ARRL Ohio Section Manager Joe Phillips, K8QOE, (SK) Joe Phillips, K8QOE, who served as ARRL

Ohio Section Manager Joe Phillips, K800E (SK)

Ohio Section Manager since 1998, passed away suddenly at his home on Saturday, June 20. He was 68. Licensed in 1959 as KN9SYL, Phillips first joined the ARRL Field Organization as an Official

Emergency Station (OES) in 1986. He became a Public Information Officer in 1989 and has served as an Official Observer (OO) since 1997. He was elected Ohio Section Manager in 1998.

A graduate of Youngstown University, Phillips had a career as a journalist and a teacher. He edited six separate ham radio newsletters in Cincinnati before becoming Newsletter Editor for the Ohio Area Repeater Council in 1984, a position he held for five years. In 1986, Phillips organized the first Ohio Repeater Directory and in 1992, organized the Ohio Section Ham Radio Newsletter Contest. He authored a weekly ham radio newspaper column in the Sunday edition of the Cincinnati Enquirer called "Ham Call" and hosted a similarly named program for cable television in the Cincinnati area.



In 1994, Phillips was elected to the Greater Cincinnati Amateur Radio Hall of Fame, and in 1995, he was the recipient of the ARRL's McGan Silver Antenna Award. This award is given annually to a League member who demonstrates outstanding public relations success on behalf Amateur Radio at the local,



state or national level. Phillips was excited about having his photo on the cover of the May 2009 issue of QST featuring the annual Dayton Hamvention.

"Throughout a 40-year friendship, Joe and I worked closely together on many occasions," said ARRL Great Lakes Division Director Jim Weaver, K8JE. "From his early days of supporting the county ARES/RACES unit and the Ohio Repeater Council, Joe has always provided energetic and effective leadership with a friendly, personal touch. The magnetism of his style of leadership drew the best from others who soon became solid friends, not mere associates."

ARRL Membership and Volunteer Programs Manager Dave Patton, NN1N, remembered Phillips fondly: "If you have been to Dayton you have met and laughed with Joe. He was the master of the Wouff Hong ceremony. His red jacket is the stuff of legend in Ohio. Joe was more than a Section Manager -- he really gave all of himself to ARRL for 20-plus years. With him dies the last paper newsletter sent to section membership. When I answered his phone calls, he announced his call with 'Here's your Ohio Nightmare.' He loved baseball, maybe more than I did. He was a good man, and he is really going to be missed."

You will recall each year I mention the Route 66 Special Event. This year we have a new special event that follows the same pattern. It is an event to contact all the states that made up the original 13 Colonies.

Starting on July 1st to July 5th, all thirteen 1776 original colonies will be on the air. One to several Special

Event stations per Colony. A magnificent full color certificate printed on heavy card stock with a map and the state flags of all the 1776 colony states adorn this award. You can work one state or all 13 and be eligible for the certificate. Each colony state worked will be marked by the shield of the United States . Also a special "recognition" logo will be affixed if you worked all 13 stations.

Special event call signs will be K2A through K2M. All modes of operation should be represented-SSB, CW, RTTY Etc. The mode of operation is up to the individual colony state station. All bands will be used except the WARC bands and 60 meters. The Colony stations will be operating on or near the"13" of each band (Example: 14.213, 14.013,14.313, 7.213, 7.013,



etc.). 2 meters and 6 meters are encouraged. Why? the special event stations are on the east coast and are very close to each other. It will be harder for these states to contact each other, also 40m-160m is encouraged because of this. The Special Event will begin July 1st at 1300 and end July 5th at 0400 UTC.

Each operator is to send a contact log stating the Date, UTC, Band and call sign of each contact, along with your QSL card and \$4.00 US. PLEASE NO STAMPS.. NO SASE required. We will furnish postage, certificate and 9"x12" envelope via 1st class mail. The certificate will NOT be folded.

K2A (NY-KU2US) will issue a special event QSL card for a QSO with K2A for those Operators that request one in lieu of the certificate. SASE Please for QSL card only.

All award requests and payment are to be sent and made out to the award manager- Ken Villone, KU2US - P. O. Box 185 - Conesus, NY 14435.

It is hoped this special event will become annual event. This is going to be fun, and hopefully the propagation gods will be co-operative and I will hear you in the pile-ups.

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EmComm

One of the best ways to develop and maintain emergency communication skills is to participate in public service events. You may be deployed to a service site in the field to set up and operate a portable station. What better way to find out whether your go-kit has the necessary gear and supplies? How often do you get that equipment out and actually make sure that it is functioning properly?

Plus the events can be a lot of fun. You will likely get to meet and work with hams that you would not have otherwise known. The operating conditions are usually not that bad and there is certainly less pressure than you will find during disaster relief activities. And hey, what the heck, you may end up with a free t-shirt, too.

Locally we have had a couple of good recent examples of well run public service events and those include the 2009 CVS Cleveland Marathon and the American Diabetes Association's Tour de Cure.

Gay Wands, WB8VNO, does a great job of independently organizing ham radio communications for public service events, including the Cleveland Marathon. The team that organizes the marathon has turned to Gay for assistance with other events such as the upcoming Headwaters Adventure Race on July 11th and the Black Squirrel Adventure Triathlon.

For the marathon (which also included a half-marathon and separate 10K race) Gay pulled together around two dozen hams who were assigned to water stops and strategic locations on the course, as well as to the lead and SAG vehicles and as shadows to race officials. Around a half dozen or so PCARS members volunteered for the marathon.

Gay kept busy as the net control station operating stationary mobile from a spot near the start/finish line. Since the race route was kept open for seven hours for the last stragglers that makes a long day for her.

Closer to home, Walt Heeney, N8LJM, the recently appointed EC for Summit County ARES, recruited over fifty hams from five counties to assist with communications for the Tour de Cure. The TDC is a bicycling event that had five different routes: 100K, 50K "difficult", 50K "moderate", 25K, and a family fun ride. All of the rides began and finished at Blossom Music Center with the family ride take entirely on the Blossom grounds.

Communications were required for the first four routes which overlapped in some locations. The one hundred kilometer ride (also known as a "century" and is 62 miles long) was no bargain for the riders. Neither

was the 50K "difficult." Nothing like having to ride out of the Cuyahoga Valley!

There were two parallel nets, one on a two meter repeater and the other on a 70

cm repeater, each with its own net control. All participants were assigned to one or the other of the nets as their primary with the other as a secondary. The NCS's were located at the Akron General Medical Facility just east of State Route 8. Like the marathon, communication volunteers were strategically placed on the courses as well as with medical units, SAG and supply vehicles, plus two on motorcycles, two on scooters and one on a bicycle who kept track of the riders on the course.

In the photos you can see Bob, NT8K, waiting for some action at his post down in the valley; Rex, NX8G sitting by the stop sign to which he conveniently

lashed his antenna mast; and Bob, K8AAB, ducking into some shade at the Blossom command post. Robert, KD8GWY, was out on the course and I couldn't get a shot of him.

Lots of credit goes to Walt, N8LJM, for his organizational and recruiting efforts for this event and his willingness to gather volunteers from the region. Summit County ARES and RACES will surely benefit from having Walt at the helm and we look forward to working with him.

So keep you eyes open for the announcements about future area public service events and don't hesitate to jump in and give it a try. It is a great way to remind our neighbors of the helpful role that ham radio can play in their community.

Editor's Note: Army Achievement Medal: Description: A Bronze octagonal medal, 1 1/2 inches in diameter, with one angle at the top centered. On the obverse is a design consisting of the elements of the Department of the Army (DA) plaque and the date "1775" at the bottom. On the reverse, in three lines, are the words "FOR MILITARY

ACHIEVEMENT" above a space for inscription and below there are two slips of laurel. The Army Achievement Medal is awarded to any member of the Armed Forces of the United States, or to any member of the Armed Forces of a friendly foreign nation, who while serving in any capacity with the Army in a non-combat area on or after 1 August 1981, distinguished himself/ herself by meritorious service or achievement of a lesser degree than required for award of the Army Commendation Medal. On 10 April 1981, the Secretary of the Army approved establishment of the decoration.

The Fraternity of Hams

I grew up on the west side of Cleveland, in a little town called Parkview (which was later annexed into the city of Fairview Park). All my friends and family called me T.R. - my initials for my first and second name – Thomas Ralph. I'm told I was a scrawny, skinny kid, and my parents worried that I might not fill out, but I've proven them wrong on that one!

The Hillman's lived right behind us, with Steve and Nick who were one and two years younger than me. We were good friends, and played baseball and football together with a bunch of other kids in the neighborhood. But their house was different. It had tall towers outside with big antennas on top. There were rooms in the

basement we had to keep out of, and a room off the kitchen called a "shack" that we had to stay out of too. Occasionally I could hear strange noises and learned that Mr. Hillman was a ham radio operator (W8FZS, SK), although I wasn't too sure what that meant. Our parents would participate in the games with us (mostly the baseball games) and I remember that Mr. Hillman shortened my name and just called me T.

At some point I heard about and decided that I wanted to build a crystal radio set. I had a magazine article that described a set built into a cigar box. The only part I was able to come up with on my own was the cigar box, so my parents suggested I go talk to Mr. Hillman and maybe he could help me. He took me downstairs into one of the rooms



in the basement the kids were not allowed in, it was unlike anything I'd ever seen before! (Think Bobby, WB8FEW's basement, but not quite as modern) There were radios, test equipment, parts, and then lots more of each! I could hear people talking from the speakers, and every once in awhile Mr. Hillman would talk back to them. As that was going on, Mr. Hillman picked up some parts, started wiring them together, soldering, and talking to the guys on the radio, all at the same time. He had looked at the magazine with the plans in it for about two seconds, then never gave it another look. About a half hour later I walked home with a working

crystal radio set, built in a cigar box, with a set of headphones. I also had a sense of awe at how it was put together without looking at the plans, and an interest in radio and hams that has never passed.

Mr. Hillman was always available to me as a kid to explain about radio, and more specifically ham radio. My parents were supportive, and I still have the Knight Kit Span Master regenerative receiver my dad helped me build in 1964 (I was 11 years old then), but unfortunately, just good memories of the first communications receiver they later bought for me, a Hammarlund HQ-110. Even though we had just moved to Aurora, Mr. Hillman gave me the Novice test around the end of 1967, and I got the call sign WN8AAB. Shortly after we were going to some sort of a ham function, I don't remember what it was, but I do remember that I started to say something with "Mr. Hillman....." and I got stopped short. I was told, now that I was a ham, there was no more "Mr. Hillman" and I could just refer to him as "Stan".

That was probably one of the most significant moments in my life as a ham. I was now part of a special group and had been accepted as one of their own. To this day, I consider my ham radio ticket as a membership certificate in a very special fraternity. Most of my best friends have been hams through high school and college, my business partner is a ham, and I've almost always been active as a ham.

PCARS is responsible for ramping up my interest and involvement in the last few years, and I consider you

all my best friends in the world! About six months ago, on a Thursday night PCARS net, someone said hello to Jenny. Then another one did and then another. I had no idea what the heck was going on here. I found out later that Jenny had found a PCARS list with email address' on it and had spent the day emailing everyone on the list asking them to say HI to her on the net! Saying HI to Jenny on the net pretty much became a regular thing to do, and I'm not sure why, but I asked her if she would like to be in the Spring Tech class and she said she would! After the first few classes she started taking the practice tests online. When the last night of class came, Jenny was passing some, and not passing some. We were both disappointed when she didn't make it. But, the next PCARS VE session was just around the corner, Jim, KC8PD, gave her some good encouragement, and she kept practicing. The night before the VE session I knew she was going to make it.

After she had taken the exam, the CSCE was handed to me to have her sign. I put it down in front of her and

told her to sign it. She thought I was having her sign another form 605 so she could take the test again! When I told her she had passed, the first time, I think she was more surprised than anyone! Since then there have been a lot more big smiles. I had picked up a handi-talkie for her at Dayton, and gave that to her as soon as we got home from the VE session. Her callsign, KD8LIR, showed up and she was on the air, on her own radio.

Knowing the handi-talkie with just the rubber duck isn't the ideal situation from the basement she asked what she should do. Without even thinking about it, I told her to just use my radio.

I probably never expected I would ever say that to her, and I'm pretty sure she never expected to hear it from me. But it was one of those moments, just like when Stan told me

I didn't need to call him "Mr. Hillman" anymore. We have a different relationship now. We're still father and daughter, but now we're more - we're fellow hams.

Skywarn Update

Thankfully so far this year our weather hasn't been too bad when one considers what has been happening in other parts of the country. With summer now upon us and days being longer and warmer, increased vigilance is a must!

Most recently a Skywarn net was needed on the evening of June 1st around 11 PM with thunderstorms moving through the southern part of the county. Although nothing of consequence happened, trained spotters checked in on 145.390 for about 30 minutes just in case something did. Your efforts so late at night are much appreciated.

Severe weather was once again in our area on both June 16th and 19th in the form of tornado watches and warnings as well as severe thunderstorm activity. While in only adjacent counties, it stresses the need to be "Storm Ready" in case those storms decide to take a turn in our direction. I monitored the Skywarn nets in Tuscarawas, Carroll and Columbiana counties on those evenings and believe me, they had their hands full. Consider that from June 16th when Tornado Watch 442 was issued for Tuscarawas and Carroll counties to Severe Thunderstorm Watch 482 on June 19th for the same counties, there had been 40 watch/warnings issued nationwide over those two days. Certainly the ability to detect and predict severe weather has taken a quantum leap from years past and our ability to safely and accurately report that weather must keep pace as well.



At this time I am asking all local ham radio operators who participate in Skywarn to provide me your location and National Weather Service spotter number if you have one. I am going to develop a database of those operators in order to reflect who is where specifically at any given time. You can email me your info at <u>WB8YYS@arrl.net</u>.

As always, if severe weather hits or is forecast and you wonder whether of not a Skywarn net has been called for our area, listen in to the 145.390 repeater for either an "A" or "W" on the squelch tail. In any event, I'm probably already on there anyway and can tell you what if anything is going on!

Hamfests

Overview

The term "hamfest" is short for "ham radio festival"... a place where you can go to meet other ham radio operators, make new friends, and renew old acquaintances, buy and sell new and used gear, take a license exam for a new or upgraded license, attend informative forums on various aspects of the hobby, and more. For those who have never attended one of these fun events, this page is a "brief guide to a hamfest".

Hamfests Big and Small

Hamfests can be as small as those hosted by one local club... or it can be a state, regional, or division

convention... or go all the way to the king of the hamfests, the Hamvention in Dayton, Ohio in mid-May. The latter has been termed "a 3 day ham radio orgy". Not to sound vulgar, but if you want to eat, sleep, and do whatever else as it relates to ham radio, Dayton Hamvention is the place to be.



Depending on the scope of the hamfest, there may be just a morning and early afternoon event... to lasting three full days, such as Dayton Hamvention.

Admission and parking fees... as well as to how big the parking areas and the event venues are... can vary widely, depending on the size of the event. Be sure to check with the contact persons for all the information noted on the specific hamfest website. You can find a list of upcoming hamfests at the ARRL Hamfest Database.

Getting to the Hamfest

There will usually be a "talk-in" frequency, to direct you to the hamfest site. Having run these in the past myself, you have to be sure to help visitors from out of the area to find the hamfest. The talk-in station should also have basic information about parking, admissions, testing, forums, prizes, etc.

Another thing to consider is if the hamfest is more than a one day event, are the accommodations where you will stay while in town. The Dayton Hamvention has such a **HUGE DEMAND** for rooms, that they usually **SELL OUT OVER A YEAR IN ADVANCE**, and the room rates are **NOT** cheap!!. In fact, the closest rooms may be as much as an hour or more away.

Most other hamfest venues and conventions will usually not have this "huge demand", but it's best to not wait until the last minute to book a room. Also, check the gasoline prices and locations in the area. You don't need to run out of gas, or have vehicle trouble going to or from the hamfest.

Once there, you may have to walk a great distance to, from, and at the event itself. So, if you have a disability, bear that in mind. Many places usually have parking for the disabled, but you need to have either a license plate or a special hang tag. The local police agencies **WILL** ticket and/or tow your vehicle, if you park in one of these spaces without authorization.

At the Hamfest

After you take care of parking and admission fees (bring cash, as most may not accept checks or credit cards), you're likely to see the following at a hamfest. Note that the bigger the event, the more of these there will be:

- 1) **Dealers**, that sell new gear, accessories, antennas, connectors, software, manuals, etc. If you buy computer hardware or software, be sure you scan it for viruses and spyware before using it.
- 2) Flea market tables, where you can usually get a good deal on used gear, that you couldn't afford new. However, the phrases "buyer beware", and "you get what you pay for", APPLY!! Unfortunately, some of the gear that is "sold" ends up as a "worthless boat anchor doorstop"... as the original owner may be wanting to "make some money off of a worthless item". Try to avoid purchasing "antique radios"...and "learn the smell of burnt or overheated electronics". Replacement parts for vintage gear, or where the electronics have been burned out, will be EXTREMELY DIFFICULT, if not IMPOSSIBLE, to obtain. If the hamfest has a "Test Bench", try the gear out BEFORE you shell out the money, write a check, use your credit card, etc... and, if the person won't let you test the gear before you purchase it, it's best that you POLITELY DECLINE their offer!! Remember, if the price is "too good to be true", it probably is.
- **3)** Forums, discussing any of several aspects of the hobby. There may also be an ARRL forum, where you can meet your State Section Manager, ARRL Division Director, or other officials from the ARRL.
- 4) VE Testing, where you can take an exam for a new ham radio license, or for a license upgrade. For an overview of what a test session may entail.
- **5**) **Concessions**, where the local club is selling food and drink, so you don't have to leave the hamfest site to grab a bite to eat, if you don't want to. Bear in mind that the menu is usually what you'll find at a ballgame (hamburgers, hot dogs, soft drinks, etc.). Restaurants are usually nearby, if you prefer to eat out, as it were.
- 6) Prize drawings, the main draw of the hamfest. The smaller prizes can be manuals, books, repeater directories, etc. -- while the big prizes can be HT's, mobile or HF rigs. You usually have to be present to win, except for maybe the grand prize.
- 7) Wouff Hong. If the event is an ARRL State, Section, or Division Convention, lasting for more than a day, there may be the Wouff Hong ceremony. This Secret Society, and its ceremony is a FUN part of the hobby... however, I can NOT go into the details as to what goes on... you have to experience it for yourself. I went through it at the 2007 ARRL Great Lakes Division Convention, and let's say that "a good time was had by all".
- 8) **DFing and Fox Hunting**. Sometimes there will be a "fox hunt" set up where you try to hone your direction finding skills, to locate a hidden transmitter... with the winner usually receiving a nice prize.
- 9) **Displays** of various emergency communications or other vehicles, related to amateur radio.



Conclusion

Hamfests can be termed as "family reunions", because as an amateur radio operator, you are part of a worldwide "family". While you may not be able to go to as many hamfests as you would like, go to the ones that you can attend. Many clubs that put these on use them as fundraisers for the expenses that their club incurs each year, with the repeaters, etc.

If you're licensed, bring your HT... especially if you're coming as a family or group, to keep track of folks. FRS Radios are available for those who aren't licensed... to keep track of those in your group... as it's easy to get lost among a large crowd of people. If you are a part of a club that puts these on, you'll find out in a hurry that there is a **LARGE AMOUNT OF VOLUNTEER WORK** to be done... before, during, and after the hamfest... and it takes a large commitment to make the hamfest a success. Whether you do Talk-In, Admissions, Concessions, Security, VE Testing, Forums, Parking, or something else... your offer to help will be greatly appreciated.

Sadly, many hamfests are disappearing, for a lack of people wanting to put in the effort to put on the hamfest in the first place. So, when you attend a hamfest, let the organizers know how you felt about it. While no hamfest is perfect (there are bound to be glitches), simple encouragement, and "constructive criticism" to those who work with it can help prevent those things from occurring at a future hamfest. Don't berate and lecture them as if they committed the unpardonable sin... this spirit of discouragement is one of the reasons that folks don't want to put on hamfests anymore... as if monetary costs (high gasoline prices, etc.) nowadays weren't enough of a deterrent to hamfests.

So, the future of the hamfest... and of the hobby of amateur radio is up to you. Do what you can to keep it alive... and be part of the solution... not part of the problem.

Since there is always the chance that this report can contain some erroneous information due to the simple nature of bad info or busted call signs, do yourself a favor and please adhere to the old adage of "Work First Worry Later" (WFWL).

DX News

4U1W/4U30, **AUSTRIA** (Special Event). The Vienna International Amateur Radio Club station, 4U1VIC, will be active using the following special event callsigns as follows: 4U30VIC - Between July and December to celebrate the Vienna International Centre's (UN building in Vienna) 30th anniversary. QSL via 4U1VIC: Amateur Radio Club, Vienna International Centre, P.O. Box 500, A-1400 Vienna, AUSTRIA. PLEASE NOTE: For DXCC purpose, all (including 4U1VIC) counts as Austria (OE)

5R8, MADAGASCAR (Update). Texas DX Society (TDXS) member, W5KDJ, will be active as 5R8KD from **Antananarivo** between July 4-17th. Activity will be on 160-6 meters using CW and RTTY. Wayne will also be active in the IARU Contest (July 11-12th) and operate from the shack of 5R8FU using his new TH-11-DX. QSL via his home callsign. Online log search will be available. Logs will be uploaded to LoTW and eQSL.

8R, GUYANA. The **6 Meter Beacon Project, Inc.**, is happy to announce a HF-50 MHz DXpedition here between June 16th and July 6th. Antenna for 6 meters will be a 6M7JHV yagi at 45 ft. on the Atlantic Ocean pointed towards EU and NA, and using a 3CPX800A7 amp. Activity will be split between two teams: 11 days will be by W3CMP and N3DB, the other 11 days by K4RX and AC4TO. They hope to get some decent openings to, amongst other places, Northern EU, 5B/4X and W6/W7. They expect to have internet access most of the time. Operating frequencies and Web site will be announced at a later date.

9A09, CROATIA (Special Event). Members of the Djurdjevac Radio Club will activate special event station 9A09P (Nine Alpha ZERO NINE Papa) between now and December 31st. Activity is to celebrate the city of Djurdjevac, and operations will be on all bands and modes. A special QSL card will be issued with the city's story on it. Under the new administrative division of Croatia, Djurdjevac gained the status of a city only in 1997. All QSOs will be confirmed automatically via the Bureau.

9J, ZAMBIA. YO4HEK, will be here for one year and will be active as 9J2YO. Activity will be on all bands using CW, SSB, and PSK31. Over the past week Gabriel has been very active on 40/30 meters between 1700-2030z. QSL via YO4ATW.

9M2, WEST MALAYSIA – (**Reminder**) EA4ATI, is working now in Malaysia. He has been issued the call sign 9M2TI and will be operating from Kuala Lumpur city. Using a vertical antenna with 400 watts, look for Dani to be active on 40/20/15/10 meters using CW and SSB. He also mentions that he will participate in the main international contests (like the CQ WPX) from a different location with a better station. Dani will stay in Malaysia for at least one year. QSL via his home callsign.

E51, SOUTH COOK ISLANDS (Update). G4KIU, now active as E51SC from the Island of Rarotonga (OC-013), is expected to

be active on 80-10 meters mainly on SSB, RTTY, PSK31 and with some CW. Nigel announced this past week he will be an entry in the RSGB IOTA Contest (July 25-26th) as a Single-Op. Direct QSLs are to be sent to: Nigel Peacock, P.O. Box 880, Rarotonga, Cook Islands (via New Zealand). Please send a SAE, plus 2 USDs or 2 new style IRCs. Any direct cards received without the above items will be returned via the Bureau. Bureau QSLs go to: E51SC via G4KIU/RSGB. **IMPORTANT** There is no QSL Bureau in the Cook Islands. Cards without G4KIU on them will NOT be received. Please "DO NOT" send direct cards to any G4KIU address in England - they will NOT arrive. All E51SC contacts will be loaded to LoTW about once a week. He does not use e.QSL at all.

JT1/JT4, MONGOLIA (Update). A research team is currently in JT-land on a Mongolian Vertebrate Parasite Project (MVPP). The team has been assigned two club call signs for two different regions in Mongolia. While in Ulaanbaatar (and north of the Gobi region), they will use the call sign JT1N. In the Gobi region they will use the call sign JT4N. Their host in Ulaanbaatar is Naran, JT1BV. It is recommend to watch 20 meters (14190 kHz after 1030z). At the end of May, they will be doing field work in and around the Gobi Gurvan Saikhan National Park in southern Mongolia through August. QSL via KC0KHA.

KH4, MIDWAY ISLAND. It was announced this past week by N4XP and WB4JTT that "A multi-national team of 19 operators will activate Midway Island in October 2009. The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (USF&WLS) has authorized amateur operation from this rare U.S. entity for only a 10 day period, its first radio activity in almost 10 years. Midway Island ranks number 24 worldwide and number 13 in Europe on the DX Magazine's "Most Wanted List". Activity will be on 6 meters to 160 meters with 5 to 6 stations. At least one station will be active on 20 meters around the clock for those who need it for a new country. Major efforts will be made to meet the demand to the most needed geographical areas, the low bands and RTTY.

VK0B, ANTARCTICA - VK0BP, is currently working at Antarctic Davis Base Station (**AN-016, Gridsquare MC81xk**) until November 1st. His activity is limited due to his workload, but he is expected to be on all HF bands. However, due to local scientific experiments certain bands may be un- available at times. He seems to like 20 meters between 1500-1800z. Operations have been on SSB and PSK31, but he plans to operate on other modes later on during his stay at the Davis Station. QSL via VK2CA.

IOTA News

AS-077. (Special Event) Look for 8J6SL to be active from the Kumamoto Museum between May 1st and October 31st, to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Hisatsu (Railroad) Line (Steam Locomotive) on the Island of Honshu (JIIA AS-077-001). Activity will be on all bands and modes. Possibly 5 stations will be on the air. QSL via the JARL Bureau.

AS-117. (Special Event/WLOTA Op) Members of the Tokyo Dental College RC

(JA1YUC) will activate the special event callsign 8J120TDC/2 from **Mikomoto Island** (**WLOTA-2126**) between July 26-28th. Activity will mostly be on 40/20/17/15 meters using CW and SSB which will include an entry in the RSGB IOTA Contest (July 25-26th). Special event callsign is to celebrate the 120th anniversary of the Tokyo Dental College. Mikomoto Island lighthouse WLOTA number will be activated for the first time. The lighthouse was also selected by the International Association of Lighthouse Authorities (IALA) as one of 100 lighthouses particularly important historically in various countries of the world. QSL via JA1YUC, by the bureau or address on QRZ.com.

C6, BAHAMAS - Look for C6APR to be active again from the Crooked Island

Lodge, Pittstown Point, Crooked Island (NA-113), Bahamas. Activity will take place between July 23-27th, and during the RSGB IOTA Contest (July 25-26th) as a Multi-Op/Mixed-Mode/High-Power DXpediton entry. Operators mentioned are: W2GJ, K3IXD, W3PP and K4QO. Operations before and after the contest by C6APR will be on 80-10 meters including the 30/17/12 meter bands using CW and SSB. Also, look for C6AXD to be on RTTY and C6AQO on 6 meters (grid FL22). All three call signs are good for **Bird Rock Lighthouse (ARLHS BAH-005)** as well as IOTA NA-113 and Grid Locater FL22tt. All QSLs go to K3IXD.

CE0Y, EASTER ISLAND (SA-001). Amateur Stations SQ8X and SV2KBS are planning to be active as CE0Y/homecall from here between October 31st and November 15th. They are looking for one or two operators to join them on this operation. Plans are to have two stations on the air. They understand that Easter Island (SA-001) is not on most wanted lists, but there is a demand by some European stations to work CE0Y (this will be their main goal). 



Solar Cycle 24: New Sunspot Group Emerges

Some possible good news on the propagation and maybe the D-X front as well. Thomas Giella, NZ4O, reports that on Monday, June 22nd, a new solar cycle 24 sunspot group emerged in the South-West quadrant of



the Sun. Also that NOAA was expected to assign it the designation 11023 with a beta magnetic signature.

Tom, who lives in Lakeland, Florida, notes that sun watchers have seen four solar cycle 24 sunspot groups this month and six in the past 30 days. He adds that it appears as if solar cycle 24 has finally come alive.

And in what may be related news, word on the VHF Reflector that the 6 meter band has been open in various parts of the world with skip contacts of several hundred to more than a thousand miles. These reports seem to coincide with the emergence of the new sunspot group being reported by NZ4O, but whether or not there is any direct connection between the two events is unknown.
