From the Vice President


I know I've mentioned this before, but it bears repeating here. The four stages of learning:



Paper Chase

Here we are at the end of the year, what do we remember most of about December? Would you say the Nativity, Santa or Pearl Harbor?

The Nativity is being celebrated by the Delaware/Lehigh Amateur Radio Clubs, WX3MAS, and will be on the air from the Twin Cities of Nazareth and Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. Look for them on 3.880, 7.270, 14265 and 21.365 from 9 am to 9 pm the 10th and 11th of this month. They hope to be able to operate PSK on 40 through 10 meters.

As for Pearl Harbor, I cannot give any first hand feelings of the bombing because I was only 4-1/2 at the time. We have all seen pictures, movies and reports of the attack and the United States entry into World War II. If you go to Hawaii, you can



visit the USS Arizona Memorial from which you can look down into the water and see the ship. Depending of the tide, you may be able to see the turret tubes upon which the turrets sat. If you take a boat ride to the other side of Ford Island, you can still see the capsized



wreckage of the USS Utah. On my first trip to WESTPAC, in 1956, we moored by the Utah. You have no idea of the impact it has on a person. As we passed the

Arizona, you could still see the sheen of the oil leaking from the wreckage. There was still a sheen in 1971, on my last trip to Hawaii.

About eight years ago, when KD8EPF and I visited Metropolis, Illinois for a reunion of the USS Hammerberg, DE- 1015, we got lost and stopped to ask for directions (for all the women in the club, men *do* ask for directions). The woman we asked did not understand but understood about Navy ships to call over elderly gentleman working in her gardens. He helped us with directions and then told us a Navy tale. He was in the shower on the Arizona when the bombs and torpedoes hit the ship and he was blown clear of the ship. He was pulled from the water and for three month's he did not even know who he was. After regaining his memory, the Navy notified his family that he was alive. This was a shock to the family since they had already had a memorial ceremony and burial with an empty casket.

Three of the Battleships participating in the 70th anniversary of Pearl Harbor are:

USS Wisconsin (BB-64) - The Wisconsin, W4WIS, is moored in Virginia Beach, Virginia and will be active on 14.264 on December 3rd & 4th. See www.n4wis.org for additional information.

USS West Virginia (BB-48) - The Tri State Amateur Radio Association, WV8A, will remember the sinking of the West Virginia and will be active on 7.290 and 14.290 on December 3rd.

USS North Carolina (BB-55) - The North Carolina, NI4BK, is moored in Wilmington, North Carolina and can be heard near 7.250 and 14.250.

Though not announced, listen for the USS Missouri (BB-63), KH6BB, it is moored at Pearl Harbor. They have just completed a three month renovation of the radio room and would be a great way to activate it during this period.

Now we are in the last month of 2011. Didn't we just welcome in year 2000?? Man, does the time fly. This month's DX news was very sparse. Most of the reports focused on what was happening during the CQWW DX CW Contest during the last weekend of November. But there are some things going on in December and beyond that should be interesting for us DX'rs.

And I got a local report from our own KB8UHN. John said that he worked the following DX to get four new countries: J69MV in St. Lucia;

BX5AA in Taiwan ZL3KR in New Zealand; 7Z7AA in Saudi Arabia. And he worked them all on 10 METERS. Good going John. Keep the reports coming in.

You also might mention next time what you are using for a rig, antenna and power. John also wanted to



encourage our Tech licensees to get on 10 m and work some DX.

As I usually do, I want to extend a thank you to the following for the forecast reports for this month and beyond: the Northern Ohio Amateur Radio Society, Northern Ohio DX Association, Ohio/Penn Packet Cluster Network (especially Tedd Mirgliotta – KB8NW) for the following DX and IOTA information. Please remember that this report could contain "Pirate/SLIM" operations or busted call signs. Please do yourself a favor and adhere to the old adage of "Work First Worry Later" (WFWL).

DX News

- **3D2, FIJI.** Yoshida, JA1NLX, active as 3D2YA from **Yageta Island, Yasawa IOTA Group (OC-156)** March 15-21st, 2012. Activity will be on 80-10 meters, mainly CW, possibly RTTY and SSB. QSL via his home call sign. He will QSL all QSOs via Bureau. The log will be uploaded to LoTW when he returns home. Direct QSL will be welcomed with SASE (1 IRC or 2 USDs).
- **9J, ZAMBIA**. (Reminder) Chris, ZS6RI (ex-ZD9IR, 5H9IR, EL8RI), will be active as 9J2RI from Zambia for a year or two. However, operations will be on a "6 week on/6 week off" due to his work schedule (6 weeks off he will return home to South Africa). Activity will be on all HF bands using CW, SSB and the Digital modes. QSL via LoTW or direct to: Chris J de Beer, Box 333, Bethlehem, GA 30620 (w/SASE [USA] or SAE w/return postage for other countries). Bureau QSLs are OK, but very slow. LoTW will be uploaded at least once every 6 week rotation, and probably even weekly. Bureau cards will be sent annually.
- **9Q5, DEM. REPUBLIC OF CONGO** (**Reminder**) CX2CC, is now active as 9Q5OAR from the City of Goma, near the Rwanda border and is there working for the United Nations for one year. He hopes to be active on CW (slow), SSB and the Digital modes. He is using a TS430 transceiver into a Log Periodic or wire dipole. QSL via his home call sign CX2CC: Christian Cardarello, Avenida Italia 3319, CP11600 Montevideo, Uruguay, South America. QSLs will not be answered until his return in December 2011. Please, direct OSL send a SAE with 2 USDs or a new IRC.
- **9V, SINGAPORE**. (Reminder) Martin, F8UKP, a F6KOP member, will be working in Singapore (AS-019) for the next three years and will be active as 9V1RM. Activity will be limited to his spare time only. Operations will be on 40-10 meters using CW, SSB and PSK. Currently he is using a skyloop antenna using the maximum legal power in 9V-land (100 watts). He has the permission to set up a hexbeam antenna in the near future. QSL via LoTW or direct to the address on QRZ.com. There is a possibility to QSL by the Bureau in the future (Information will be given in due time).
- **CE9, ANTARCTICA**. (**Reminder**) Tomas, CE9VPM, will be active from Chilean Air Base Presidente Gabriel González Videla in the Antarctica beginning November 2011 through March 2012. Activity is expected to be on 20 meters and possibly other bands. QSL via PO Box 13630, Santiago, Chile.

Here is another interesting report for you Grid Chasers. Ever wonder how you would get some of those grids in the middle of the ocean? Well, read this report.

- **GRID ACTIVITY (Wet).** Yuri, UT1FG, will once again be traveling across the Atlantic Ocean and will be active from some "Wet grids" as UT1FG/MM between November 25th, through the end of May 2012. First trip will be from the Panama Canal to Huelva, Spain (EA7), and then to Brunsbuttel, Germany (From there, he will inform us later). Yuri is reportedly a crew member on the ship, so activity will be during his free time. Operations are expected on all amateur radio bands, 160-2 meters, 70 cm, and also including the satellite. His activities will be mainly through the satellite, but also look for him on the HF bands. He will also be active on 6 meters, conditions permitting. QSL via his home call sign, direct (see QRZ.com), by the Bureau or to his QSL Manager UX0FY.
- **FH, MAYOTTE**. (Reminder) Phill, F6GNT, will be active as FH8NX from Mayotte Island(AF-027) until March 2013. Activity will be on 20-10 meters using SSB.QSL direct to: Phillip Ward, 36 Totorosa 2, Labattoir 97610, Mayotte. Also, QSL via eQSL.
- FR8, REUNION ISLAND Reminder: Frederic, ex-F5INL, will be active as FR8NE from Reunion Island (AF-016) until July 2012. Activity will be on 20/17/15/12/10 meters using mostly CW. QSL direct to Frederic Bossu, 2 Chemin des Grenadiers, 97490 Sainte Clotilde, Reunion Island or by the Bureau.
- **HG15**, **HUNGARY** (**Special Event**). Look for special event station HG15IPA to be active through December 31st. Activity is to celebrate the 15th anniversary jubilee call sign of the International Police Association. The station is expected to be on 160-10 meters using CW, SSB, RTTY, PSK31 and SSTV. QSOs with this station are valid for the HA-IPARC Award. QSL via HA3JB.
- J2, DJIBOUTI. (Reminder) Freddy, F5IRO, who has been active as J28RO since July 2010, is expected to stay here until July 2012.

His normal activity will be on the HF bands using CW, SSB and the Digital modes. His QSL Manager is F8DFP. QSL direct (w/SAE+ valid IRC - PLEASE NO MONEY AT ALL), or by the French REF-Union Bureau. The direct cards without the above mentioned will be answered by the Bureau.

- **SX100, GREECE** (Special Event). Members of the Radio Amateur Association of Greece (RAAG) will activate the special event callsign "SX100A" between 0000z Friday, December 2nd and 2400z Sunday, December 4th. Activity is to celebrate the 100th anniversary in which the historic battleship the "Georgios Averof" joined the "Hellenic Navy". The operation will take place from the radio room of the "Georgios Averof". QSL via the Bureau. For more information, see: http://www.qrz.com/db/SX100A
- T32, EASTERN KIRIBATI. Six operators from the U.S. and Canada will be active from Kiritimati Island (OC-024) between January 17th and February 2nd. The group will be active from the same location that the recent T32C group operated from. The group is planning to operate during the CQWW 160m CW Contest (January 27-29th) as a Multi-Op entry and use the callsign T32XX. QSL via KB8TXZ. Outside of the contest, the operators will be active on 160-6 meters using CW, SSB, RTTY and PSK, using the following callsigns: T32AU Operator Dave/VO1AU; QSL via VO1MX T32CO Operator Brian/KG8CO; QSL via KB8TXZ T32LJ Operator Lee/N8LJ; QSL via K8ESQ T32TR Operator Ted/K8AQM; QSL via KB8TXZ T32TX Operator Jim/KB8TXZ; QSL via KB8TXZ T32WW Operator Stan/AC8W; QSL via KB8TXZ Look for the callsigns T32WW and T32CO to be operating on both RTTY and PSK.
- **V5, NAMIBIA.** (Reminder) Martin, DL1ZU, will be active as V5/DL1ZU between December 21st and January 13th (2012). During his trip through the Caprivi strip, Martun will use an IC-706 with a vertical antenna and dipoles. In Windhoek, he will use a 3 element beam. QSL is "OK" via his home callsign by the Bureau.
- **XV, VIETNAM**. (Reminder) Retu, OH4MDY (OX3RZ/XU7MDY/XV2MDY), will once again be active as XV2RZ from Southeast Vietnam between November 1st and December 12th. Activity will be on 80-6 meters using the "normal modes" (CW and SSB).QSL only direct via OH4MDY with a SASE and 2 USDs.
- XW, LAOS. Alex, RK3DT, is once again active as XW3DT from Laos. His license is only good for three bands 40/30/20 meters. He has been on CW and SSB. Alex mentioned that his license cost him 6,000 USDs. When OPDX asked Alex how long he will be there, he stated, "I will stay until beer money dries out..." He suggests to send a QSL card to the following address before December 3rd, 2011: Alex Sinchukov, P.O. BOX 11, Lamma Island, Hong Kong.
- **ZK2**, **NIUE.** Chris, GM3WOJ, who has been active as ZK2V, now reports that he has received special permission to operate on the 60m band. The permit is good to transmit on 5403.5 kHz between December 1-7th (Niue local time, which equates to 1100z, December 1st, until 1100z on December 8th). He states, "I am intending to install a more 'DX' antenna than the Inverted-Vee I had in 2009, so hoping for some further DX." He also mentions, "3.5 MHz and 7 MHz are very noisy here on the island, so I am hoping that QRN will not be a problem." Chris will be active as ZK2V until December 20th. The QSL Manager for ZK2V and ZK2X is N3SL. All ZK2V and ZK2X QSOs will be uploaded to the ARRL's LoTW daily if possible.

IOTA News

- **EU-017.** Staff members of "DxCoffee" will be active as ID9DXC from the **Aeolian group** activating some rare or semi-rare rocks and islands valid for the I.I.A. (Italian Island Award). The activity will be spread out starting from the end of 2011 throughout the entire year of 2012. It began November18th, from the Island of Panarea, Italian Island Award ME-006, World Lighthouse on the Air WLOTA LH-2210 (if weather conditions permit). A special card will be printed for each reference the team activates. QSL via Antonello Scauso, IT9YVO, direct or by the Bureau.
- JD1, OGASAWARA. Hiroyuki "Harry", JG7PSJ, will once again be active as JD1BMH from Chichijima Island (AS-031) between December 30th and January 7th (2012). Activity will be on 160-10 meters using CW, SSB and RTTY. QSL via the Bureau to JD1BMH or direct to JG7PSJ.
- **KH9, WAKE ISLAND** (**Reminder**) WA2YUN, will once again be active as KH9/WA2YUN from Wake Island (OC-053, USI OI-012S, WLOTA LH-2293) for about one year while on work assignment. Activity will be limited to his spare time. QSL via K2PF
- **VQ9, CHAGOS ISLANDS**. Jim, ND9M/VQ9JC, informs OPDX that he is back on **Diego Garcia (AF-006)** after 10 months off the island and is expected to be active at least until March 1st, 2012.

There will then be a third 5 week series of classes for anyone who would like to be mentored with live, on-the-air QSO's using the PCARS club station. Although the cost is FREE, the investment will pay off big in operating skills, fun and the satisfaction of knowing something that sets you apart, even among other hams!

The 13th Annual SKYWARN Recognition Day - Dec 3

The 13th Annual SKYWARN Recognition Day (SRD) Special Event will take place Saturday, December 3, 2011. SRD is co-sponsored by the ARRL and the National Weather Service (NWS) as a way to recognize the commitment made by Amateur Radio operators in helping to keep their communities safe. According to SRD Coordinator David Floyd, N5DBZ, Amateur Radio operators can visit their



local participating NWS office, working as a team to contact other hams across the world throughout the 24 hour event.

The idea for the first SRD took shape in the summer of 1999. Meteorologist-in-Charge of the Goodland, Kansas NWS office Scott Mentzer, NOQE, tried to find a way to recognize the valuable contributions storm spotters make to the National Weather Service. "Since many of those storm spotters were also hams," Floyd told the ARRL, "it seemed like a natural fit for the recognition to be centered on Amateur Radio."



With the approval of NWS headquarters and a commitment to participate from many local NWS offices across the country, the first National Weather Service Special Event took place on November 27, 1999. "At the end of the event, almost 16,000 QSOs were logged, with contacts made to all 50 states and 63 countries," Floyd recounted. "The Des Moines forecast office took the honor of making the most contacts of any office that first year with 761 QSOs, and went on to lead the pack until 2003 by logging between 1300-1500 contacts each year."

Floyd said that feedback from that first event was "overwhelmingly positive" from both the NWS staff and the local ham clubs: "Many local club members who came to that first event had never visited an NWS office before. When they came for the special event, they learned the value of their reports and how they were used in conjunction with existing technology."And so began an annual tradition. The following year, 85 of the 122 NWS offices -- almost 70 percent -- participated in the event, making nearly 24,000 QSOs.

In 2001, the name of the event was changed to SKYWARN Recognition Day, a name Floyd said better relayed what the day was all about: "Each year since the inception of SRD, the number of NWS offices participating with local ham clubs has increased; more than 100 offices sign up each year to take part. The most contacts made during any SRD occurred in 2006 when -- thanks to and local hams in the Grand Junction,

Colorado area -- 1640 QSOs were logged!"

Station call signs have also changed over the years. Floyd said that some NWS offices and clubs apply for a special event call sign, "such as W3B in Brownsville or N0Y in Aberdeen, South Dakota. Other call signs hint at office location, including WX9GRB in Green Bay and WX4NHC at the National Hurricane Center. Still others represent more of the big picture, as in KC0SKY in Pleasant Hill, Missouri."

Floyd said that as SKYWARN Recognition Day has grown throughout the years, he has seen a greater use of digital communications in addition to CW, RTTY and packet radio: "Each year, more and more contacts are being made using EchoLink, Winlink and the use of e-mail reflectors." In keeping with the NWS setting, stations are asked to include a weather report of their location in their exchange.

In 2010, the NWS office in Grand Junction, Colorado -- using the Special Event call sign N0W -- topped the QSO list with 934 QSOs; the Lincoln, Illinois office (K0DMX), with 823 QSOs, placed second. Grand Junction also contacted 64 NWS offices, the most reported. Fort Worth, Texas (WX5FWD) was close behind, with 67 QSOs to other NWS offices.

2011 SKYWARN Recognition Day will be held on December 3 from 0000 UTC-2400 UTC. In the past, NWS offices have contacted all 50 states and more than 40 countries during the 24 hour event. Even if you make just one QSO to an NWS office, you are eligible to receive a certificate. Just submit a list of the station(s) you worked (along with a self-addressed stamped envelope) to SKYWARN Recognition Day, 920 Armory Rd, Goodland, KS 67735. Many NWS offices also send out special QSL cards for this event. If you haven't yet joined in the fun of SKYWARN Recognition Day, make 2011 your year to do so!

FCC Releases New Rules for 60 Meters

On November 18, the FCC released a Report and Order (R&O), defining new rules for the 60 meter (5 MHz) band. These rules are in response to a Petition for Rulemaking (PRM) filed by the ARRL more than five years ago and a June 2010 Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM). In the R&O, the FCC replaced one of the channels in the band, increased the maximum authorized power amateur stations may transmit in this band and authorized amateur stations to transmit

band (60 meters).

The Amateur Radio Service in the United States has a secondary allocation on 60 meters. Only those amateurs who hold General, Advanced or Amateur Extra class licenses may operate on this band. Amateur stations must not cause harmful

three additional emission designators in the five channels in the 5330.6-5406.4 kHz

interference to -- and must accept interference from -- stations authorized by any administration in the fixed service, as well as mobile (except aeronautical mobile) stations authorized by the administrations of other countries.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THESE CHANGES HAVE NOT YET TAKEN EFFECT.

These new rules will take effect 30 days after they are published in the Federal Register. The ARRL will announce on its website when the rules are published. Additional information can currently be found on the web at, http://www.arrl.org/news/fcc-releases-new-rules-for-60-meters.

Then you'll have an old plate to bring in to get hung up as a **permanent part of PCARS history!!** The official form for obtaining your Ohio Amateur Radio license plates is on the PCARS Yahoo Group site.






