So until September 8, 2012 and on behalf of the OSPOTA Committee, 73!



Fall will be here before you know it and the Labor Day weekend will be busy, busy, busy. Picnics, last of the summer trips, and don't forget OSPOTA the Saturday after Labor Day weekend. And even thought there is so much to do, there is still a lot of DX to work.

The bands have been hopping. I hope that everyone got to work Comoros – D64K; Saba – PJ5/K3TRM; and 9M4SLL from Spratly Islands. Sometimes the pileup was fierce but if you stuck to it, you could work them. The middle east and northern Africa have been booming in. I made several Q's with Saudi Arabia and Kuwait. And I finally worked Afghanistan and Vietnam but did it on CW. Also on CW TM1NOI – the DXpedition to Noirmoutier Island. Most of my contacts this go around have been with 100w to see if anyone working barefoot could work these stations. So there is no excuse or saying that can do this since I'm running high power. Remember, CW seems to get through even at lower power than most of you are running.

OK – enough of the soapbox. We have some very good DX coming up in the next few months and I hope that every DX'er out there gets his or her share of the contacts.

As always, want to thank the following for the forecast reports for this month and beyond: the Northern Ohio Amateur Radio Society, Northern Ohio DX Association, Ohio/Penn Packet Cluster Network (especially Tedd Mirgliotta, KB8NW) for the following DX and IOTA information.

This report could contain "Pirate/SLIM" operations or busted call signs. Please do yourself a favor and adhere to the old adage of "Work First Worry Later" (WFWL).

- **5R, MADAGASCAR** (**IOTA Op!**). Moise, F4EZG, will once again be active as 5R8VE, but this time from Nosy Alanana (AF-090) in the Tamatave region September 1-3rd. Activity will only be on 20 and 15 meters. QSL via F4EZG.
- **5T0, MAURITANIA** (**Update**). A group of Polish radio amateurs will be active as 5T0SP between November 24th and December 10th, from Mauritania. They've already got their license which was possible thanks to the great kindness of the l'Autorité de Régulation of Mauretania and with a great help from Jean, 5T0JL. Activity will be on all HF bands, 160-10 meters using CW, SSB and the Digital modes. Their license does not allow for 6 meters operations perhaps it will change but it is not sure now.
- **5Z, KENYA.** Eric, SM1TDE, will be active as 5Z4/SM1TDE from Diani Beach, Mombasa, between November 5-22nd. This will be a family vacation and activity will be limited to how much his XYL and kids allow. Activity will be on 40-10 meters on CW. QSL via his home callsign, by the Bureau, direct or LoTW. He thanks Ted, 5Z4NU, for getting his license application through the system.
- **8Q, MALDIVES.** Juergen, OE4JHW, active as 8Q7OE from the Maldives September 3-14th. Activity will be holiday style on 40-10 meters using SSB and BPSK (mode at night). He will focus on stations from DL, HB0, HB9 and OE, as well as on North and South America. QSL via his home callsign, direct or by the Bureau. Also, LoTW and eQSL.

9/11 SPECIAL EVENT STATIONS.....

- * Members of the Symbol Technologies Amateur Radio Club (STARC), will be operational as N1Y, September 8th and 9th. Activity is commemoratingthe September 11th, 2001, terrorist attacks. They will be operating on 40/20/15 meters using CW and SSB, in the "General" portions of the bands. A special QSL may be had by sending a SASE to the QRZ.com address of W2SBL.
- * Look for special event station N3U/Flt93 (N3U/United Flight 93) to be activated once again between September 8-13th, to remind "Amateur Radio Operators World-Wide" of the tragic events that happened near "Shanksville (Pa), New York City and Washington DC, on September 11, 2001." Operators mentioned are Bob/W3BTX and Roy/W3TEF. QSL N3U/Flt 93 via W3PN, by the Bureau or direct (Please include SASE and enough return postage. If additional postage is needed...your QSL will be returned via the BUREAU). For more details, QRZ.com.
- * Look for Bob/W3BTX and Roy/W3TEF to be active as P49T (P49Towers) from Aruba between September 14-21st. QSL via W3BTX, by the W3 Bureau or direct. Don't QSL via the P4 Bureau or eQSL.
- CR3/CT9, MADEIRA ISLANDS. German operators from the RRDXA will be active once again as CR3L during the CQWW DX RTTY Contest (September 29-30th) as a Multi-? entry. This team has won the 2009, 2010 and 2011 competition from their QTH in Santana (Northern part of the island). The crew is still looking for one or more good contest operators on this mode. The length of stay on Madeira is one week. Communication: English and German languages. If interested please contact Hans, DL1YFF at: dl1yff@gmx.de More information is available on Han's Web page at: http://www.dl1yff.de Also info on the Crew's Web site at: http://www.CR3L.de QSL via DJ6QT. Operators will probably be active as CT9/homecall before and after the contest.
- **D2, ANGOLA.** Craig, MM0SSG, active as D2SG from Luanda and will be there until around October 31st. Activity will be limited because he is there on a work assignment on an off-shore oil platform. Operations will only take place when he is on land. Reported QSNs show activity has been on 10 meters CW. QSL via GM4FDM, direct or by the Bureau.
- **EI80, IRELAND (Special Event)**. Members of the Irish Radio Transmitters Society (IRTS) will be active as EI80IRTS throughout 2012. Activity is to celebrate the IRTS's 80th anniversary. QSL via EI4GXB or LoTW.

FT5W & FT5X, CROZET AND KERGUELEN. Gildas, TU5KG, will once again be active a TU5KG/MM in the vicinity of Crozet (FT5W?) and Kerguelen (FT5X?) during November and December. QSL via F4DXW.

(**Update**) Members of the Black Country DX & Contest Group active as MS0OXE from the **Isle of Tiree** (IOSA NH04, SCOTIA DI10, IO66ML, WAB NL94), in the Inner Hebrides Is. - September 13-21st. Operators mentioned are Simon/M0VKY, James/ M0YOM, Drew/G7DMO, Brian/G0JKY and Terry/G4MKP. Activity wiil be on 80-10 meters using CW, SSB and RTTY. QSL via M0URX OQRS. Logs will be uploaded to ClubLog, LoTW and eQSL.

KH8, AMERICAN SAMOA. Bill, N6MW, and possibly 1-2 other operators (TBA) will be active as KH8/N6MW from a hotel in Tutuila, south of the Pago Pago harbor area (to avoid mountain low angle cut off) between November 8-19th. Activity will be on 160-10 meters using mainly CW, but some SSB and RTTY when things slow down. They will have 2 stations with one on the air 24/7. Focus is to work as many stations as possible, 160 meters and looking for EU. 15 meters is the anticipated prime band. QSL via LoTW. For direct and bureau QSL

NH8, SWAINS ISLAND. The following press release was sent out on July 16th [edited]: "Swains press release # 2 -- Craig/K9CT and Joe/W8GEX are happy to report that preparations for the NH8S Swains Is. DXpedition are on schedule. The 20 man international team should be on the island from September 4th, thru September 17th. Swains is # 31 most wanted worldwide. Will operate all bands - SSB, CW & RTTY. A big thanks goes to John/N7CQQ and Paul/W8AEF for their time in building and testing the SVDA's that will be used. Thanks also to Paul/W6XA and Tom/N4XP for testing the radios, amps and laptops. All of the equipment has been shipped to Arnie/N6HC in California for the upcoming departure via cargo ship later this week. The QSLing will be handled by Joe/AA4NN with help from his XYL Margarett. Plans are to upload logs daily by satellite phone from the island to Clublog.

OD, LEBANON. Luigi, IV3XNF, will be on a United Nations Interim Force (UNIFIL) mission in Lebanon between May and October. He will be staying on a military base but plans to be active during his free time and operate as a QRP station using the callsign OD5/IV3XNF/QRP. Activity will be on 80-10 meters using a Yaesu FT-817ND into a Carolina Windom 80 antenna or an End-Fed Half-Wavelength Antenna (EFHWA - fishing pole). Preferred modes are CW and Digital. XP, GREENLAND. Henning, OZ1BII/OU2I, will be active as XP2I from club station XP1AB in Kangerlussuaq between September 13-17th. Activity will be CW only. QSL via his home callsign.

ZA, ALBANIA. Operators Petr/OK1FCJ, Pavel/OK1DX and David/OK6DJ will be active as ZA/homecall between September 27th and October 3rd. Activity will be on all HF bands, 160-10 meters, including 30/17/12 meters, using CW, SSB and RTTY. The team will also be active in the CQWW DX RTTY Contest (September 29-30th) as ZA/OL8R. The equipment will be an Elecraft K3 and Kenwood TS850 into a SpiderBeam (20/15/10m), 40-10m vertical, 80m dipole and 160 meter LW. Activity will be on 160-10 meters using only SSB. His equipment is a Yaesu FT-2000 into a directive Multiband and Inverted V dipole. For now the QSL is only via LoTW. All information to receive a QSL card will be published very soon on QRZ.com. The log is also uploaded to ClubLog. LAST MINUTE UPDATE (Per QRZ.com): Paul states, "ZD9KN log will be uploaded in its entirety to LoTW within 1 year from the end of the DXpedition. The information for the QSL will be published after the end of the DXpedition. The QSL card is via my QSL Manager IZ0UIM or LoTW. The internet connection is not very good unfortunately, so there may be delays in response." Paul recommends that you check his log before sending a QSL card because there are PIRATES using his callsign. There was a report of a PIRATE on Sunday morning, August 19th, at 0955z.




RAC Announces New Ontario Section Boundaries, Abbreviations

In March 2012, the Radio Amateurs of Canada (RAC) announced that it would split its Ontario Section into four new Sections "to create a management model that better communicates with, and represents the interests of, the overall Ontario amateur population." The new Section boundaries go into effect as of September 1, 2012.



On August 8, RAC Chief Field Services Officer Doug Mercer, VO1DTM/VO1DM, announced the new Section boundaries, names and abbreviations:

- Ontario North (ONN): All of Northwest Ontario, including Manitoulin Island, Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands, Killarney, the cities of Greater Sudbury & North Bay & Nipissing District.
- Ontario East (ONE): Algonquin Park, Renfrew, Hastings, Prince Edward, Haliburton, Peterborough and Northhumberland Counties, and the cities and counties to the east.
- Greater Toronto Area (GTA): The City of Toronto and the Regions of Halton (including the City of Burlington), Peel, York and Durham.
- Ontario South (ONS): Parry Sound District, the counties of Simcoe, Grey, Bruce, Dufferin, Wellington, the City of Hamilton, the Region of Niagara and the remainder of Southwestern Ontario.




"I am also thrilled to advise that all four Section Manager positions have been filled," Mercer said. "I will circulate a formal introduction in the weeks to come."

This new change will affect ARRL contests and Field Day. Details may be found on the web at, http://www.arrl.org/news/rac-announces-new-ontario-section-boundaries-abbreviations.

According to Mercer, several vendors of logging and contest software have also announced changes, but some will not be effective until January 2013. He advises to verify with the vendor well in advance of the upcoming contests.

Is Amateur Radio Too Focused on EmComm?

On the Ham Radio Help Group, a Yahoo Group mailing list for anyone looking for help with anything related to amateur radio, one ham asked "Over lunch today I read the September issue of QST, which is heavily EmComm oriented. The articles were interesting, but the op-ed piece on page 98 seemed a little over the top to me...Has this focus of this intensity always been a part of ham radio and I just wasn't expecting it? How has it evolved over the years?"

To answer the question, another replied by posting Section 97.1, namely the principles behind the amateur radio service:

Sec. 97.1 Basis and purpose. The rules and regulations in this part are designed to provide an amateur radio service having a fundamental purpose as expressed in the following principles:

- (a) Recognition and enhancement of the value of the amateur service to the public as a voluntary noncommercial communication service, particularly with respect to providing emergency communications.
- (b) Continuation and extension of the amateur's proven ability to contribute to the advancement of the radio art.
- (c) Encouragement and improvement of the amateur service through rules which provide for advancing skills in both the communication and technical phases of the art.
- (d) Expansion of the existing reservoir within the amateur radio service of trained operators, technicians, and electronics experts.
- (e) Continuation and extension of the amateur's unique ability to enhance international goodwill.

He went on to say, "I think that 97.1(a) addresses your question."

I like that reply a lot. First, it shows that providing emergency and public-service communications has been a

part of amateur radio since its beginnings. Some hams are extremely focused on this, and I applaud them. In my opinion, the piece referred to in the latest QST was not over the top.

I think, however, that some hams do sometimes go overboard on EmComm, and act as if it's the only reason that ham radio exists. It's not. As you can see, the rules describe five different "purposes" for amateur radio. EmComm might be the first, but it's only one of five. We need to keep in mind the other four as well. I personally like (e), and would like to see amateur radio actually do more to promote international good will.

What do you think?

EmComm

This issue of the newsletter comes out on the first of the month, and not just the first of any month, but the first of September which happens to be National Preparedness Month. More on that in a moment.

I want to use this column to suggest that you pick the first of every month as the day that you use to take care of the simple and basic task of making sure that all of your radios and battery packs are fully charged. It will take a few months for it to become a habit, but before you know it you will be doing it without giving it a thought.



Consider how easy this chore can be, yet how many benefits can result from it, including having fully charged batteries. Depending on the type of battery or your personal practice, you may want to leave the radio on for a day or so to discharge the battery. Then dig out the charger, plug or drop the radio in, and charge it following the manufacturer's recommendations. If you have spare battery packs, swap each one in and out of the radio for charging.

Spend some time fiddling with the radio and practice changing settings and programming it. Attach external mics and headsets and check their operation. When the battery pack is fully charged, verify its voltage. Check batteries for damage or malfunction when they are charging. They don't last forever.

If you have any other rechargeable batteries, from AA's to deep cycle twelve volt, charge all of them. If you do this on the first of each month you will never stand there scratching your head wondering when was the last time you charged them. It will always have been the first day of the past month.

More importantly, if you set aside the time to take of this basic yet important task it is likely that while you are doing it the thought will occur to you "Hey, what about the other emergency preparedness stuff I should be checking on and maintaining on a regular basis?"





If you need some help figuring out what those things might be, take a look at FEMA's http://www.ready.gov web site. From brochures to checklists,

whether for families or businesses, you will find a ton of helpful

information. You can also find more information at http://publicsafety.ohio.gov/NPM/index.stm which is the ReadyOhio web site.

Check those sites out and get to work on making things safer for you and your family by being better prepared. And now that you are finished reading this column, it's the first of the month, start charging those batteries!

My Nickels Worth

The past few months have seen me encouraging hamfest/swap committees and DXCC Field Checkers to get together and offer QSL card checking at local hamfests. Several hamfest already do this, but coverage of the three Sections in this Division should be better than it is.

I've stated that field checking using the new online DXCC submission system will provide clear benefits to all ARRL members -- even those who do not chase DX. It is no secret that one of the most labor-intensive tasks

performed at HQ is the manual entry of QSL cards into the HQ file system. It is this file system that is the basis for determining if an amateur has completed the requirements for DXCC and other on-air awards. It is because of the need to enter each QSL into

the system by hand that we have long experienced rather substantial backlogs and delays in processing QSL submissions during the months before and after the end of each year. In an effort to clear this backlog, substantial numbers of hours of overtime are devoted each year. In other words, under the QSL entry system as it existed, many members became quite displeased over the significant waits to have their QSL submissions processed. HQ's effort to increase the processing speed of the backlog has involved substantial extra cost.

By using the new online DXCC application system, manual entry of QSL information by HQ staff is avoided -- thereby, reducing the amount of time required by HQ staff to process a DXCC application. Entering QSL date is done directly by the DXer who takes his QSLs and a print-out of his entry to a Field Checker instead of mailing them to HQ. The Field Checker ensures that data on the printout is consistent with the information on the QSLs the DXer presents to him. The approved printout is then sent to HQ where a comparison of the printout with the online file submitted by the DXer is performed and the Q's entered are eligible for credit. Provided the file and the data on the printout agree, the requested award is issued -- all with greatly less time and effort than is required of HQ staff to type in QSL info.

As footnote to this discussion, be aware that to become a Card Checker, one agrees to check cards at a minimum of one hamfest/convention each year. Of course, it would be illogical to expect a Checker to be available to go to any hamfest regardless of its location and the date on which it will be held. Nonetheless, we have enough Card Checkers strategically located throughout the Division to make it practical to have Card Checkers visit suitably-sized hamfests/swaps in every region of Kentucky, Michigan and Ohio.

Appearing at a hamfest; however, is not all that is needed to make the online DXCC QSL entry program the huge success it can be. The hamfest committee needs to schedule the checker early enough so that his appearance can be promoted along with promotion of the hamfest. And .

. . be sure to indicate "Q" on the application to have your hamfest sanctioned by ARRL, or send me an e-mail letting me know you will have a Card Checker present. I'll indicate QSL CHECKING when I list your hamfest in my Words.

A list of Card Checkers is available at www.arrl.org/dxcc-card-checker-search.

The Board and HQ have made it possible for hamfest/swap committees and Card Checkers to work together in a much more effective manner to save effort, time and cost while improving service to members. Several hamfests are already taking advantage of this new manner of operation.

Will other committees step up to extend the savings?

New Information on DXCC Card Checkers

I am pleased to say that rules for appointing DX Card Checkers were modified at the July meeting of the Program & Services Committee (PSC) of the ARRL Board of Directors. The modification increased the number of Checkers a director can appoint. This means that I am able to appoint two additional Checkers in the Great Lakes Division. The purpose of the rule change is to increase the convenience to members of having QSL cards checked for ARRL awards. It also can ensure adequate coverage of divisions in meeting the objectives of the new, online DXCC QSL entry program. This program benefits members by making it easier to have cards checked and by decreasing the effort (i.e. the amount of person-time) required of staff to process DXCC applications.

To date, I have appointed one new Checker to cover the northeast part of Ohio. The appointment is being processed at HQ and should become effective soon. The second of my new appointments is under discussion.

The prime objective in increasing the number of Card Checkers is to make it more practical for hamfest committees to schedule (and promote) the attendance of a Checker. Publicized attendance of a Card Checker at a hamfest makes it easier for people to submit QSLs for operating awards. Using the online entry program reduces the effort required by HQ staff to process awards applications. When fully utilized, online entry can reduce the expense of overtime required to manage the annual, frustrating, end-of-year backlog of submissions.

On August 3, the ITU updated its Table of International Call Sign Series to reflect a call sign change for Niue. The island will now have the entire E6 prefix block. Niue -- an island approximately 1500 miles northeast of



New Zealand -- is a self-governing island nation that has been in free association with New Zealand since 1974. Prior to the change, the island used

ZK2. According to the CIA World Factbook, Niue is about 1.5 times the size of Washington, DC, and has a population of almost 1300 people.

Vanity Call Sign Fee to Increase September 4

On August 3, the FCC announced via a Final Rule in the Federal Register that the cost of an Amateur Radio vanity call sign will increase 80 cents, from \$14.20 to \$15. The new fees take effect 30 days after publication, making September 4, 2012, the first day the new fee is in effect. Earlier this year, the FCC released a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking and Order (NPRM), seeking to raise the fee for Amateur Radio vanity call signs.

The vanity call sign regulatory fee is payable not only when applying for a new vanity call sign, but also upon renewing a vanity call sign for a new 10 year term. The first vanity call sign licenses issued under the current Amateur Radio vanity call sign program that began in 1996 came up for renewal six years ago.

The FCC is authorized by the Communications Act of 1934, as amended to collect vanity call sign fees to recover the costs associated with that program. According to the FCC, the fees that are collected from vanity call signs are used to offset the cost of monitoring and researching new call sign requests to prevent the issuance of duplicate call signs. When asked why the fee is payable upon renewal, the FCC stated in 2011 that "[m]ore than likely, fees that are collected only on new issues and at the time of changes in call signs will not generate sufficient revenues to offset the cost of managing and monitoring this work at the Commission, the FCC stated

in 2011. Therefore, we conclude that the basis upon which the Commission collects fees on Amateur Radio Vanity call signs will not change."

The vanity call sign fee has fluctuated over the 16 years of the current program -- from a low of \$11.70 in 2007 to a high of \$70 (as first proposed in the FCC's 1994 Report and Order). In Fiscal Year 2012, the FCC expects to grant 14,300 vanity call signs, bringing in \$214,500 from the vanity call sign program, and looks to recover a total of \$339,844,000 in fees from all the Services that it regulates.



Nick Pittner, K8NAP Receives the Allan Severson Memorial Award

His quiet work in the Ohio Statehouse the past several years gave the Amateur Radio operators in the Ohio Section a new set of legislative tools focused on antennas. For that work, ARRL State Government Liaison Nick Pittner, K8NAP of Plain City was made the Nineteenth recipient of the Allan Severson Memorial Award. The award was presented to Nick at the ARRL Ohio State Convention, held at the Columbus Hamfest on August 11th.

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The Allan Severson Memorial Award is bestowed on an amateur radio operator in the Ohio Section who has demonstrated a continuing dedication to the advancement of amateur radio and to the Ohio Section. Usually one Ohio Section member is awarded per year and usually at the Ohio Section Conference in September.

The award had been established in 1992 and was named "Ohio Ham of the Year" until 1999. That year it was renamed after Allen, of Lakewood, Ohio, who had become a silent key in 1997. The award winners listed here are all hams who, like Allan Severson, have dedicated themselves to the advancement

of the American Radio Relay League in Ohio. Although Allan had served the Section as Section Manager and went on to a distinguished career as Great Lakes Division Director on the ARRL National Board of Directors, the annual award announcement only mentions one sentence about him which is part of every memorial award certificate. That sentence quickly demonstrates the reason for the renaming of this award. "Allan's devotion to serve amateur radio inspired a whole generation of Ohio Section leadership."


The next step would be to go to the SPAR website and submit your information (http://www.spar-hams.org/index.php?pg=11).

On-Line DXCC



- Online DXCC provides an alternative to filling out and submitting the paper <u>DXCC Application</u>
 <u>Form and Record Sheet</u> by hand. You can use this system to apply for a new <u>DXCC award</u> or
 endorsement. Submitting your DXCC application using Online DXCC is easier than making a paper
 application. It will also save you time and money.
- Advantages of submitting your DXCC application using Online DXCC include:
 - You'll pay *significantly lower* award fees when you submit your DXCC application through Online DXCC. In particular, the Application fee and the Extra QSO fee for Online DXCC are half those of a traditional paper application.
 - o Making your DXCC submission with Online DXCC is more accurate than a paper application that you fill out by hand because typographical errors are eliminated (except for the callsign). There will be no data entry errors at ARRL HQ because the contents of your Online DXCC application are being transmitted directly to the DXCC system at HQ.
 - o Making your DXCC submission using Online DXCC speeds up the processing of your application because the information on the *DXCC Award Application* and *DXCC Record Sheet* do not have to be manually entered into the DXCC system by ARRL HQ staff. And the more applicants who use this system, the smaller the backlog of applications and the faster the turnaround will be for all DXCC program participants.
- The system saves the QSL card and application information that you enter for future access. You may enter information from your QSLs as you receive them, and then submit your cards for

- checking when you are ready to apply for a DXCC award or endorsement.
- Your QSL cards still need to be checked, either by a <u>DXCC Card Checker</u> or sent to <u>ARRL HQ</u> for checking.
- Any radio amateur in the world, ARRL member or non-member, may use this system. If you are applying for a DXCC award:
 - with a U.S. call sign you must be an ARRL member. If you are not yet a member, you can create an Online DXCC account, begin entering your QSL card information right now and then join the ARRL when you are ready to submit your application.
 - o with an overseas portable U.S. call sign (like TF/NN1N) you must be an ARRL member.
 - o with a non-U.S. call sign you do not need to be a member of ARRL.

Hams to Put Nine Azorean Islands On the Air in One Weekend

Stretching over a distance of 305 miles from east to west, the nine populated islands of the Azores count for a single DXCC entity and three IOTA groupings. A group of radio amateurs from eight countries and the

Azores will be putting these islands on the air September 28-30 for the <u>Azores 9 Islands Hunt</u>, offering an opportunity for the world to contact these nine islands during one single weekend.

Throughout the world Amateur Radio has played an important role in providing communications during disasters and emergencies for more than 100 years. The team gathering



in the Azores for the Azores 9 Islands Hunt will also be promoting the role of Amateur Radio disaster communications. While the Azores enjoy year-round nice weather, the islands are not immune to natural disasters. The Azores are situated on three of the largest tectonic plates, making the islands susceptible to powerful earthquakes. In recent years, heavy rains have created mudslides severely impacting the infrastructure and resulting in evacuations.

This 24-hour operating event is scheduled for Saturday, September 29 at 1200 UTC to September 30 at 1200 UTC. According to organizers, the stations will be active starting Friday, September 28 as soon as they become operational. The stations plan to be operating 40, 20 and 17 meters on CW and SSB as follows:

- CW: 7.000-7.015 MHz; 18.080-18.090 MHz; 14.050-14.065 MHz
- SSB: 7.175-7.195 MHz; 18.120-18.135 MHz; 14.250-14.275 MHz

The following islands and stations will be on the air:

- Santa Maria: CU1ARM San Miguel: CU2ARA Terceira: CU3URA Graciosa: CU4ARG
- Sao Jorge: CU5AM Pico: CU6GRP Faial: CU7CRA Flores: CU8ARF Corvo: CU9AC

All QSOs will be confirmed with special full-color cards through via the bureau network. Direct QSL requests should be made via Jose Melo, CU2CE. Prizes will also be awarded. Please visit the Azores 9 Island Hunt website for more details.

The Azores Islands Hunt Lottery

Those making a QSO with at least 5 different islands will have a corresponding number of tickets placed into a lottery for a free trip to the Azores. For example, if you have QSOs with 7 islands you will get 7 lottery tickets. Additionally, the <u>first</u> 25 operators that make QSOs with all 9 islands will be eligible for a second lottery draw. QSOs qualifying for the the Azores Islands Hunt must take place between these times:

• **Start**: 29-September-2012 1200Z **Finish**: 30-September-2012 1200Z Each island counts only once.

The two winning tickets will be drawn on October 15, 2012 and the winners will be announced both on http://azores-islands-hunt.com and http://www.visitazores.com. The free trips are from the closest airport served by SATA; the package includes the flights, accommodation and transfers within the Azores.

A special log search tool powered by Club Log will be available either during or immediately after the weekend via our web site.

Antenna Cabling at Club Site

You may have noticed an upgrade in process at the club site radio room. There has been an ongoing project to upgrade the antenna lines to the HF stations, and make it easier to change which antenna each station is operating on.

This is accomplished by the antenna lines all coming down to the gray break-out box mounted on the wall at the far end of the radio room near the electrical panel. Inside the box, are three lines with connectors for each of the three antennas. Ultimately, each station will have a coded coax line entering the breakout box at the bottom. Each of those lines can be manually switched via the coax connectors to connect any radio with any antenna. We still need to cut and route the coax under the upper shelf to each station, but that should be accomplished soon.

In the process, each antenna line was cut where it enters the building, Ed, K8IV installed Polyphaser coaxial lightning protectors via the same grounding plate that the commercial equipment is grounded to. In the future, we'll be checking those grounds to make sure that they are all still active after having been there the past 20/30/50 years....



A short jumper will be provided so that the tri-plexer can be connected to the beam antenna and then multiple radios run off it at the same time on 10, 15 and 20 meters. This should get it's first serious workout during the October CA QSO party operation.




