

PCARS VE Test Sessions


PCARS VE sessions are scheduled for the first Saturday of every even numbered month.

VE sessions for Technician, General & Amateur Extra start at 10:00 am at the PCARS Club Site -705 Oakwood Street in Ravenna. Walk-ins are always welcome. We look forward to seeing you there.

ON EXAM DAY BRING THE FOLLOWING ITEMS:

- 1. A legal photo ID (driver's license, passport).
- 2. When no photo ID is available, two forms of identification must be presented:
 - a. non-photo ID/driver's license (some states still have them)
 - b. birth certificate (must have the appropriate seal)
 - c. social security card
 - d. library card
 - e. utility bill, bank statement or other business correspondence that specifically names the person; or a postmarked envelope addressed to the person at his or her current mailing address as it appears on the Form 605.




- 4. Bring your Social Security Number (SSN) or your FCC issued Federal Registration Number (FRN). VEC's are required by the FCC to submit either your SSN or your FRN number with your license application form. If you prefer not to give your SSN at the exam session, then you may register your SSN with the FCC before exam day. Once you have a FCC issued FRN, you may no longer use your SSN on the application. For instructions on how to register your SSN with the FCC and receive a FRN, visit the FCC's FAQ page and the FCC's registration instructions page.
- 5. If applicable, bring the original and a photocopy of your current Amateur Radio license and any Certificates of Successful Completion of Examination (CSCE) you may hold from previous exam sessions. The photocopy(s) will not be returned.
- 6. A calculator with the memory erased and formulas cleared is allowed. You may not bring any written notes or calculations into the exam session. Slide rules and logarithmic tables are acceptable, as long as they're free of notes and formulas. Cell phone must be silenced or turned off during the exam session and the phones' calculator function may not be used. In addition, iPhones, iPads, Androids, smartphones, Blackberry devices and all similar electronic devices with a calculator capability, may NOT be used.
- 7. Bring a check, a money order or cash to cover the exam session fee of \$15.00. If using a check or money order, the payee is "ARRL-VEC".

Last year the biggest event coming out of England was the wedding of Prince William and Kate Middleton. You might remember I wrote about it and like many of you I received many QSLs commemorating the event. The most beautiful of them I share with you. The call, GR0UAZ was good for only one day and was restricted to 100 Qs. I feel extremely fortunate!



This year there is another special event going on in England, "The Olympics", and as with the wedding there will also be special event stations on the air. Though the number of stations is not known, two stations have received special callsigns: **2012L** in London and **2012W** in Wales. The QSL route is via G4WNF for London and GW1FKY for Wales. Their operating frequencies are:

160m 1.833, 1.843 MHz	80m 3.523, 3.783 MHz	40m 7.023, 7.043, 7.083, 7.143 MHz
30m 10.103 MHz	20m 14.023, 14.073, 14.173, 14.273 MHz	17m 18.083, 18.103, 18.133 MHz

On the 4th and 5th of August, the Annual Pro Football Hall of Fame Festival will be on the air from 8am to 4pm using the call sign **W8AL**. Look for them near 7.265, 14.265,21.365 and 28.365 Mhz. To

acquire a certificate, send a QSL card and \$2 to Roger Gray W8VE, 3506 21st St NW, Canton OH 44708.



Another local special event is Twins Day from Twinsburg. **K8BLP** will be on the air from 11am till 6pm the 5th through the 8th. A QSL card can be obtained from Richard Feldman, K8HGY, Box 30, East Liverpool, OH 43920. If you are lucky enough to visit the festival, you are welcome to operate the special event station. The station is scheduled to operate on 7.210, 14.260, 18.130 and 21.250.

Lost in Translation

Have you ever used one of the on-line translation services that takes a document written in a foreign language and converts it to English? If so, you may have found the results to be amusing or confusing, or both.

I was the lucky winner of the Alliance Amateur Radio Club's Field Day raffle and won a Wouxun HT. By the way, the pronunciation of the company name is something like "o-shing" and not "wox-on" as most of us call it.



Well, as I read the owners manual (yes, some of us actually do that) I couldn't help but chuckle at some of the phrasing. And it made me wonder whether the manual was written by someone for whom English was, to be polite, not their primary language, or, more likely, run through a translating program that produced these gems. All are exact quotes.

From the "Getting Started" page describing the LCD display: "There are various indicators displaying on the screen when powing on. Please refer the below table to learn what the indicators stand for accordingly." Kind of reminds me of the sign at the Amish farm: "Eggs from the barn fresh."



For the Menu Lock Function: "Sometimes if the menu is not need to be operated frequently, you can lock the menu via the programming software." Huh?

How about the squelch function? "Squelch level is about when the signal is strong enough to turn on the squelch function, and when it is weak enough to turn off the squelch function. When the squelch is on, there is voice from the loudspeaker for all of the signaling set by the transceiver."

I don't think that is exactly how squelch was explained in the ARRL's Technician Manual.

And the power save mode? "When the power save is ON, the receiver circuit will be off for the moment, and the re-activate to detect the signals for a while, in order to reduce the battery capacity consumption."

Should the radio not operate properly: "Before the receiver is regarded as being faulty, please double check according to the main problems as following chart. If the problems are still happening, please reset it to avoid some misfunctional operation,

search for assistance from the experienced technician or contact your seller accordingly.

The manual wraps up with this: "Wouxun endeavors to achieve the accuracy and completeness of this manual, but it is still not perfect for any possible omissions or printing errors. All the above is subject to be updated without prior notice."

As Yoda from Star Wars may have put it: "The manual helpful it has been not."

QST Email

Just a quick note about the PCARS QST email program. This is a way that any email of interest to the whole club can be sent by using the address <code>qst@portcars.org</code>. If you send something to that address, it will be sent to a moderator, and the moderator will approve it if it meets the criteria of being of interest to the whole club and ham radio related. The moderator will reject it if it's a cute story about what your sisters kid said to the waiter at the restaurant last weekend.

Anyone can send a message to the QST address, but the moderator will determine whether it goes through or not. Don't take it personal if it doesn't. If you send out a QST, always include your email address in it so any response is sent directly to you. If you "reply" to a qst email, it goes back through the QST system, and if your response is not of interest to the whole club the moderator will reject it.

Always respond to the email address given in the text of any communication!

Amateur Radio License Plates Wanted



We have room for **YOUR** Ham Radio license plate


Dig out an old amateur radio call sign license plate (with your present call sign), clean it up and bring it to be permanently affixed to the wall in the club station.

We have 42 plates now, but we can use more. Don't have ham radio call plates on your vehicle? Well for those of you in Ohio, you can get the plates sent to you by going to any License Bureau office and filling out the special plate registration form.

It costs about \$20 the first time for the bureau fee, mailing fee, and Amateur Radio plate fee. When

renewal time comes around for your Amateur Radio, you can get NEW plates issued (same call sign).

Then you'll have an old plate to bring in to get hung up as a permanent part of PCARS history. The official form for obtaining your Ohio Amateur Radio license plates is on the PCARS Yahoo Group site.



EmComm - In Memoriam

On July 17th, John Mason, the Assistant Director of the Portage County Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (EMA), passed away. John died from an apparent heart ailment as he was driving home from work.

John, who was also a Captain with the Suffield Fire Department, serving as a Paramedic-Firefighter, had been with the EMA since 2004. The breadth and depth of his knowledge of emergency management as well as EMS and fire service operations was simply unmatched in this area.

He was the driving force behind the implementation of the Incident Command System by local first responders. He recognized that ICS concepts and practices, applied to incidents and events that were both large and small, were invaluable for coordinating the effort and enhancing responder safety. Thanks to John, the county now has its own Incident Management Assistance Team.



John's vision for the role that the EMA could fill as a resource for area public agencies and first responders will live on. It is reflected in his projects which included the layout and operation of the county's Emergency Operations Center, the fleet of vehicles and equipment that the EMA can deploy, and Station 30, the EMA's vehicle storage and maintenance facility on SR 59.

Quite simply, John Mason was an invaluable resource and the go-to guy for anyone with emergency management or ICS questions.

Not only a leader, John was a friend and mentor to many of us. He was a patient and persistent teacher who was never reluctant to take the time and expend the effort to improve our skills and knowledge.

John was there from day one when the RACES unit began operations back in 2007. He was a quiet observer for those first few years as he assessed what we were capable of doing. When he was confident that he could rely on us he expanded our opportunities within the EMA, encouraging us to take on tasks outside the realm of amateur radio.

He steered us into advanced ICS training and offered us the opportunity to be members of the Incident Management Assistance Team. He was there for us as RACES evolved into the EMA's Communications Unit which John took pride in as an example of how volunteers can be incorporated into an EMA's operations.

John's unflappable and calm demeanor were a steadying influence no matter what was occurring around him. His deliberate and detailed approach as a first responder and incident manager could also be seen in the craftsmanship of his carpentry and construction skills.

John always expected everyone to perform to the best of their ability. He gave us the training and tools to achieve our mission's goals and objectives. He made it clear that the overall mission was more important than the individuals who staffed the team. John would expect all of us to continue on even though he is gone, and that is how we can honor his memory.

He will be missed by all of us. Godspeed, John.

Ohio QSO Party August 25

From the Ohio QSO Party Web Site: "The Ohio QSO Party occurs on the fourth Saturday of August. The contest period extends from 1200 EDT [noon] to 2400 EDT [midnight] (1600Z Saturday until 0400Z Sunday). All stations may operate the full twelve hours. The 2012 contest is on August 25th."

"Bands & Modes: CW and SSB on 80, 40, 20, 15, and 10 meters. Stations may be worked once per mode on each band; i.e. K8MAD may be worked on both 40 CW and 40 SSB for point credit. Each station may be contacted 10 times (once per each of the 5 bands and once per mode on each band)."

Listen around: 80M CW: 3.545 - SSB: 3.825; 40M CW: 7.045 - SSB: 7.200; 20M CW: 14.045 - SSB: 14.250; 15M CW: 21.045 - SSB: 21.300; 10M CW: 28.045 - SSB: 28.450.

Ohio School Receives ARRL Grant

Mogadore Local Schools, Mogadore, OH received a grant of about \$14,000 from the ARRL Education and Technology Program (ETP). The ARRL Executive Committee recently approved resource grants for 11 schools, including the Mogadore Local Schools. More than 590 schools across the country have received support from the ETP in the form of grants for equipment, curriculum and resources, as well as teacher inservice training through the Teachers Institute on Wireless Technology. Applications for equipment and resource grants are accepted twice each year; application deadlines are May 1 and November 1.

"A central goal of the ETP is to develop a foundation of wireless technology literacy among America's teachers and students. It employs Amateur Radio to explore radio science and electronics and provide hands-on activities that engage students' minds and imaginations, opening doorways into math, science and technology curriculum topics, as well as other core curriculum areas such as geography and language arts," said the announcement of the grants.

"ETP grants for school radio stations are awarded to schools that provide a plan to use Amateur Radio as part of an enrichment program and/or as part of in classroom learning," the announcement continued.

Dear member or visitor,

Amateur Radio continues to be at the brink of major problems -- problems brought to our door by others -- problems that the American Radio Relay League (ARRL) continues to fight and in large part to overcome -- thanks to the support of its members.

Although my message this time will be short, I hope it will be viewed very seriously by its readers; especially by readers who do not belong to the ARRL. I have said for quite some time that Amateur Radio exists thanks to the work of the ARRL. Notice that I did not say our low-range frequency bands; I said Amateur Radio. Note that I did not say DX'ing or Contesting or any number of other sub-categories of activity within Amateur Radio, I said Amateur Radio -- itself -- totally.

Often I overhear people on-the-air say they have no interest in supporting ARRL because ARRL does nothing for them. This generally is heard on UHF or VHF bands. The operator who has made the statement


seems to have the wrong impression that because he or she uses frequencies and modes that provide local communications, ARRL's work has no effect on them. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Wherever we operate from Very Low Frequencies (VLF) through the Low Bands (HF) through Very High Frequencies (VHF) through our GHz bands, it is solely because of ARRL that we can enjoy operating there. Period.

Whether there is an attack on 440 MHz or 40 meters, it is ARRL that leads the defense. It was ARRL that lead the fight to expand the 40M band internationally and is still leading the fight to complete the move of broadcast stations from it. It is the same ARRL that lead the defense to kill the effort just last year to take part of our 440 band and divert it to other use. At the same time, it is ARRL that is leading the effort to expand the 60 M band to develop pre-emptive defense of our bands above 33 cm while at the same time continuing to work for a new band in the 500 kHz range.

ARRL not relevant to some amateurs? Life certainly can be extremely simple when one chooses not to be informed. The truth is that the only amateur operator for whom ARRL may be irrelevant is one who is no longer interested in Amateur Radio.

I wish you good operating, good DX, good contesting, good experimenting, good building, good whatever phase of Amateur Radio lights your interest in hamming is. Occasionally, as you enjoy your operating, give a passing thought and thanks to ARRL for making it all possible.

Disassembly Complete: Heathkit is No More

The St. Joseph Township company that delighted hobbyists for decades and at one time employed up to 1,800 people locally is selling off what's left. The remnants of a once-proud company with a long history in the Twin Cities are now on the auction block.

Owner Don Desrochers confirmed this week that Heathkit is dead. Last known as Heathkit Educational Systems, the company that once employed hundreds of people has closed after defaulting on a lease at 2024 Hawthorne Ave. in St. Joseph Township. The work force at the end was a half-dozen.



In a phone interview from his home in Dallas, Desrochers said he has filed for bankruptcy and a bank now owns what's left of Heathkit. Several bank-seized items are being sold in online auctions. Lori Marciniak, Heathkit's last president and CEO, declined to comment on the company's demise. Desrochers said she and the remaining handful of workers did a good job to the end. "The situation was purely one of the economy," he said. "Heathkit (Educational Systems) was primarily dependent upon federal and state funding for schools. Spending in education continued to drop down, and it was economically unfeasible to continue operating."

The Heath Co. was founded in 1926 as an aircraft company but shifted its focus several times to remain

competitive. After World War II the company switched to the electronics industry and bought a large surplus of wartime electronic parts to build kits. The company once employed as many as 1,800 people in the Twin Cities. Heathkit was a division of the Heath Co., which eventually split to become Zenith Data Systems, which took most of the workers, and Heath/Zenith and Heathkit, which together kept a couple hundred workers, Desrochers said. Heath/Zenith was sold in 1999 to a corporation that moved it out of state. Heathkit stayed in the Twin Cities. Heathkit had left the kit business in 1992. By then its Heathkit Educational Systems division was focusing on selling educational systems, such as hardware and manuals for career and vocational training. In 2008 the company vacated a building at 455 Riverview Drive in Benton Harbor and moved into the 25,000-square-foot section of a 330,000-square foot building in St. Joseph Township owned by Southshore Companies.

In 2011 Heathkit announced it would get back in the kit business. The work force was down to 15-20 people.



"When we got back into the kit business, we were losing the education business faster than we were growing the kit business," Desrochers said. "It was not sustainable." Phil Maki, treasurer of Southshore Companies, said Heathkit abandoned

its lease around March, and Southshore got notice in May that Desrochers had declared bankruptcy and Heathkit would be closed.

"It's a sad thing for the community," Maki said. "A lot of us grew up using Heathkit products, and it's sad they ended the way they did."

Inspired Steve Jobs

Heathkit is mentioned in Walter Isaacson's biography of the late Steve Jobs, co-founder and chairman/CEO of Apple Inc. Jobs talks of visiting the garage of Larry Long, an engineer who lived down the street from Jobs' family. He says Long turned him on to "Heathkits, assemble-it-yourself kits for making ham radios and other electronic gear."

Jobs says the kits helped him realize there was no limit to the things a person could build and understand. "When I was a kid both my dad and the Heathkits made me believe I could do anything," Jobs is quoted as saying.

Desrochers said he bought Heathkit in 2005 and had worked for the company prior to that, as president and CEO from 1995-2000. He said that during that time about 150-175 people worked there. In 2000 Desrochers moved to Texas to pursue another business opportunity. He bought Heathkit when it was offered for sale in 2005 but continued living in Texas. He said closing Heathkit was hard for him. "It was a tough decision, but you can't operate and lose money. Hopefully the employees will find other employment. They were great, loyal employees for a long time," Desrochers said.

John Oliphant of Benton Harbor said he started working for Heath/Zenith in 1984 and later worked for Heathkit, for a total of almost 28 years. "It was a great company, and I enjoyed all my time there. I got to work a lot of different angles in the business. It was a good place to work, and the people there in the end were really good to work with," Oliphant said. "Unfortunately the business was not able to continue." Oliphant, who was a project manager and technical writer for Heathkit, was laid off last December. He now works for Tri-County Computers in Watervliet. "I'm actually doing what I used to write training courses about, repairing and maintaining computer systems," he said.




