
General Upgrade Class



Well hello and a happy December from Charlie the Tuner! I hope that you have had your fill of turkey for





awhile. Keep in mind that too much turkey puts you to sleep and you can't work DX if you are snoozing. Well, maybe you can dream about working DX, but it doesn't count for DXCC. I am very happy to be back on the air after having my station off the air for some months. The antenna is working and hopefully it will do so throughout the winter season until spring when I need to change the cable on the hazer. Its' always sumthin'. I will be working on getting back on 2 m also as well as getting the Yaesu VL-1000 amp hooked up.

But to show you that you really don't need a lot of power to work DX, just a lot of patience, let me tell you what I have worked with 100 watts: South Africa, Kermadec Island, The Gambia, Morocco, Faroe, Island, Tristan da Cunha, Lebanon, Kuwait, several ops from Japan, Cameroon, Vanuatu, Taiwan, Philippines and Saudi Arabia. Now, truthfully, some of these contacts took some time because of the pile up and only 100 w, but it can be done. And it can be done with less power – say QRP!! So get on the air and make some contacts.

With that in mind, let's see what is in store for the next few months and what is also in the "continuing operation" category (read Reminder).

As always I need to thank the following for the forecast reports for December and beyond: the Northern Ohio Amateur Radio Society, Northern Ohio DX Association, Ohio/Penn PacketCluster Network (especially Tedd Mirgliotta – KB8NW for the following DX and IOTA information. Please remember that this report can



contain some erroneous information due to the simple nature of bad info or busted call signs, so do yourself a favor and please adhere to the old adage of "Work First Worry Later" (WFWL).

DX PAPER CHASE – Still Reminding: 4M200/YV200/YW200, VENEZUELA (Special Event). Look for several different stations to be active until December 31st, to celebrate the 200th anniversary of Venezuela's Independence. Some of the stations that have been active are:

4M200AJ - Operator Manuel; Activity mainly on PSK on 40/30/20/15/10m;QSL via YV5AJ.

YV200D - Operator Paolo; Activity mainly on RTTY on 30m; QSL viaYV1DIG.

YW200A - Operator Alfredo; Activity on PSK and SSB on 20/15m; QSLvia YV5SSF.

YW200ER - Operator Elvis; Activity on SSB on 40/20/15m; QSL via YV8ER.

YW200L - Operator Frank; Activity on RTTY and PSK, on 30/15m; QSLvia YV5LI.

YW200T - Operator Juan; Activity on SSB, RTTY and PSK, on 40/30/20/15m;QSL via YV5JBI.

A "Bicentenary of Venezuelan Independence Award" is available by working all the 6 special call sign: 4M200AJ, YV200D,

YW200A, YW200ER, YW200L and YW200T. More information is expected to be available at:

3W, VIETNAM. Bruce, XW1B, from Vientiane, Laos, is planning an operation from Danang, Vietnam, around November 29th, using the call sign 3W3B. He states that he will be living in Danang most of the year and anticipates being very active on the bands. At the start of his activity, he will use a simple station/antenna but plans to improve things later. QSL only via E21EIC. NO eQSLs.

9Q5, DEM. REPUBLIC OF CONGO – Reminder: CX2CC, is now active as 9Q5OAR from the City of Goma, near the Rwanda border and is there working for the United Nations for one year. He hopes to be active on CW (slow), SSB and the Digital modes. He is using a TS430 transceiver into a Log Periodic or wire dipole. QSL via his home call sign CX2CC: Christian Cardarello, Avenida Italia 3319, CP11600 Montevideo, Uruguay, South America. QSLs will not be answered until his return in December 2011. Please, direct QSL send a SAE with 2 USDs or a new IRC.

BV100, TAIWAN. Reminder: Members of the Republic of China (Taiwan) Centenary

Foundation will be activating special event station BV100 between now and Dec 31st, 2011. Activity is to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the ROC (Taiwan). Operations will be on all bands and modes. BX5, TAIWAN (AS-020) - BX5AA, from Changhua City, Taiwan (WLOTA 0022), will be active during the CQWW DX SSB Contest (October 30-31st) as a Single-Op/All-Band/High-Power entry. Jimmy states that BX5 is a rare prefix for Taiwan (CQ 24). QSL via BX5AA, direct (see QRZ.com). Visit his Web page at: <u>http://blog.yam.com/bx5aa</u>

CQ DX MARATHON - Reminder- K9EL, DX Marathon Administrator, reports on Oct 16th: "As recently announced by CQ Magazine, Competitors in the 2010 CQ DX Marathon will have a unique 'double-dip' opportunity in working the islands of the Netherlands Antilles for Marathon points. Those who worked any of the islands before 10/10/10, get credit for either the Windward or Leeward Islands, as appropriate. Hams who work them again on or after 10/10/10 will get additional credit for the new entities, providing a maximum of six country credits for working the islands in 2010. Version 2010.2 of the DX Marathon score sheet that incorporates the four new PJ countries is now available on the DX Marathon Web site at: <u>http://www.dxmarathon.com</u> Instructions to convert version to 2010.1 to the new 2010.2 are available on the Web site. However, participants can also send their existing score sheet to <u>scores@dxmarathon.com</u> and we will convert it and send it back to you."

IOTA News

KH9, WAKE ISLAND – (Reminder) WA2YUN, will once again be active as KH9/WA2YUN from Wake Island (OC-053, USI OI-012S, WLOTA LH-2293) for about one year while on work assignment. Activity will be limited to his spare time. QSL via K2PF.

SA-057, Timoteo Domingue Island - Members of the Uruguay DX Group and Centro Radioaficionados Montevideo will be active as CW3TD from Timoteo Domingue Island between December 2-6th. Activity will be on 160-2 meters with an emphasis on the Digital modes. They plan to have 15 operators and four stations on the air. QSL route TBA shortly.

Other DX News

J7, DOMINICA. Operators Dieter, HB9TPQ (J79DP), Kurt, HB9BZG (J79KZ) and Walter, HB9MFM (J79WTA) are now active and are on holiday from the Tamarind Tree Hotel near Salisbury on Dominica (NA-101) until Dec 11th. Activity will be on all HF bands using SSB and some RTTY. They have one station, using an IC-7000 with 100 watts into a dipole 50m above sea level. QSL via their home call sign, direct or by the Bureau.

OE40, AUSTRIA (Special Event). Members of the ADXB-OE (Austrian DX Board) will be celebrating their 40th anniversary by activating their club station OE1XBC on the air between December 15-31st, using the special call sign OE40ADXB. Suggested frequencies are as follows:

 $80\ meters$ - SSB 3630-3650 kHz and CW 3530-3540 kHz

40 meters - SSB 7125-7150 kHz and CW 7025-7030 kHz

30 meters - CW 10120 kHz and Digital 10140 kHz

20 meters - SSB 14225-14235 kHz, CW 14030-14040 kHz, PSK 14070 kHz and RTTY 14085 kHz

17 meters - SSB 18120-18130 kHz and CW 18080-18085 kHz

15 meters - SSB 21275-21285 kHz and CW 21030-21040 kHz (if propagation)

12 meters - SSB 24940-24950 kHz and CW 24900-24905 kHz (if propagation)

10 meters - SSB 28400-28450 kHz and CW 28030-28040 kHz (if propagation)

There will be a special QSI card. QSL info is via ADXB: Austrian DX Board, P.O.Box 1000, A-1081 Vienna, Austria.

PJ5, **ST. EUSTATIUS** (Update). Operators Janusz/SP6IXF and Wlodek/SP6EQZ are now active as PJ5/homecall from St.Eustatius (NA-145) until Dec 3rd. Activity will be on 160–10 meters using CW, SSB and RTTY. QSL via their home call sign. For updates and an online log search, visit their Web page at: <u>http://pj5-2010.dxing.pl/index.html</u>

TP60, FRANCE. The "Council of Europe Radio Amateur Club" (CERAC - TP2CE) will once again be active as TP60CE, December 3-5th. This will be the last time they use TP60CE. Activity will be on all HF bands and modes, including the satellites. QSL via F5LGF. An online log search will be available at: <u>http://ewwa.free.fr</u>

VK9N, NORFOLK ISLAND (Reminder). After their operation from ZK2A (see ZK2 listed below), operators Andrea/IK1PMR, YL Claudia/PA3LEO, Al/LA9SN, Doug/N6TQS and possibly others will be active from here between December 5-19th. Plans of activity should/probably be the same as their operation from ZK2A. QSL via PA3LEO.

VK0M, MACQUARIE ISLAND - (Reminder) Reports indicate that Kevin, VK4KEV, is expected to be operating as VK0KEV from Macquarie Island (AN-005) sometime between the end of Oct and beginning of Dec 2010 for possibly up to 18 months. Activity will be mostly on 40 and 20 m SSB and the Digital modes. Presently, Kevin is operating as VK4KEV/VK7, in Hobart, Tasmania, while undergoing training for his upcoming long stay on Macquarie.

VP5, TURKS AND CAICOS ISLANDS. Just a reminder that Dave, W5CW, will once again be active as as VP5/W5CW from the VP5JM Hamlet on the Island of Providenciales (NA-002, WLOTA 1476) between Nov 24th and Dec 14th. Activity will include entries in the following three contests using the call sign VP5CW: CQWW DX CW Contest (November 27-28th) as a Single-Op/ All-Band entry, ARRL 160m Contest (December 3-5th) and the ARRL 10m Contest (December 11-12th). QSL via his home callsign (QRZ.com address).

ZK2, **NIUE** (Reminder). Look for 5 operators to be active as ZK2A between November 20th and December 3rd. Operators mentioned are: Andrea, IK1PMR, YL Claudia, PA3LEO, Al, LA9SN, Doug, N6TQS, Alan, K6SRZ, and possibly Tom, SP5UAF. Activity will be focused on Europe, 160-40 meters, 30/17/12 m CW and RTTY using four Elecraft with solid state amps with RX antennas. This is a lightweight DXpedition. They will try to limit their extra baggage expenses. To achieve this (and for efficiency and reliability too) they will mainly use wire antennas. QSL via PA3LEO. A Web site is now available at:

Field Day 2010 Score

There are several ways to slice and dice a contest score. In the Field Day event, the best metrics are overall score, number of contacts, and number of participants. Here are the numbers; you be the judge.

contacts during the day using only one transmitter running 70 watts from the VA Hospital in Brecksville Ohio. We operated on 7245 kHz the entire day but shut down about a half hour early (1600) because of QRM from a shortwave broadcast station in Europe.

Amateur operation in the United States had been ordered off the air for 3 weeks short of 4 years starting on Dec 8, 1941, the day after the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Amateurs in Canada had been

off the air for 6 years and 2 months starting Sept 5, 1939, two days after Canada declared war on Germany.

On Nov 15, 1945 both the United States and Canada were allowed to return to the air. As of that date US and Canadian amateurs were only allowed to operate on 10 meters 28-29.7 MHz, the old 5 meter 56-60 MHz band, the new 144-148 MHz 2 meter band and four unused

microwave bands in the GHz range. The other bands including 20-40-80 meters were given back at different times during 1946 as the military released them. 160 meters was lost to the Coast Guard LORAN operations. The US did allow limited amateur use on the 112-116 MHz band used by Civil Defense, called the War Emergency Radio Service, on a shared basis starting Aug 21, 1945. That order was cancelled on Nov 15 and 112-116 MHz amateur use withdrawn.

EmComm

Interest continues to grow in the use of digital modes for local emergency communications, particularly on VHF and UHF. The Narrow Band Emergency Messaging System (NBEMS) has proven to be an excellent suite of freeware programs (fldig, flarq, flmsg) that implement soundcard digital modes for emcomm as well as general amateur radio communications.

NBEMS includes most all of the commonly used digital modes (PSK, Olivia, MT-63 and RTTY to name a few) using a variety of mode parameters (speed and bandwith) for each. Fldigi also includes an RSID feature that generates a signal at the beginning of each transmission that identifies the mode and settings being used. This enables the receiving radio to switch immediately to that mode saving the operator from missing part of the message while trying to reset the software.

All of the NBEMS components can be found at <u>http://w1hkj.com/</u>.

Portage County RACES has begun to

implement digital modes with Rick, K8CAV, leading the way. NBEMS will be the recommended software although RACES members can use any other package that they prefer. Testing has begun on HF between Rick and Bill, WB9LBI, and Rick and I, along with Mike, KD8FLZ, have begun work on VHF.

Watch in the coming months for announcements about local digital nets on VHF that everyone can participate in. This will be a great way for all area hams to learn more about using the digital modes which they can then also put to use on the HF bands. Digital is a lot of fun and can be done inexpensively using a soundcard interface. Rick, K8CAV, is putting together an updated USB version of the soundcard interface kit that was a club project a few years ago and the new kit will be a club project in early 2011.

Locally, PCARS will be offering some digital workshops as well as a Digital Special Interest Group to help our members get the most out of digital ops. Regionally, Matt, W8DEC, a PCARS member and the DEC for ARES[®] District Ten is putting together a schedule for digital mode training in 2011 and this should be a great program for all hams in the district. More information will be forthcoming on the ARES[®] training.

SKYWARN Recognition Day Set for December 4th

The 12th Annual SKYWARN Recognition Day (SRD) Special Event will take place Saturday, December 4,

2010. SRD is co-sponsored by the ARRL and the National Weather Service (<u>NWS</u>) as a way to recognize the commitment made by Amateur Radio operators in helping to keep their communities safe. According to SRD Coordinator David Floyd, N5DBZ, Amateur Radio operators can visit their local participating NWS office (<u>http://www.wrh.noaa.gov/mtr/hamradio//participating_offices.php</u>),



working as a team to contact other hams across the world throughout the 24 hour event.

The idea for the first SRD took shape in the summer of 1999. Meteorologist-in-Charge of the Goodland, Kansas NWS office Scott Mentzer, NOQE, tried to find a way to recognize the valuable contributions storm

spotters make to the National Weather Service. "Since many of those storm spotters were also hams," Floyd told the ARRL, "it seemed like a natural fit for the recognition to be centered on Amateur Radio."

With the approval of NWS headquarters and a commitment to participate from many local NWS offices across the country, the first National Weather Service Special Event took place on November 27, 1999. "At the end of the event, almost 16,000 QSOs were logged, with contacts made to all 50 states and 63 countries," Floyd recounted. "The Des Moines forecast office took

the honor of making the most contacts of any office that first year with 761 QSOs, and went on to lead the pack until 2003 by logging between 1300-1500 contacts each year."

Floyd said that feedback from that first event was "overwhelmingly positive" from both the NWS staff and the local ham clubs: "Many local club members who came to that first event had never visited an NWS office



before. When they came for the special event, they learned the value of their reports and how they were used in conjunction with existing technology."And so began an annual tradition. The following year, 85 of the 122 NWS offices -- almost 70 percent -- participated in the event, making nearly 24,000 QSOs.

In 2001, the name of the event was changed to SKYWARN Recognition Day, a name Floyd said better relayed what the day was all about: "Each year since the inception of SRD, the number of NWS offices participating with local ham clubs has increased; more than 100 offices sign up each year to take part. The most contacts made during any SRD occurred in 2006 when -- thanks to and local hams in the

Grand Junction, Colorado area -- 1,640 QSOs were logged!"

Station call signs have also changed over the years. Floyd said that some NWS offices and clubs apply for a special event call sign, "such as W3B in Brownsville or N0Y in Aberdeen, South Dakota. Other call signs hint

at office location, including WX9GRB in Green Bay and WX4NHC at the National Hurricane Center. Still others represent more of the big picture, as in KC0SKY in Pleasant Hill, Missouri."

Floyd said that as SKYWARN Recognition Day has grown throughout the years, he has seen a greater use of digital communications in addition to CW, RTTY and packet radio: "Each year, more and more contacts are

behind, with 72 QSOs to other NWS offices.

being made using EchoLink, *Winlink* and the use of e-mail reflectors." In keeping with the NWS setting, stations are asked to include a weather report of their location in their exchange. [**Exchange:** Call sign, signal report, QTH, and a one or two word description of the weather occurring at your site ("sunny", "partly cloudy", "windy", etc.).]

In 2009, the Melbourne, Florida office (WX4MLB) reported the most QSOs -- 1373 QSOs -- than any other NWS office; the Des Moines, Iowa office (K0DMX), with 912 QSOs, placed second. Melbourne also contacted 77 NWS offices, the most reported. Lincoln, Illinois (WX9ILX) was close

2010 SKYWARN Recognition Day will be held on December 4 from 0000 UTC-2400 UTC. Last year, contacts were made in all 50 states and more than 40 countries during the 24 hour event. Even if you make just one QSO to an NWS office, you are eligible to receive a certificate. Just submit a list of the station(s) you worked (along with a self-addressed stamped envelope) to SKYWARN Recognition Day, 920 Armory Rd, Goodland, KS 67735. Many NWS offices also send out special QSL cards for this event. If you haven't yet joined in the fun of SKYWARN Recognition Day, make 2010 your year to do so!




Is Ham Radio Dying?

If you've been around ham radio for even a year or two, you've no doubt heard or participated in the debate as to whether or not ham radio is dying. The question is as perennial as the grass.

Recently, this was a topic of discussion on the ARRL PR mailing list. Allen, W1AGP, the ARRL's Media & PR Manager, generated a chart to show that ham radio is NOT dying.

This chart as drawn a good example of how you can lie with statistics. The y-axis started at 640,000, so the rate of increase in the number of licensees looked quite dramatic. Even so, the good news is that the number of licensees is quickly approaching 700,000, and should surpass that number shortly.

Upon seeing this chart, Jerry, N9TU, did a little statistical analysis of his own. Of the 83 licensees in his zip code, nine



are deceased and one has expired. There are four Novices, 36 Techs, 18 Generals, 5 Advanced and ten Extras.

From this data, he deduces, "If this is an average sampling of deceased members, expired members and club licenses, there are roughly 90,000 fewer licensees than shown in the data nationwide. I have no clue of the error rate involved with my data. Your results may vary." My guess is that his zip code is probably pretty typical, and that his analysis is essentially correct.

There's also the question of activity. It's my guess that nearly half of all licensees are inactive, and that if we could figure out a way to activate those hams, then we'd really be able to say that our hobby is not dying. It's

something worth thinking about, but there's certainly no easy answer to this problem. As Yogi Berra is purported to have said, "If people don't want to come out to the ball park, there's nothing you can do to stop them."

Overall, though, I think the numbers are headed in the right direction. Ham radio is NOT dying. Let's all keep up the good work.

However, in the allocation of international call signs, may countries have additional - let's call them secondary - prefixes; for example, in addition to W, the United States also uses all of the K and N and some of the A series of prefixes.

Many of these prefixes are used only in contests, for special events, or by non-resident operators, though that is not a hard and fast rule.




