Anyone who has known me for very long, knows that I'm an Eagle Scout. That program had a profound impact on my life, and taught me many lessons at an early age that I've carried with me throughout my life. The Boy Scout Motto is "Always Be Prepared". Not a bad guide to live by. But, what are you going to be prepared for?

I'll narrow it down for this discussion: Communications. As Amateur Radio Operators, we pride ourselves on being prepared to jump in and provide assistance in the event of some sort of disaster that would render normal lines of communication inoperable. Many of you

became interested in Amateur Radio because of its ability to provide the Emergency Communications service to the community. But, are you really prepared? These last couple weeks have been interesting to me as I've observed the reactions to the short term loss of the K8IV repeater system.

We are very fortunate to have received the Yaesu DR-1 repeater, which is what we are currently operating on. It was put into service on short notice from the PCARS club site. It's not an ideal situation, but it does give us some coverage, and it's allowing K8IV to make the necessary changes to his system which should allow it to provide many years of uninterrupted future service to the club. (Thanks Ed) In the meantime, traffic on the repeater is reduced. Changes have needed to be made for net control operators. Check-ins



on the net(s) are down on the RF side, but up on the Echolink side.

Obviously, some of us are not prepared to operate under this compromised environment. So, what are you doing about it? This is the perfect opportunity to make, and test, adjustments to your station that would allow you to maintain communications in an emergency, disaster, or some other situation that resulted in repeaters being down and other alternatives needing to be established. The time to be prepared is before the disaster hits. It's tough to make the necessary changes after the disaster is already upon us. The best part of the deal here? It's summertime! No need to go out in the cold and snow to make the improvements needed to your system.

PCARS VE Test Sessions

PCARS VE sessions are scheduled for 10:00 am on the first Saturday of every even numbered month. August 2nd, October 4th, December 6th

What to Bring to the Testing Session

- \$15 is the current test fee. We prefer the exact amount in cash or a check made out to: ARRL-VEC
- A government photo ID (driver's license or state ID card preferred).
- Your Social Security Number or FCC Federal Registration Number. We are required to submit either your Social Security Number (SSN) or your FCC Federal Registration Number (FRN) with your application. If you are upgrading, your FRN is on your current Amateur Radio license.
- A pen (black ink) and pencil (we can loan you either or both)
- If you already have an Amateur Radio license: The original (<u>and one</u> <u>copy</u>) of any current (<u>unexpired</u>) <u>amateur radio operator's license</u> issued to you.
- If you've already passed a test: The original (**and one copy**) of any document that you will use to prove you've already passed a test element. These documents may include:
 - An unexpired Certificate of Successful Completion of Exam (CSCE) indicating the credit(s) earned indicating the credit(s) earned.
 - Pre March 21, 1987 Technician license (this provides credit for the Element 3 (General) exam).

Callsigns for WRTC2014 Competition Announced

WRTC 2014, Inc., host of the 2014 World Radiosport Team Championship competition, is pleased to announce the callsigns that will be used by the 59 teams competing in the event. The WRTC competitors will use 1×1 callsigns from the USA first call area. Sixteen of the available 75 callsigns will not be used, including the longest and shortest CW suffixes ("J", "Q", "Y", "E") and suffixes that are frequently miscopied on CW ("H"). Note that the "X" suffixes are not available in this callsign series.

"We wanted to have calls for the teams that were distinctive and fun," said Doug Grant, Chairman of WRTC2014. "This will make it easy for those chasing the WRTC2014 teams to identify them. It also provides a connection back to WRTC-1996 in San Francisco, which was the first time that 1×1 calls were used in the United States."

Following the tradition of previous WRTC events, teams will not know the callsign they will use until the referee hands them a sealed envelope just 15 minutes before the contest begins. This puts all teams



at an equal starting point and helps maintain the anonymity of the teams. Participation awards are available for anyone who works a WRTC2014 team during the competition. These include QSL cards, awards for working all 59 teams, and awards for working teams on the most band-modes. Contacts with the WRTC2014 teams will count 5 points in the ARRL Centennial QSO Party. Fifty-nine (59) teams of top amateur radio contest operators from 38 countries will travel to the New England area July 8-14, 2014 to compete in WRTC2014. Participation is based on qualifying scores posted in major contests between 2010 and 2014. A group of referees and judges, themselves well-known contest operators, will oversee the competition and confirm the results.

About WRTC 2014

The World Radiosport Team Championship (WRTC) is held every four years and consists of 50+ twoperson teams of amateur radio operators from around the world competing in a test of operating skill. Unlike most on-the-air competitions, all stations are required to use identical antennas from the same geographic region, eliminating all variables except operating ability. Previous WRTCs have been held in Seattle (1990), San Francisco (1996), Slovenia (2000), Finland (2002), Brazil (2006), and Russia (2010). 13 Colonies 2014 Special Event

The 13 Colonies Special Event Set for July 1-6: The 13 Colonies Special Event for 2014 will take place July 1-6, with special 1×1 call signs K2A, K2B, K2C, K2D, K2E, K2F, K2G, K2H, K2I, K2J, K2K, K2L, and K2M to be active. Participants can earn a certificate. In 2013 more than 81,000 contacts were logged in the 13 Colonies Special Event.

The theme for 2014 will be "Revolution War Era Colonial Currency". The certificate is printed on heavy card stock. Stations working one state or, as many as all 13, will be eligible for the certificate. A "Clean Sweep" indicator will be affixed, for those lucky enough to "Q" all 13. A special endorsement will be attached for stations contacting our sister operation, WM3PEN, in Philadelphia, PA. **NEW FOR 2014**

The 13 Colonies will have TWO sister events: Our old friends WM3PEN will again participate from Philadelphia, PA, where independence was declared.; Added will be W3FT from Baltimore, MD, commemorating the writing of our Nation



Anthem, The Star Spangled Banner in 1814.

The 13 Colonies certificate will have a Liberty Bell added for a contact with WM3PEN. A W3FT contact will have a special 15 star 1812 US flag of the period added to the 13 Colonies certificate and will also offer a special QSL card printed just for this event.

ARRL Initiates Online Practice Exams

The ARRL has launched a new online resource that allows users to take randomly generated practice exams using questions from the actual examination question pool. ARRL Exam Review for Ham Radio[™] is free. Users do not need to be ARRL members. The only requirement is that users must first set up a site login (this is different and separate from any ARRL website login the user may have).

"The ARRL's online Exam Review is designed to help license examination candidates review their progress as they study," said ARRL Marketing Manager Bob Inderbitzen, NQ1R. "As you complete a chapter or section of a license manual, you can turn to the online program to review all of the related questions taken directly from the examination question pool. After answering each question — right or wrong — the correct answer is shown, and a page reference to the license manual is displayed for further review."

This, of course, is not the only online test examination service available, but it adds still another dimension to the ARRL services available to amateurs and people studying for an Amateur Radio exam.

Activities for Young and Wanna-be Hams featured at ARRL National Convention

The ARRL National Centennial Convention July 17-19 in Hartford, Connecticut, will include a variety of activities aimed at young and prospective hams. These activities will include two youth forums, a hidden transmitter hunt, a scavenger hunt and the Youth Radio Lab. Focused on younger and would-be amateurs, he ARRL Discovery Station in the ARRL exhibit area in the Exhibition Hall will appeal to the interests of visitors of all ages.

"The Discovery Station will have a range of hands-on exhibits to help visitors to understand the basics of radio waves, and projects that young operators can explore in the world of exciting world of Amateur Radio" said Tommy Gober, N5DUX, who will head up the ARRL Discovery Station team. "Stop by the Discovery Station to discover the different parts of what makes up a radio wave, try out some of the electronic kits available through the Education & Technology Program (ETP), and get inspired to create something of your own."

Gober said the Discovery Station will feature some of the robots developed by ARRL Teachers Institute participants, as well as a CubeSat simulator, and an audio-frequency oscillator with an oscilloscope display and speakers — to help visitors understand the relationship between amplitude and frequency. Visitors will be able to change these relationships by moving their hands over a sensor. "We'll also have two different-sized coils to stretch or shrink to demonstrate the relationship of coil size and spacing on inductance." Gober added. "Essentially, [we'll offer] stimulating, hands-on things for visitors to do."

"Visitors do not need to be Amateur Radio licensees to attend the convention, but registration is required for all attendees, including youth. Two-day tickets (Friday and Saturday) are free for those who are age 21 or younger. Advance registration is recommended."

W1AW/p Stations: How do They Come About?

Amateurs tell me that contacting the W1AW/p stations from each state and US territory, and on each band, is the best part of the year-long ARRL Centennial Party. On the other side of the coin, I've spoken with many amateurs who have been operators at a W1AW/p station and been told this was one of the greatest experiences they have ever had in Amateur Radio. In short, the roving W1AW has proven to be a real blast for everyone involved! But, how are the operators of these portable stations selected?

The first step in identifying W1AW/p operators is for staff at HQ to select an amateur from the state or territory to head one of the operations. Typically, the person selected has a proven track record of quality operating under Contest or DX pileup conditions. The reason for this is that each W1AW/p station generally is inundated with calls curing the first several days it is on the air. Skill in managing hoards of stations calling at the same time is critical to the success of the portable operation.

Once the coordinator for a portable operation has been selected, he or she must determine the best way to fill the time slots the station will need to be on the air. Taken to the extreme, for an operation to be active on eight bands simultaneously, 24 hours a day for 7 days, the coordinator will need to fill 1,344, 1-hour time slots. To this, add four operating modes (CW, SSB PSK-31, RTTY) while brings the number of cooperator-time hours to

5,376. Using an ideal two operators on each hour slot, the total of operator hours jumps to 10,752. Obviously, all eight of the bands will not be open 24-hours/day, so these extreme numbers will not be needed. Regardless, the number of operators needed to put eight bands using multiple modes on the air for a week is rather great.

Working from the number of operator-hours that are needed to be filled, the coordinator might next determine if the operation needs to be spread throughout the entire state, or if there is a sufficient density of amateurs in one locality to get the job done. Oh, and one more thing. How many stations are there that can do the job of giving W1AW/p QSOs out effectively in pileups? As much as many hams love to operate QRP, I don't think that using a QRP station with a long-wire antenna would generally be very effective. Strong stations are probably the best for most modes and situations.

I don't pretend to know the best answer to all the questions a portable coordinator faces. What I think I know is that a few of the portable operations that have taken place so far this year have used truly awesome, single station sites that boast several operating stations -- top-of-the-line club contest stations. In most instances; however, operations have been spread throughout much or all of a state to utilize most effectively the resources of operators and equipment that are available to achieve the greatest results.

Merely thinking about this casts a new light on how one might want to answer the question, "Do you want to get a group of guys together to operate W1AW/p for a week?"

Fortunately, the amateurs who have answered this question "yes" have done a great job of coordinating the staffing and operation of their W1AW/p charges.

Closing Item for the Day

Over the past several years, I have received many questions concerning any action the FCC may take regarding the operating activities of Glenn Baxter, K1MAN. Of course, I had no more insight into the Commission's thinking than anyone else. FCC has now spoken.

Ohio Amateur Radio Plates

Just a reminder - when you apply for, or renew your Amateur Radio Plates you now have to supply a copy of your current FCC license. This changed a while back, but not everyone has gotten the word. This is from the Ohio BMV web site (http://www.bmv.ohio.gov/sp_amateur_radio.stm):

General Information

Owners or lessees of motor vehicles who are residents of Ohio and hold an unrevoked and unexpired official amateur radio station license issued by the Federal Communications Commission may apply for these plates. The official call letters will be the license plate numbers. There are no options.

Registrant Eligibility

Owner must submit a copy of the un-revoked and unexpired official amateur radio license issued by the Federal Communications Commission. (FCC).

Title Requirements

Ohio Certificate of Title issued in the same name as the FCC license, either singly or jointly, or the name on the FCC license is the same name on the lease agreement.

Vehicle Information

These plates may be issued to passenger vehicles, non-commercial trucks, recreational vehicles, house vehicles and non-commercial trailers.

Type of Plates

Plates will be manufactured with the FCC license.



Issuance Information

Amateur Radio plates cannot be issued with system assigned, reserved, or personalized plate formats.

Renewal of plates can be done at your local Deputy Registrar or by mail using their renewal notice. Amateur Radio License Holders must provide a copy of their current unexpired and unrevoked official amateur radio license issued by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) at the time of any type renewal transaction.

All plates will be mailed directly to the address on your registration card unless customer requests otherwise. The deputy will issue your registration card, stickers and provide you with a permit which will allow you to operate your vehicle while your plates are being manufactured.

Special license plate applications are available at all Deputy Registrar license agency locations or can be downloaded HERE (<u>http://publicsafety.ohio.gov/links/bmv4705.pdf</u>).

Cost

These plates cost an additional \$10.00 annually plus the normal registration fees. The fee is determined by Ohio Revised Code section 4503.14.

So, make sure you have a copy of your FCC license available. I put the latest BMV form (April 2014) on the PCARS Yahoo Site, or you can download the PDF by using the link listed in the info from the BMV.

Changes to Part 97 Rules

Changes to Amateur Service Part 97 Rules **Go Into Effect on July 21**. The FCC's recently announced revisions to the Part 97 Amateur Radio rules governing exam credit to former licensees, test administration, and emission types will go into effect on Monday, July 21. In a wide-ranging Report and Order (R&O - <u>http://transition.fcc.gov/Daily_Releases/Daily_Business/2014/db0609/FCC-14-74A1.pdf</u>) released June 9, the Commission announced that it would grant examination credit for written elements 3 (General) and 4 (Amateur Extra) to holders of "expired licenses that required passage of those elements." The FCC will require former licensees falling outside the 2-year grace period to pass Element 2 (Technician) in order to be relicensed. The Commission declined to give exam credit to holders of expired Certificates of Successful Completion of Examination (CSCEs) or to extend lifetime validity to CSCEs.



The FCC also embraced the use of remote testing methods, allowing volunteer examiners and volunteer examiner coordinators "the option of administering examinations at locations remote from the VEs." The National Conference of Volunteer Examiner Coordinators (NCVEC) in 2002 endorsed experimental use of videoconferencing technology to conduct Amateur Radio testing in remote areas of Alaska. The Commission dropped its earlier proposal to permit two VEs to administer exams; the requirement remains at three VEs. The Commission did not spell out the "mechanics" of remote testing, however, which it said would "vary from location to location and session to session." VEs administering examinations remotely must grade such examinations "at the earliest practical opportunity," rather than "immediately," as the current rule for conventional exam sessions requires.

The FCC also adopted an ARRL proposal to authorize certain Time Division Multiple Access (TDMA) emissions in the Amateur Service. The Wireless Telecommunications Bureau in 2013 granted an ARRL request for a temporary blanket waiver to permit radio amateurs to transmit emissions with designators FXD, FXE, and F7E, pending resolution of the rulemaking petition. That waiver becomes permanent on July 21.

The Commission also made "certain minor, non-substantive amendments" and corrections to the Amateur Service rules.

VE4 Special Event - In July of 1914, Sigurjon Isfeld traveled Gimli, Manitoba, Canada to England o deliver 100 Canadian husky dogs to Sir Shackleton for his Imperial Trans-Antarctic Expedition. VE4XSI will be commemorating the contribution Isfeld made to the expedition with a special event station and QSL card. The station will be operational from **Gimli, Manitoba** from July 26 to Aug 4 as operator conditions dictate. Look for the station on 7.2, 14.250, 21.250, and 28.350 MHz as band conditions allow. Worked All Britain Award – To commemorate the Commonwealth Games being held in Scotland this year, members of the Worked All Britain Awards Group will be activating an event station each day from Jul 23 to Aug 3 from various locations in Scotland. An award will be made available for working the station on 3, 6, and 9 different days during this period, which will be endorsed Bronze, Silver or Gold respectively. Awards may also be endorsed for any band or mode. More than one certificate may be claimed if applying for different bands or modes.
