Tom, WB8LCD, Russ, KB8DPN, and I were the original instructors. Frank, KD8HGI, has since replaced Russ. Dozens of new hams have joined the ranks after taking the class and it has been our pleasure to get to know them and help them get started in the hobby.

We all know that, as a practical matter, getting your ticket is just the start. Few of us come into the hobby with a wealth of practical knowledge and experience about radios, antennas and so on. Most everyone needs some help getting started, from the most basic tasks such as programming and operating an HT, to those that are much more complicated, like designing and installing a tower and antenna.

So another one of our goals has been to find ways to provide new hams the opportunities for hands-on learning experiences. We have had workshops, kit building, antenna construction, contests and field operations, just to name some of them. Club meeting presentations and the Special Interest Groups are also great ways to learn more about ham radio topics.

But more important than all of those is simply having a fellow ham that you can go to with questions about technical and operational issues. Elsewhere they may be called mentors, in ham radio we know them as Elmers.

That's where we can use your help. Watch for those new faces at the club meetings and folks who have call signs with "KD" prefixes. Introduce yourself and ask them what facets of the hobby they are interested in. Offer your advice and assistance with any problems they may be encountering. Try to avoid the opinion laden comments. They'll hear enough of that from others.

we had a very good discussion regarding ORP DX operating. So we covered DX, Contesting, and QRP in one meeting. What came out of this meeting was a need to have an in-depth discussion of propagation. So the fourth Tuesday of September we will be meeting again and we will be talking about the topics of propagation, working the grey line, and other factors that will help many of us to work more DX. Come and take part in this interesting group.

From what I have seen, there are some very interesting DX opportunities that will be happening in September and even October.

As I do every month, I really want to thank the following for the forecast reports for this month and beyond: the Northern Ohio

Amateur Radio Society, Northern Ohio DX Association, Ohio/Penn Packet Cluster Network (especially Tedd Mirgliotta, KB8NW) for the following DX and IOTA information. Please remember that this report could contain "Pirate/SLIM" operations or busted call signs. Please do yourself a favor and adhere to the old adage of "Work First Worry Later" (WFWL).

DX

5C, MOROCCO (IOTA, LH and WFF Op!). Operators Ruggero/IK2PZC (5C2P),

Leo/I8LWL (5C2L), Fred/IK7JWX (5C2J), Simon/IZ7ATN (5C2SG), Ampelio/IS0AGY (5C2B), Mounaim/CN8QY (CN8QY/p) and Belkaid/CN8QX (CN8QX/p) will be active from the city of Dakhla and the lighthouse (ARLHS WSA-001), which is part of the National Park off the coast of Dakhla (WFF CNFF-007), Morocco, between September 22-29th. Their main purpose of this DXpedition is to activate Herne Island (AF-068) in South Western Sahara IOTA Group(CN), using the call sign 5C2/homecall/p. Activity will be on all HF bands, including 30/17/12m, and 6 meters, using all modes. The team might try an entry in the COWW DX RTTY Contest (September 24-25th) using the call sign 5C2P. QSL via their home call signs, direct or by the Bureau. QSL 5C2SG via IZ7ATN, direct (see QRZ.com). QSL CN8QY/p via I8LWL, direct only. The team is looking for sponsors and contributors to help fund the operation.

7P8, LESOTHO. (Reminder) Arnold, WB6OJB, will once again be active as 7P8JK from here between September 15-22nd. Activity last time was on the HF bands, 40-10 meters using mostly SSB with some CW. QSL direct to his home call sign.

9H, MALTA (Reminder). Jasper, PB2JJ, will be active as 9H3JN from Malta between September 2-14th. Activity will be on 80-10 meters, mostly CW and some SSB also. QSL via his home call sign.

9H, MALTA. Gab, HA3JB, will be on a holiday IPA DXpedition from here and will be active as 9H3IP between September 16-27th. Activity will be on 80-10 meters using CW, SSB, RTTY, PSK31 and SSTV. Operations will also include the CQWW RTTY Contest (September 24-25th) as a Single-Op/ Single-Band (??) entry. QSOs are valid for the HA-IPARC Award. QSL via HA3JB, direct (w/SAE) to: Gabor Kutasi / H-8601 Siófok, P.O.Box 243, Hungary. If you are IPA member please write/add your E-mail address.

9J, ZAMBIA. (Reminder) Chris, ZS6RI (ex-ZD9IR, 5H9IR, EL8RI), will be active as 9J2RI from Zambia for a year or two. However, operations will be on a "6 week on/6 week off" due to his work schedule (6 weeks off he will return home to South Africa). Activity will be on all HF bands using CW, SSB and the Digital modes. QSL via LoTW or direct to: Chris J de Beer, Box 333, Bethlehem, GA 30620 (w/SASE [USA] or SAE w/return postage for other countries). Bureau QSLs are OK, but very slow. LoTW will be uploaded at least once every 6 week rotation, and probably even weekly. Bureau cards will be sent annually.

9Q5, DEM. REPUBLIC OF CONGO - Reminder: CX2CC, is now active as 9Q5OAR from the City of Goma, near the Rwanda border and is there working for the United Nations for one year. He hopes to be active on CW (slow), SSB and the Digital modes. He is using a TS430 transceiver into a Log Periodic or wire dipole. QSL via his home call sign CX2CC: Christian Cardarello, Avenida Italia 3319, CP11600 Montevideo, Uruguay, South America. QSLs will not be answered until his return in December 2011. Please, direct QSL send a SAE with 2 USDs or a new IRC.

9U, BURUNDI. Pierre, ON7CIP, is expected to be active from Bujumbura, possibly as 9U7T (requested call sign). Activity will be limited during his spare time as Pierre is there for work, so this is not a DXpedition. Operations will be on 20 meters SSB and/or PSK31. More details will be forthcoming on QRZ.com. 
That's it for September. I hope that there is something in all the DX opportunities that will interest you enough to get on the air.

Microphone Pigtails

Since I became a ham, I've purchased a fair number of used transceivers. Mostly at hamfests, and most of the time they come without a microphone. I guess I'm probably like many hams that have a favorite microphone anyway, so it's not much of a problem. However, since the manufacturers of every radio I own can't seem to

agree on how the mic should be connected to the transmitter, this creates a problem. You could have six different microphones hanging around, but if you are like me, you'll grab the wrong one and ... well, you know.

My solution was to make an adapter, or "pigtail". Actually, I thought this was my own idea, but I have since learned you can buy these. Anyway, what I do is find the proper plug for the radio and the details on the "pinouts" (the pin on the connector that corresponds to its function). Then I solder a length of cable to the pins and bring them out to 1/8" audio connectors, which mate to the plugs on my favorite microphone and PTT foot switch.

Again, you can purchase these if you don't like to solder. Mine can be made for about one fifth the price of a purchased one. That has saved me enough money to buy my latest rig. It's an MFJ-4906 six meter QRP rig, which has yet another different microphone plug!

Here's the real story:

So, now I'm staring at the microphone cord on my 2 meter rig. It's the one that I mostly use to check in to the Thursday night PCARS net. This plug is one of those stinking "modular" ones and the thing is getting really tired. I beefed up the strain relief on it by wrapping some soft bailing wire around it and applying many coats of

liquid electrical tape. I have put together those modular connectors before and they are a major headache. And how do you keep it from ripping apart? I've got to deal with this thing before I lean back in my chair and the coiled chord yanks out and slaps me in the face while I'm making comments on the net.

Leaning back in my shack chair, without the microphone in hand, I pondered the problem. Scratching my chin, I looked up to the junk on the pegboard hooks on the wall, and saw the answer!

An old computer network cable - man

that plug sure looks familiar. Took it down, plugged it into the radio, and sure enough, it clicked in just like it was made for the rig.


These are eight pin RJ45 connectors and are widely used in many rigs that use an eight pin modular connector. These network cables have the strain relief already molded to the plug. The best part of the project is

that the plugs are transparent, so you can see the colors of the wires, making it very easy to find the correct connections.

I just purchased a Heil headset with boom mic from a fellow in Oklahoma (Lee, KE5CUB). It turns out that this treasure is already compatible with my setup. Plug and play, baby! My digital interface was also assembled to use my so-called "universal" connections, so now I can use digital on any radio including my two meter rig through the new modular pigtail. And if that old microphone cable decides to give up, I still have the other end of the network cable ready to take over the job.

I had always tried to shy away from rigs that have the modular connector. Not anymore. I've soldered many of the round connectors too, and they can be quite tedious. The network cable makes the modular ones a "snap". Another valuable tool I found is on the Heil website, www.heilsound.com. There is an item on the website called "pinouts". It takes you to a site that has microphone hookups on literally hundreds of rigs, as well as schematics on hundreds of microphones.

If you have had training in the Incident Command System you know how well-suited the ICS is to providing a coordinated organization for managing the multi-agency response to a large scale, multi-jurisdictional incident such as this. It would be an exceptional learning opportunity to be able

to participate in any capacity within the ICS management structure for this incident.

In the midst of all this, PCARS member George Riedel, N1EZZ, is currently stationed in North Carolina as a Red Cross volunteer waiting for assignment after the hurricane has swept north of his location. He had just

recently returned from a three week deployment in Alabama following the tragic tornadoes that struck the South this past spring.

George is a personal hero for me. You may recall his presentation at a PCARS meeting about his service as a MARS volunteer in Haiti after the 2010 earthquake there. Severe weather events such as late summer hurricanes in August serve as a harsh reminder that September is National Preparedness Month. Information about personal, family and community preparedness can be found at http://community.fema.gov/connect.ti/READYNPM. Watch for other information about local or regional preparedness activities.

Of course the best way for all of us as ham radio operators to become better prepared for incidents and emergencies is to get involved in activities like RACES and ARES[®] that can provide information, training and practical experience. So follow N1EZZ's example and get involved! You never know when your help may be needed.



However, the demise of Route 66 began in the 1950's as the US began building its interstate highway system, and the highway was officially decommissioned in 1986.
