expires.



The second action to take is to notify the ARRL Silent Key Administrator (sk@arrl.org). This notification should include a copy of the obituary or

other means to establish the accuracy of the report and the call sign.

Why the need to confirm the report? I think it was W. C. Fields who one time said, "The report of my death has been greatly exaggerated." The fact is that none of us wishes to be involved in reporting the death of a friend or acquaintance when they have not died!

In the case of ARRL members, their loved ones are eligible to receive QST and other ARRL periodicals, if they wish, that had been going to the SK.

#### Members only choices

This is just a reminder that there are a number of epublications and forms of messages that are available to ARRL members. Essentially all of these are opt-in or opt-out depending on one's preference. Go to Members Only at arrl.org to make your selections -- in or out. I certainly hope you continue to opt-in on receiving these messages from me as well as from your Section Manager.

Of particular noteworthiness is the fact that HQ on fairly rare occasion partners with outside companies that provide services of value to amateurs. When this happens, you are likely to receive an e-mail from HQ that promotes the partnership. You can opt-in or opt-out of receiving these messages.

# **Dollar Store Magnetic Stickers**

As what I consider to be a frugal but enterprising amateur radio operator (ahem... aka a cheap ham) I am always on the lookout for items that are useful at a good

price. In a recent trip to the local dollar store I stumbled upon a product that was both.

It was pink and sealed in a cellophane sealed package

and simply said "Create Magnetic Photos with Ease." It's distributed by a company called Greenbrier International, Inc. of Chesapeake, VA 23320. Simply put: It is a 10" x 12" sheet of plastic magnetic material with adhesive on one side. I paid a mere \$1 a sheet.



With my PCARS membership this year I received my bumper sticker and couldn't figure out where I wanted to use it. With my new found magnetic material, my problem was solved.

The instructions asked that you trim your picture (or PCARS STICKER) to the desired shape and cut a piece of magnetic material to the same approximate size. Peel off the magnet's backing and then apply to the back of the cutout. You finish by trimming the magnetic material more precisely.

I would suggest taking the backing material off of both the magnetic material AND your PCARS sticker.

When I created my magnetic PCARS sticker, I also

did three other items, and even had room to place one of my business cards. I saved a few of the leftovers and



replaced the backing material for future small projects.

I had great luck using another dollar store \$1 item in trimming my stickers with a device made by Fiskars which is used to cut photos and paper. (Pictured below.) It did a fine job on trimming the magnetic material.

I bet hams could come up with all kinds of items they might like to put magnetic backing on. How about your QSL card, a copy of your license or even a frequency chart? These items stick great on file cabinets, refrigerators, tool boxes – or a host of other metal surfaces. Your biggest problem might actually be finding metal on your automobile!

#### Ham License Plates Wanted

Don't have ham radio call plates on your vehicle? Well for those of you in Ohio, you can get the plates sent to you by going to any License Bureau office and filling out the special plate registration form. It costs you about \$19 the first time for the bureau fee, mailing fee, and Amateur Radio plate fee. In about 2 weeks or so, the plates come in the mail.

When your Amateur Radio plates need to be renewed, you can (for about a \$7 fee) get NEW plates issued (same call sign). Then you'll have an old plate to bring in to get hung up as a permanent part of PCARS history!!



# 200 Megabyte Morse Code Course

"Here, take this CD," said the woman at the Mansfield hamfest. I hadn't asked her for anything; I was just walking by. She was presiding over a table of club information, ARRL information, and (I swear I am not making this up) mammography brochures. "This CD" turned out to be the K7QO Morse Code Course. Is there something in my face that tells strangers I'm a CW guy? Freaky...

Anyway, I took it home and gave it a spin. Chuck K7QO has put together a program that includes 20 hours of MP3 files, that will take you from zero to 30 words per minute if you stick with it. There are over 500 audio files in all.

Chuck's method starts out with an audio file with the Letter A and nothing else. The second file is Letter B, and the third is a combination of the two. He then introduces Letters C and D in their own files, followed by an exercise of Letters A-C. The course continues in this pattern for the entire alphabet.

Next come common two-letter words, followed by three, then four-letter words. It isn't long before you are copying entire QSO's. Starting around Lesson 91, the course switches over to text files where you start to work on building up speed.



The companion 17-page manual, in PDF format, recommends that you obtain a spiral notebook, a gel pen, and write down the entire course in (I swear I am not making this up) cursive handwriting! The author maintains that this is the only way you can write fast enough above 20 WPM. He also claims this will improve your penmanship, which you desperately need. The whole course weighs in at over 200 Mb of files, which explains why I can't locate a download site for this course. Nobody wants to shell out the money required for that kind of internet bandwidth. The FISTS CW organization (www.fists.org) will send you a CD if make a donation. If you'd like to try the course, the documentation and first 100 audio files are downloadable from www.kl7kc.com/codecourse.htm. If you like it, I'll burn a copy of my CD for you.

My impression is that even if you already know Morse Code, the practice files make an excellent tool to hone your code speed. Take the practice text files starting at the speed at which you're comfortable, load them on to your office PC or MP3 player, and practice anytime you get a few minutes. Contesters, take note.

K7QO seems to be a man of many talents. The code course manual includes the following statement: "I find that CW operation and especially contest operation helps me to concentrate for longer periods of time. I play poker tournaments where I may have to sit and concentrate or several hours at a time before a break comes along. Look for me on ESPN starting in July 2007 in one of the shows."

I swear I'm not making that up, either.
