PCARS VE Test Sessions

PCARS VE sessions are scheduled for 10:00 am on the first Saturday of every even numbered month.

April 6th, June 1st, August 3rd, October 5th and December 7th

What to Bring to the Testing Session

- \$15 is the current test fee. We prefer the exact amount in cash or a check made out to: ARRL-VEC
- A government photo id (drivers license or state ID card preferred).
- Your Social Security Number or FCC Federal Registration Number. We are required to submit either your Social Security Number (SSN) or your FCC Federal Registration Number (FRN) with your application. If you are upgrading, your FRN is on your current Amateur Radio license.
- A pen (black ink) and pencil (we can loan you either or both)
- If you already have an Amateur Radio license: The original (and one copy) of any current (unexpired) amateur radio operator's license issued to you.
- If you've already passed a test: The original (and one copy) of any document that you will use to prove you've already passed a test element. These documents may include:
 - An unexpired Certificate of Successful Completion of Exam (CSCE) indicating the credit(s) earned indicating the credit(s) earned.
 - Pre March 21, 1987 Technician license (this provides credit for the Element 3 (General) exam).

Skywarn Training

The 2013 National Weather Service Skywarn training will be held starting at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, April 3rd, in the cafeteria of the Maplewood Career Center which is located at 7075 St. Rt. 88 in Ravenna.



This year's training is sponsored by the Communications Unit of the Portage County Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management. Following the NWS presentation there will be an update provided Mike DiCarro, KD8FLZ, Emergency Coordinator for ARES® of Portage County, on ARES® Skywarn and severe weather nets.

The NWS Skywarn training is open to the general public but is especially recommended for members of the safety forces and amateur radio operators. The amateur radio community has a long history of working with and providing assistance to the NWS. The ARRL has a Memorandum of Understanding with the National Weather Service to further that commitment.

CW and Field Day 2013


Greetings from the cold and snowy side of the upcoming 2013 ARRL/PCARS Field Day!!

EmComm

A recent event provided a stark demonstration that we can never be quite sure when a disaster may strike no matter how closely the experts are monitoring the situation.

On February 15th, the whole world was waiting for the all clear as a 150 foot wide asteroid was to pass

within about 17,000 miles of the planet. A few hours before the anticipated flyby, a ten ton meteor blasted into the atmosphere over Russia. The blast from the explosion of the meteor caused tens of millions of rubles damage. No one, not even the astronomers, had a clue that it was coming.

The lesson for us is that we should never be too complacent. For instance, just because a weather forecast doesn't indicate that our region is at risk when the storms are coming, don't assume that we get a free pass. Being prepared means just that. You should be prepared all of the time, especially if you are a ham who may be assisting with emergency communications!



As an update to last month's column, we recently held a meeting of the ARES® Emergency Coordinators for District Five. All except one of the current EC's were able to attend.

We met at Polinori's Restaurant in Alliance which gave us the opportunity to get to know each other better over dinner before we settled in for a discussion of current and future district issues. It was great to see how active and engaged all of the EC's are in their own communities.

Ongoing goals will be to provide an open exchange of information among the EC's so that they keep each other informed about ongoing activities in each county, particularly current training opportunities and special events for which they need additional volunteers.

Those counties that do not currently have operational plans in place are drafting them. In the meantime, a district-wide operations plan will be developed to provide both a mechanism and procedures for the counties to assist each other during times of need.

As always, watch for announcements of upcoming public service events in Portage County and around the area (hey, the Cleveland Marathon will be here before you know it, once again on Dayton weekend, Sunday, May 19th) and volunteers, new and experienced, are always needed.

One other update to add. Due to the additional duties as District Five DEC, I have decided to resign my position as the Emergency Operations Officer for Ohio Army MARS. A replacement has not yet been named. I really appreciated the opportunity to serve in that position and I learned a great deal from it.

Why Do We Have "SIGs"

I'd like to have you read the words of Dave Craig, VE6DKC, Treasurer, Chapter # 151, of the Quarter Century Wireless Association. I totally agree with what Dave had to say and since he said it so well, why should I try to improve on it.

"Amateur Radio sure has changed since I was first licensed in 1963! Compact rigs prevail; no more 'boat anchors'! Software defined radios are becoming more and more common. The Internet has become an all-encompassing tool to some, and master to others. Paradoxically, while areas of interest for Hams have expanded greatly, licensing requirements have been 'watered down' to the point where it has become much easier for folks to obtain their license. While many clubs provide 'basic Ham radio' courses (without the need for CW which I found extremely challenging back in '63!) the scope of our hobby has become so expanded that simply obtaining one's license can at times leave the 'Newbie' so confused as to discourage him or her from pursuing the hobby in a way that satisfies their initial reason(s) for wanting to become a Ham! VHF/UHF operation? ARES? DXing on HF? Contesting? Digital? Experimenting? ... and lots more related areas, which are available to all of us. But, which direction to take? Enter the 'Elephant' in the room! No, not that elephant, but the helpful, experienced Ham who is willing to take the 'new guy / gal' under his/her wings so to speak, in order to cultivate the new Ham's interest in the many aspects of Ham radio. I know of very successful Ham radio clubs who do a great job of sponsoring and running evening courses for those interested in obtaining their 'basic' (and also 'advanced') Ham radio license, but whose members do not do such a good job of providing follow up 'hands on' practical assistance to the individual once the person is licensed!"

I believe that Dave hit it on the head when he says that "Newbies" need to be encouraged to look for a seasoned HAM to give them one on one help to really get involved in our great hobby. I Special Interest Groups - Every Month at the Club Site - 7 pm also believe that PCARS certainly does this but we need to do more to encourage new hams to take advantage of what our club has to offer. 



CW/QRP Special Interest Group

But we are talking about Tuesday.... Tuesday, February 12th, 2013 at the CW/QRP SIG to be exact.

I was asked by Tom, WB8LCD, to present some "easy up" style antennas to the group. Tom thought it would be a great idea being just a few days before FYAO... and it was (a great idea, that is). The conversation always seems to begin on topic but moves in other directions and tonight was no exception. From antennas to QRP radios and a bunch of fun stuff in between.

I began by showing several wire and vertical antennas. I was able to demo many "homebrew" antennas made from inexpensive wire and insulators from common items from one of many junk boxes. Wire antennas were either long wire or fed with twin lead (300 ohm) I even brought out the homebrew open wire feed line antenna.... yes the open wire feed line was homebrewed.... (see PCARS Newsletter - August 2008 "Lo Buk Antenna" article, page 10).

I had other "metal" antennas such as the Miracle Antenna, an MFJ Walkabout type, and a multi band compact Outbacker antenna. We also discussed antenna tuners, an Emtech and the Elecraft T1 tuner were available for show and tell, both definitely capable performers in the "easy up" arena.

During the presentation the Miracle Antenna was attached to the back of my Yaesu FT817 to demonstrate the need for the "the other half" of the antenna. A significant increase in receive performance was heard when a good counterpoise was used as a ground connection to the FT817. I think one of the attendees had a renewed interest in the Miracle Antenna after the demo.

So to close the night I said, "not much is better than a dipole cut for the frequency of operation" and "if there ain't no propagation, there ain't no QSO". Thank you all for your attendance and participation...... see you on the QRP bands soon.




Charlie the Tuner's HF High-Lites

I am writing this at 7:50 in the AM and I just turned my rig on and set the DX cluster. There are already 4 stations posted: Spain, Saudi Arabia, Taiwan, and the Solomon Is. And V44KAO just popped up from St. Kitts.

I know that many of you have to work and are not able to be at your rigs in the AM or during the day and I apologize if I seem to be rubbing it in. But there are weekends and holidays that you can be on the air and working DX.

I've been asked how 10 meters is and I keep saying that 10 and 15 are really hopping. Out of my last 96 contacts, only one has been on 20 meters which normally has been my favorite band. The rest have been on 10



and 15. But I have to tell you that 10 meters has really changed my outlook as to where I would want to operate given any type of opening at all.

I continue to encourage you to get on 10 meters while it is still open. And please let me know what you find on 10 and also on 15.

And let me remind you that those who have an interest in DX please join us on the fourth Tuesday every month at the club site for our DX/Contesting Special Interest Group. Bring some of your interesting QSLs that you have received so we can all ooo and ahhh over them. Also bring your questions and or problems regarding working DX and get some great information that will help you get that elusive DX entity you have been chasing.

Also for those of you into emergency deployment, there is a brand new contest designed around rapid deployment. **NEW CONTEST (RaDAR 2013)**. You will find some information further down in this column.

Ok, let's take a look at what we might expect in the next few months. As I have been doing, I have left in a few items from last month's column and have included several new ones. And for you who like to work DX and get IOTA points also, boy are there a lot of things happening in the next few months.

I want to thank the following for the forecast reports for this month and beyond: the Northern Ohio Amateur Radio Society, Northern Ohio DX Association, Ohio/Penn Packet Cluster Network (especially Tedd Mirgliotta – KB8NW) for the following DX and IOTA information.

As always, this report could contain "Pirate/SLIM" operations or busted call signs. Please do yourself a favor and adhere to the old adage of "Work First Worry Later" (WFWL).

3V, TUNISIA (Correction/Operator Update). An Italian group, along with the Association des Radio Amateurs Tunisiens (ARAT) and the Engineering University of Gabes, are planning a second IOTA DXpedition to Djerba Is (AF-083, WFF

3VFF-007, WLOTA L-1394 and ARLHS TUN-022), between April 29th and May 6th. The Association des Radio Amateurs Tunisiens (ARAT) is expected to receive the callsign TS8TI on March 15th. Current operators/club participants mentioned are 3V8SA (ARCS of Tunisian Scout), 3V8ST (ARC of Tunis), 3V8ESG (Department of Communications and Networking National Engeneering School of Gabès), 3V8SF (Scout Radio Club of Sfax), Leopoldo/I8LWL,

Fred/IK7JWX (Team Leader), Antonello/IK2DUW (QSL Manager), Titti/IK8GQY (YL), Ferruccio/IK8TEM, Ampelio/IS0AGY, Rosy/IW2NLC (YL), Ashraf/KF5EYY and Stefano/IK6JRI. Activity will be on all HF bands, including the 30/17/12 meter bands and the CW, SSB, RTTY, AMTOR and PSK31 modes. They are looking for operators, sponsors and individual contributions, contact Fred, IK7JWX, at <<u>ik7jwx2003@yahoo.it</u>>.

- **4JT, AZERBAIJAN** (Special Prefix). The Federation of Radio Sport of Azerbaijan has announced that up to March 5th, the Azerbaijanian HAMs are permitted to add the special addition of the letter "T", which means "Tragedy", to their callsigns. For example: 4J7DL would change to 4JT7DL, or 4K3M to 4KT3M, etc.... The activity is to remember the 21st anniversary of one of the most horrific events of the 1990s, the "Khojaly Massacre", the biggest war crime in the area of the former USSR. QSL via operator's home callsign. ADDED NOTE: On behalf of a group of Azerbaijani-Americans and their friends throughout the nation and the world, on the eve of the 21st anniversary of this tragedy, they hereby call upon you to help them commemorating Khojaly Massacre and its victims with a Presidential proclamation and submit a petition to the White House.
- **9G, GHANA**. Reminder Marcel, AI6MS, reports [edited]: "I will be operating portable from January-May 2013 in Ghana, West Africa, as 9G5MS with my Yaesu FT-857D. Anyone is welcome to make a contact, though priority will be given to schools, universities, and prescheduled contacts. I am volunteering with a non-profit called 'Medicine on the Move' and will be using amateur radio in the classroom for the students from the 'AvTech Academy' in Kpong, Ghana. QSLcards are tentatively planned and can be expected in the 2nd half of 2013 if requested. I hope to be operating during the ARRL School Club Roundup as well."
- **9M4, SPRATLY ISLANDS**. Operators John/9M6XRO, Steve/9M6DXX, James/9V1YC,Ben/DJ0YI/N6MUF, Don/G3BJ, Christian/EA3NT and Tony/KM0O will be active as 9M4SLL from Layang-Layang Island (AS-051) between March 10-18th. Activity will be on 160-10 meters using CW, SSB and RTTY. They will have several stations on the air with amplifiers into vertical antennas all within a few meters of the ocean. QSL Manager for this operation is Tim, M0URX (OQRS, direct, by the Bureau, LoTW). Logs will be uploaded to LoTW as quickly as possible after the DXpedition. More details will be forthcoming.
- **9V, SINGAPORE**. Koichi, JR1MLT, is currently active as 9V1KK from Singapore. He is there because of his job, and he informs us that he expects to be in Singapore for "five years or so (up to economy and market)". His station is very much limited due to the residential conditions. Koichi mentions that he currently lives on the 10th floor of a condo and his antenna is much restricted. Koichi just put up a long wire with the ATU for the HF bands (40-10m) with 100 watts. He operates mostly on SSB and CW. Members of the Turkish Radio Amateur Club (TRAC) from the Bursa Branch (the YM3KB team) are activating the special callsign TC16BURSA as of January 10th through March 10th. The first half of the team will board on Monday, February 18th, and the boat will sail for Cabo San Lucas, to pick up the rest of the team. We expect to arrive at Clipperton Island on February 26th. VP2M, MONTSERRAT. Ops John/KB8RJ & XYL Crissie/WD8KUR active as VP2MRS and VP2MUR, respectively, from Gingerbread Hill in St. Peter's on Montserrat Is between Feb 20th and Mar 14th. Activity will be holiday style on 80-10 meters, including the WARC bands, using mostly SSB and some PSK. QSL both callsigns via KB8RJ.

Youth and Educational Outreach Program

As announced at the Mansfield Mid-Winter Hamfest – Looking to fill leadership positions.

During the ARRL forum held at the Mansfield Mid-Winter Hamfest on Sunday, February 17, 2013. Ohio Section Manager Frank J. Piper, KI8GW announced the formation of a new program in the Ohio Section, "Youth and Educational Outreach". The goal of this program is to assist Schools, Youth Organizations, and Amateur Radio Clubs in educating our youth about Amateur Radio.

There are many programs and grants the ARRL offers to teachers and schools, which may go unnoticed simply because they are just not aware of how the science and technology of Amateur Radio can be brought into the classroom. There are many Boy/Girl Scout events which demonstrate Amateur Radio, and then the kids simply go back to their home councils, and never have the chance to research the hobby further. And, many Amateur Radio Clubs wish to develop younger members, but simply do not know where to gather resources to start a prosperous Elmer program. That is where this new program will come in.

The Educational Outreach program will be headed up by E. Mike McCardel, KC8YLD, who will vacate his Affiliated Club Coordinator position to assume an Assistant Section Manager (ASM), Youth and Educational Outreach appointment, heading up a team of three other Assistant Section Managers, each with a responsibility for various aspects for this program. Those new ASM positions will be:

ASM – Radio Scouting ASM – Youth Outreach ASM – Educational Outreach

We are looking for applicants to fill these three roles. Applications should submit their qualifications to the Section Manager no later than 11:59pm local time, Thursday, February 28, 2013. After applications are submitted, selected candidates will be interviewed by E. Mike McCardel and the Section Manager. Appointments will be announced no later than March 20, 2013.

The following are job descriptions and requirements for each ASM position:

Assistant Section Manager – Scouting

The ASM for Radio Scouting should be an active "Radio Scouter" in the Ohio Section and preferably be acquainted with the Radio Scouting activities and opportunities in both the Boy Scout and Girl Scout programs covered by the Section. As such, the ASM is preferably a registered member of either the BSA or GSUSA, or, both.

The ASM for Radio Scouting shall establish contact with all BSA and GSUSA councils in the Section in order to promote Radio Scouting activities, especially Jamboree on the Air (October) and Thinking Day on the Air (February), as well as other operating events and opportunities throughout the year, including Council-run camps. The ASM should promote the formation of Scout Council related committees or sub-committees on Radio Scouting in which local and area Clubs become an integral part of the Council's Radio Scouting planning and activities.

The ASM for Radio Scouting shall identify as many communication resources as possible for the dissemination and promotion of Radio Scouting in the Section, including such outlets as Club newsletters, Club programs, Hamfest programs, Internet discussion groups, Nets, Scouting newsletters, local news media, etc.

The ASM for Radio Scouting shall provide regular performance measurements and reports to the Section Manager and Assistant State Manager for Education and Youth Outreach and, shall participate in discussions on how to improve Radio Scouting in the Section.

The ASM for Radio Scouting must be an ARRL Full Member, holding at least a Technician class license.

The ASM for Radio Scouting shall consult, advise and cooperate with the ASM: Youth Outreach, and the ASM: Educational Outreach under the Direction of the ASM of Youth and Educational Outreach and the Section Manager.

Recruitment of new hams and ARRL members is an integral part of the job of every ARRL appointee. Appointees should take advantage of every opportunity to recruit a new ham or member to foster growth of Field Organization programs, and our abilities to serve the public.

Assistant Section Manager – Youth Outreach

The ASM for Youth Outreach should have experience working with youth and within a youth support organization and be acquainted with Amateur Radio activities and opportunities that would be a benefit for youth organizations with whom we partnership.

The ASM for Youth Outreach shall establish contact and rapport with a variety of youth organization including, but not limited to, Big Brothers/Sisters, YMCA, YWCA, Church Groups, 4H and community youth organizations and outreaches.

The ASM for Youth Outreach should look for opportunities with these groups to promote Amateur Radio as an educational, self-confidence building, service and family oriented activity.

The ASM for Youth Outreach should identify activities among youth groups that are compatible with the Amateur Radio service and be prepared to demonstrate to youth group leadership and administration how Amateur Radio would be a beneficial activity within their programs.

The ASM for Youth Outreach shall identify as many communication resources as possible for the dissemination and promotion of Amateur Radio among the Section's youth groups, including such outlets as Club newsletters, Club programs, Hamfest programs, Internet discussion groups, Nets, Local news media, etc.

The ASM for Youth Outreach shall provide regular performance measurements and reports to the Section Manager and Assistant Section Manager for Education and Youth Outreach, and shall participate in discussions on how to improve Youth Outreach in the Section.

The ASM for Youth Outreach must be an ARRL Full Member, holding at least a Technician class license.

The ASM for Youth Outreach shall consult, advise and cooperate with the ASM: Radio Scouting, and the ASM: Educational Outreach under the Direction of the ASM of Youth and Educational Outreach and the Section Manager.

Recruitment of new hams and ARRL members is an integral part of the job of every ARRL appointee. Appointees should take advantage of every opportunity to recruit a new ham or member to foster growth of Field Organization programs, and our abilities to serve the public.

Assistant Section Manager – Educational Outreach

ASM for Educational Outreach should be an active educator or have past experience as a teacher and be acquainted with how amateur Radio activities and opportunities would be a benefit for schools at achieving their STEM and Core curricular goals.

ASM for Educational Outreach shall establish contact and rapport with public, private and home schools as well as museums, libraries and other entities that promote and support an educational mission.

The ASM for Educational Outreach should serve as a liaison among schools, radio clubs and operators for the purpose of identifying and educating these entities how they can best work together to promote meeting the educational goals of STEM and Core curricular activities through Amateur Radio.

The ASM for Educational Outreach shall identify as many communication resources as possible for the dissemination and promotion of the educational mission of Amateur Radio throughout the Section, including such outlets as Club newsletters, Club programs, Hamfest programs, internet discussion groups, Nets, Scouting newsletters, Local news media, etc.

The ASM for Educational Outreach shall provide regular performance measurements and reports to the Section Manager and Assistant Section Manager for youth and Educational Outreach, and shall participate in discussions on how to improve Educational Outreach in the Section.

The ASM for Educational Outreach must be an ARRL Full Member, holding at least a Technician class license.

The ASM for Educational Outreach shall consult, advise and cooperate with the ASM: Radio Scouting, and the ASM: Youth Outreach under the Direction of the ASM of Youth and Educational Outreach and the Section Manager.

Recruitment of new hams and ARRL members is an integral part of the job of every ARRL appointee. Appointees should take advantage of every opportunity to recruit a new ham or member to foster growth of Field Organization programs, and our abilities to serve the public.

We look forward to hearing from all potential applicants for these positions. This is an exciting project that the Ohio Section is undertaking. We need passionate and talented people to make this project a success.


