Some of you may have used it already. Just visit: <u>http://www.vhfdx.info/spots/map.php</u>. You can see what QSOs are going on from anywhere in the world and thereby see where the propagation is best for good DX

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contacts. I showed the website to a the group of PCARS members at the recent DX/Contest meeting at our club site. I know that I will be using it since understanding what the propagation is doing in various areas of the world will help in working specific DX locations.

I also hope that you got a chance to go to Dayton this year. The 2011 Hamvention is now history. One of the great things about Hamvention is that you have the chance of meeting Eye 2 Eye with DX ops that you have talked with over the years. It was no different this year when I was able to meet a few Hams that I have had QSOs with and now have a face to put the voice to.

I really want to thank the following for the forecast reports for this month and beyond: the Northern Ohio Amateur Radio Society, Northern Ohio DX Association, Ohio/Penn Packet Cluster Network (especially Tedd Mirgliotta, KB8NW for the following DX and IOTA information. Please remember that this report could contain "Pirate/SLIM" operations or busted call signs. Please do yourself a favor and adhere to the old adage of "Work First Worry Later" (WFWL).

5H, TANZANIA. Dave, W0FBI, will be active as 5H2DCL for the next two months. He is there as a medical doctor. Activity will be mostly on 20 meters CW, usually after 1300z. QSL via W0WOI.

5R, MADAGASCAR. (Reminder) Giorgio, IZ4AKS, will be active as 5R8KS in another Micro-DXpedition, this time from Nosy Be Island (AF-057) between May 31st and June 6th. Activity will be holiday style on 40-10 meters using CW, SSB and RTTY. QSL via IZ8IYX.

9J, ZAMBIA. (Reminder) Chris, ZS6RI (ex-ZD9IR, 5H9IR, EL8RI), will be active as 9J2RI from Zambia for a year or two. However, operations will be on a "6 week on/6 week off" due to his work schedule (6 weeks off he will return home to South Africa). Activity will be on all HF bands using CW, SSB and the Digital modes. QSL via LoTW or direct to: Chris J de Beer, Box 333, Bethlehem, GA 30620 (w/SASE [USA] or SAE w/return postage for other countries). Bureau QSLs are OK, but very slow. LoTW will be uploaded at least once every 6 week rotation, and probably even weekly. Bureau cards will be sent annually.

9Q5, DEM. REPUBLIC OF CONGO – Reminder: CX2CC, is now active as 9Q5OAR from the City of Goma, near the Rwanda border and is there working for the United Nations for one year. He hopes to be active on CW (slow), SSB and the Digital modes. He is using a TS430 transceiver into a Log Periodic or wire dipole. QSL via his home call sign CX2CC: Christian Cardarello, Avenida Italia 3319, CP11600 Montevideo, Uruguay, South America. QSLs will not be answered until his return in December 2011. Please, direct QSL send a SAE with 2 USDs or a new IRC.

FR8, REUNION ISLAND – Reminder: Frederic, ex-F5INL, will be active as FR8NE from Reunion Island (AF-016) until July 2012. Activity will be on 20/17/15/12/10 meters using mostly CW. QSL direct to Frederic Bossu, 2 Chemin des Grenadiers, 97490 Sainte Clotilde, Reunion Island or by the Bureau.

HB0, LIECHTENSTEIN. Operators Tony/IZ3ESV, Gabriele/I2VGW and Andrea/IZ2LSC will be active as HB0/homecall between June 2-5th. The trio is planning a micro-light and holiday-style operation using CW, SSB and RTTY. The main focus will be on the 30/17/12 meters and the upper HF bands depending on the propagation. They will also try 6 meters. QSL via their home call signs.

HG15, HUNGARY. Look for special event station HG15IPA active through Dec 31st. Activity will celebrate the 15th anniversary jubilee call sign of the International Police Association. Expected to be on 160-10 meters using CW, SSB, RTTY, PSK31 and SSTV. QSOs with this station are valid for the HA-IPARC Award. QSL via HA3JB.

IOTA News

For those of you who want more information on IOTA (Islands On The Air), please read the following:

IOTA 50TH ANNIVERSARY MARATHON (Janaury 1st, 2012, through DECEMBER 31st, 2013). A press release by Roger Balister, G3KMA, RSGB IOTA Manager, states:

"The year 2014 marks the 50th anniversary of the launch of the Islands On The Air (IOTA) Programme by British SWL Geoff Watts, BRS-3129. As a build-up to our celebrations on this occasion, the RSGB IOTA Manager and Committee announce an exciting activity period in which all licensed amateurs world-wide are invited to participate. For a two-year period during 2012 and 2013, IOTA chasers are encouraged to contact as many different IOTA groups as possible, and IOTA activators to play their part by operating from

as many groups as possible, with special emphasis on the less-frequently activated ones. The points system adopted rewards 'Activators' with higher scores for activating the rarer IOTA groups. Certificates and awards will be available to both 'Chasers' and 'Activators' to reflect attainment of graduated bands of performance together with attractive prizes for top scorers. The challenge provides a level playing field for everyone, whether they are complete newcomers to IOTA or are holders of the prestigious IOTA 1000 Islands Trophy, because everyone starts with a clean slate on 1st January 2012. We hope that all our readers will consider ways in which they can support this event. We would like to see work starting now to schedule activity from as many IOTA groups as possible throughout the 24 months. Let us target 500 groups initially in the hope and expectation of being able to raise this higher as the Marathon progresses."

PCARS VE sessions are scheduled for the first Saturday of every even numbered month.



June 4 ~ August 6 ~ October 1 ~ December 3

VE sessions for Technician, General & Amateur Extra start at 10:00 am at the Center of Hope: 1034 West Main St. in Ravenna. Walk-ins are always welcome.

ON EXAM DAY BRING THE FOLLOWING ITEMS:

- 1. A legal photo ID (driver's license, passport).
- 2. When no photo ID is available, two forms of identification must be presented:
 - a. non-photo ID/driver's license (some states still have them)
 - b. birth certificate (must have the appropriate seal)
 - c. social security card
 - d. library card
 - e. utility bill, bank statement or other business correspondence that specifically names the person; or a postmarked envelope addressed to the person at his or her current mailing address as it appears on the Form 605.
- 3. Students may bring any of the above items and/or a school ID, minor's work permit, report card, or a legal guardian may present a photo ID.
- 4. Bring your Social Security Number (SSN) or your FCC issued Federal Registration Number (FRN). VEC's are required by FCC to submit either your SSN or your FRN number with your license application form. If you prefer not to give your SSN, then you may use your FCC issued FRN, if you have one. For instructions on how to register your SSN with the FCC and receive a FRN, visit the FCC's FAQ page and the FCC's registration instructions page.
- 5. If applicable, bring the original and a photocopy of your current Amateur Radio license and any Certificates of Successful Completion of Examination (CSCE) you may hold from previous exam sessions. The photocopy(s) will not be returned.
- 6. Two number two pencils with erasers and a pen.
- 7. A calculator with the memory erased and formulas cleared is allowed. You may not bring any written notes or calculations into the exam session. Slide rules and logarithmic tables are acceptable, as long as they're free of notes and formulas. Cell phone must be silenced or turned off during the exam session. The phones' calculator function may not be used.
- 8. Bring a check, a money order or cash to cover the exam session fee(s). The current fee is \$15.00. Check are made out to: "ARRL-VEC"

Great Lakes Division Convention September 11

As previously reported, the 2011 Great Lakes Division Convention will be held on Sunday, September 11, 2011 concurrent with the Findlay Hamfest. It will be the Great Lakes Division Convention at the Findlay Hamfest. September 11 also is the tenth anniversary of the terrorist attack on the US at the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. Keynote Speaker Allen Pitts, W1AGP, will describe how 9/11 has changed Amateur Radio. Allen is ARRL Media & Public Relations Manager and is a former SEC. He was deeply involved in developing the national Amateur Radio response to disasters since 9/11. Allen is very knowledgeable in emergency communications and, of course, in media relations.

Two series of seminars will follow Allen's presentation. These will be divided into two, concurrent sessions each. An emergency communications series will consist of sessions on the National Traffic System (organized by the Ohio Single Side Band Net), EmComm (organized by Michigan SM

WA8EFK who chairs the ARRL's Emergency Communications Advisory Committee), and D-Star (presented by the Ohio Digital Interconnect Group).

The second series of seminars will cover DX (hosted by the Southeast Michigan DX Association), ATV-Digital TV (Art Tosely, WA8RMC) and QRP Contesting (Tony Luscre, N8ZT).

One feature of the Convention will be an appearance of Matt Tinker, AA4XA who will provide Field Checking of QSL cards. This will be a great opportunity to have QSLs checked for a variety of ARRL and IARU awards without needing to send them to ARRL HQ. Increased use of field checking is one way of decreasing the backlog of QSL cards at HQ at the end of each year.

A post-Convention luncheon or "lunchquet" will begin at 2 PM at a nearby buffet restaurant. A feature of the luncheon will be presentation of Division Awards. See below for the call for nominations for these awards.

Convention sessions will begin at 9 AM and end about 1 PM.

This Month's Final

The overwhelming majority of the time, members tell me they have had excellent experience when dealing with staff at ARRL Headquarters. This is what I would expect. ARRL staff is made of good people who work diligently to do good jobs.

Considering the number of contacts made by members with HQ, it is nearly inevitable that an occasional experience is less than desired. This is particularly expected when we are dealing with people we've never met hundreds of miles away. Consequently I sometimes hear from a member who is displeased over the results of communicating with staff.

What we need to remember is that we . . . and they (staff) . . . are humans. We all deserve to be treated with kindness and respect. We all have good days and bad days. We come from a variety of subcultures which means our outlooks on topics often vary a little. Add to this the fact that very little of our communication is face-to-face so that we are denied the opportunity of seeing facial expressions and other forms of body language that are so important to good communications. Never forget the Golden Rule.

I am always eager to learn of experiences members have when contacting HQ. This is true whether these experiences are perceived as being good or not so good. In telling me of your experiences . . . especially those that are not favorable . . . please tell me as many of the facts as you can. Copies of e-mail exchanges could be very helpful. The dates of contacts as well as the people contacted are also usually helpful.

Simply telling me that the person at the other end of the telephone was not helpful or was impolite is not particularly helpful. It also isn't really very helpful to say only that you had asked for something, that it was promised to you and that you have never received it. Who you contacted, when you contacted them and copies of communication (when available) are critical to reviewing just what happened -- what went wrong -- and how it can be prevented from recurring.

Please keep in mind that communication requires active listening as well as inputting by both parties. It generally is a poor idea to telephone or to write when "you" are quite upset and are not open to good listening. Waiting until after one has cooled off will generally result in a more useful and helpful discussion.

Incidentally, most of what I've said in the above paragraphs has dealt with interactions that seem to have gone wrong. Don't forget to tell me when a contact with staff proved very pleasing. It is always nice to pat someone on the back for service above and beyond the call of duty. I believe very pleasant outcomes far outnumber instances of unfavorable responsiveness.

Field Day 2011 - Need Ops & Loggers




Bring a Friend to Field Day


Even if I got weird looks from Jim (KC8PD) and had some mean things said to

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EmComm

This year at the Dayton Hamvention Rick, K8CAV, and I stopped by the ARES[®] booth at the ARRL Expo and had an opportunity to talk at some length with Mike Corey, W5MPC, who is the League's Emergency Preparedness Manager. Mike clearly has a lot of enthusiasm for emcomm activities. He has been on the job for just over a year and Rick and I thought this was a good chance to ask him about issues concerning the future of ARES[®].

High on that list were the lack of membership requirements as well as standards for participation in training. Although Mike would like to see some changes in these, without committing specifically to what those may be, he was also trying to be realistic in addressing the difficulties of implementing institutional changes in an organization such as the League.



ARES[®] is a field operation of the ARRL, meaning it operates under the direction and control of the elected section managers. League policy is set by the organization's elected division directors who are the members of its board. Getting the board to make substantial changes to a field operation like ARES[®] is no small matter.

ARES[®] has traditionally been a "from the bottom up" operation, meaning that policies and procedures have not been issued by the home office in Newington but are instead created at the county, and sometimes section, level.

Considering that there are some seventy-one sections and 3077 counties it is

easy to understand why there are a multitude of different ways for ARES[®] to do business at the local level, ranging from non-existent to highly organized. Getting them all on the same page without ruffling the feathers of those who don't want to change will be no small challenge.

Hopefully Mike can provide the leadership on this and the ARRL board will act. We'll have to wait and see. If you have questions for Mike you can contact him at <u>mcorey@arrl.org</u>.

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DX CODE OF CONDUCT

#1 - I will listen, and listen and then listen again before calling.

This seems so obvious but it is the most vital thing to do. Careful listening rather than rushing to transmit will get the DX

into your log. You must listen to find out whether the DX is working split and if so, where is he listening? Then you need to listen to the calling stations in order to determine what the DX station is doing. For example, he may be working gradually up or down the pile-up frequency range – and you need to find the best spot to call. And it may be time to ask yourself: "Do I really need to much this hit of DX right new? Can Lumit a while for the nile

to work this bit of DX, right now? Can I wait a while for the pile-up to subside?"

#2 - I will only call if I can copy the DX station properly.

You also need to listen carefully to determine how well you can hear the DX station to be sure you will hear his reply to your call and to avoid causing interference by

transmitting at the wrong time. It is extremely frustrating for a DX station to return a call to a station that is unable to hear him, thereby causing incessant QRM.

#3 - I will not trust the Cluster and will be sure of the DX station's call sign before calling.

Cluster spots often show the wrong call sign. Before you log a station, you should hear the station's call sign on the air – don't trust spotting networks. The DX operator should send his call sign at regular intervals. Unfortunately, not all operators do this!

#4 - I will not interfere with the DX station or anyone calling and will never tune up on the DX frequency or in the QSX slot.

Sadly, this covers a multitude of operators, employing poor operating practices. We are frequently afflicted with "Policemen," people who repeatedly jump in to tell callers that "the DX is listening up" – often adding a gratuitous insult. The rule is quite simple: *never, ever* transmit on the DX frequency for *any* purpose whatsoever.

#5 - I will wait for the DX station to end a contact before calling..

If you transmit before a QSO is over, you are likely to interfere with the exchange of information, lengthening the QSO and slowing the process. It may seem clever to "nip in" as the previous contact is ending but many DX stations don't like it, as such operating may break the pattern of the operator, which is what helps everyone to know when to transmit.

#6 - I will always send my full call sign.

This is essential for CW and SSB, because incomplete calls lead to an extra transmission, slowing the operator's progress with the pileup. If the operator is

responding to partial call signs, it may appear that you should call with only several letters. Generally, this is not the case. *Always use your full call sign*.

#7 - I will call and then listen for a reasonable interval. I will not call continuously.

Continuous calling is selfish and arrogant. With a computer or memory keyer, it is easy to send continuously. Unfortunately, it prevents you from listening and knowing what is taking place. In addition, it raises the QRM floor greatly, making life difficult for the DX station and everyone else.

#8 - I will not transmit when the DX operator calls another call sign, not mine.


Perhaps this is intuitively obvious, but it is a common occurrence. If it is clear that the station is not calling you, *do not transmit*.

#9 - I will not transmit when the DX Operator queries a call sign, not like mine.

In life outside amateur radio it would simply be considered rude to answer when someone else is asked a question! How do you know if the station is calling you? Perhaps the DX operator has a partial version of your call. Is it me? "The timing is right!" Yes, the timing may seem right, but it may also be "right"







for many other stations. If the DX is actually calling you and hears nothing, he will call you again. Then you can call. *Only one letter from your call sign is NOT enough, however.* Calling when not being addressed raises the floor level of QRM and slows progress dramatically.

#10 - I will not transmit when the DX operator requests geographic areas other than mine.

You must recognize and accept that when an operator is calling for a specific geographic area (e.g. NA for North America, AS for Asia), you must not call until the operator's instructions change. Even if his choice appears incorrect, you must follow his instructions. The DX operator is in control. Here's an important point: If a DX operator is working, some area, perhaps North America , and he fails to say so between QSOs, do not begin calling immediately. Call only when it is clear that the operator's instructions have changed. To do otherwise is impolite and simply slows the process.

#11 - When the DX operator calls me, I will not repeat my call sign unless I think he has copied it incorrectly. If you repeat your call sign, the DX station may think that he has your call sign wrong. He might then listen very carefully – again – thus slowing the process. A DX operator will generally log what he has if you say nothing further.

#12 - I will be thankful if and when I do make a contact.

There should certainly be a pride of accomplishment when you get a QSO with a guy in a far-away entity. But before you start basking in the glow of accomplishment, think about the help you received from your partners, perhaps Mr. Icom, Mr. Alpha, and Mr. Force 12. If your ego still feels a need to take ALL the credit, try again. But this time turn off your amplifier and connect your rig barefoot to a dipole. If you get through the pile up this time, then YOU, as the operator, can take more of the credit.

You should also acknowledge that you would not have had the contact without the skill of the operator at the other end who undoubtedly made sacrifices to be there for you. So be thankful for all this help you received.

#13 - I will respect my fellow hams and conduct myself so as to earn their respect.

Respect is about behaving well toward others. DXing is very competitive. If you operate otherwise, you may acquire a bad reputation. DXing will be the most fun for everyone if we all behave with politeness, mutual respect and even a bit of humility!

Assisting the Alabama Tornado Victims

On April 29th, my partner Jake Hasor (Portage County Resident) and I departed the Akron Area Red Cross about 4:30 pm. We were driving the ARC Emergency Response Vehicle (ERV). The ERV is very much like a rescue squad truck as far as size and layout. We were instructed to drive to our HQ in Hoover, AL. Hoover is a southern suburb of Birmingham, AL right off I-65. We drove to just north of Nashville, TN that Friday

night and stopped at a motel in or south of Bardstown, KY. The next morning we departed Bardstown on I-65 and drove through Nashville,



TN, Huntsville, AL onto Hoover, AL. We arrived in Hoover about 4:30 pm where we were checked in to HQ. We drove 712 Miles. Our assignment was to take our ERV up to Rainsville, AL the next morning. Rainsville is north of Gadsden, north on I-59. Rainsville is where the ARC Kitchen #2 was located.

Our mission was to provide Mobile Feeding to the tornado victims in DeKalb and Jackson counties. These counties are in the North Eastern extreme of Alabama. Our Area of Operations (AO) was very rural, even more so than Portage County. There are more cows and chickens in those two counties then there are people. Lots of commercial chicken and cow farms up there, Tyson Foods, Perdue and KOCH Chicken Ranchers were there, plus beef farms.

Most of the residential dwellings were either manufactured or mobile homes, and then some regular stick build wooden homes.

The Southern Baptist Convention set up a very large mobile

kitchen in the parking lot of a Baptist Church in Rainsville, Al. They cooked about 4,000 hot meals for lunch,



and then another 4,000 (approx) meals for Supper every day for almost three weeks total.

The American Red Cross ERVs delivered these meals in the rural area's doing Mobile Feeding.

Inside the ERVs were foam containers and cups, where we

would put the hot food. We would hand the food out the side window of the ERV plus give the folks

bottled water, juices, snacks, plastic forks and knives etc. to eat with.

On our first Sunday of operations we were in Sylvania Township and Heniger Township. Our first stop was at a Baptist Church that got completely demolished, blown off the map. There were about 200 church members sitting in folding chairs among





the church rubble attending services.

After the services we gave them some water, as the Township and Local residents had all ready mobilized and brought food, water, clothing and everything you could want or need in a disaster.



We were there 96 hours after the twister hit, but the local folks kicked in and started to take care of their community. So, we went down the road through the debris field. We found folks that needed and took the food and water. One house that we stopped at and fed the folks, the husband , wife/mother and their 7 year old son survived we offered. There was one guy told us they "Saw the Storm Coming and they all jumped in the bath tub, son first face down, mom second face down, and dad on top Face down". The storm hit and they road it out in the bath tub. The father said that when it was quiet, after the storm passed, they all sat up and much to their surprise, they were sitting out side. Their home was

completely gone. The only thing left was the slab floor and the bath tub. The were actually outside in the sun shine.

Editors Note: George was also a volunteer with MARS in Haiti just after the earthquake hit there. When George sent me the pictures from the Alabama tornado damage I mentioned to him it looked worse than Haiti. He agreed and said in Haiti, the earthquake damaged all the building and they pretty much fell straight down. In Alabama, the tornados twisted up everything and threw everything all over the place - for miles. He said the damage in Alabama was much worse, and the pictures don't express how bad it really was.

It costs about \$20 the first time for the bureau fee, mailing fee, and Amateur Radio plate fee. When renewal time comes around for your Amateur Radio, you can get NEW plates issued (same call sign).

Then you'll have an old plate to bring in to get hung up as a **permanent part of PCARS history**!! The official form for obtaining your Ohio Amateur Radio license plates is on the PCARS Yahoo Group site.

LOTW Shortcut

Do you frequently log in to LOTW to see what new DXCC confirmations have arrived? Here is a shortcut



for established LOTW users that will bring up your list of LOTW confirmed QSOs with boxes checked for your latest DXCC credits.

You may customize the following link and save it in your internet browser Favorites (Internet Explorer) or Bookmarks (Firefox). Simply replace CALL with your call sign and PASSWORD with your LOTW password, then cut and paste the link to your browser URL box. Make sure that the entire text is copied as a single line. Save this link as a favorite or bookmark with a short name such as "LOTW Quick Check". Once this is done, a single mouse click on this favorite does all the work for you.
